#### NEWS FROM THE EAST LOOF TOWN TRUST

#### **COUNCIL OFFICES ROOF**

Work will be completed shortly on replacing the flat roof over the Council Offices and Tourist Information Centre. It has been patched over many years, but after further deterioration nothing short of a new one would now be sufficient. It will cost the Trust about £15,000, which again illustrates the importance to the Trust of maintaining income streams to permit the maintenance of the various properties for which we are responsible as well as the beach, seafront and Wooldown.

#### WISHING WELL SITE

When the Council closed the former ladies' toilets by the Guildhall, and replaced them with new ones around the corner, the property reverted to the Trust. As previously reported, after public consultation we obtained the necessary planning consents to convert the building into a cafe/restaurant. A public tendering process identified a preferred bidder and work is in hand to complete a lease. Building work to create the shell (on the same scale as before) should commence in a matter of weeks; the aim being to permit opening by about September. This will represent a substantial investment by the Trust but we are satisfied on the professional advice which we have received throughout the exercise that the rental return on it will help to provide significantly improved long term financial security for the Trust.

#### **GRAFFITI**

As in other parts of the town, attention seekers have caused criminal damage by spraying graffiti on the seafront. Our staff are to be congratulated by acting quickly to remove it. A significant cost is involved because the process can take a long time and the materials required are expensive. A good deal of cooperative effort is being made to address the issue and if readers have any knowledge that they can contribute please be in touch with our office in the Guildhall or the Town Council.

#### **LOOE VALLEY SINGERS**


The next few months will see the Looe Valley Singers out and about in the community.

#### LOOE FESTIVAL OF THE SEA & RAFT RACE SUNDAY 4TH JUNE

This annual festival, hosted by Looe Marine Conservation Group, is taking place across Looe from 9am to 5pm, in collaboration with Looe's annual Raft Race organised by the Looe Boat Owners Association and RNLI. An exciting day of fun, exploration and discovery, the festival activities and stalls help you learn about Looe's marine environment and, most importantly, how we should respect our relationship with the sea.

Highlights include chef demos with the Cornwall Good Seafood Guide, the Wet Wipe Monster on the beach (Marine Conservation Society); Fathoms Free divers on an underwater litter pick, boat trips for fishing and seal spotting, National Marine Aquarium robot demo, crabbing competition, rockpool ramble, beach clean, dancers, puppet show, heritage walk and more. #### **THROW JELLY INSTEAD!!**

Recognising the tradition of throwing things at the raft race, the message from Looe Marine Conservation Group this year is 'Throw JELLY – not water bombs!!' We want you to have fun but realise there's no such thing as a 'biodegradable balloon'. Balloons of any kind become litter and get mistaken as food, killing marine animals by blocking their intestines. So we'd like to see the day pass without balloon water bombs. Challenged

to come up with an alternative, we identified jelly as the ideal answer. It's simple, cheap and won't do any harm. You can prepare it the night before using a sandcastle bucket and a packet of jelly. Refrigerate overnight and bring to the Raft Race. Simple!

#### YELLOW FISH ARRIVE IN LOOE

What do the yellow fish mean which are spray painted on the pavements in Looe? Nothing but rain water should go down this drain. The fish are painted next to drains that connect to the surface water pipes that lead to the river or sea. By marking the drains, and explaining where surface water ends up, it shows how pollution travels direct to the sea. This initiative by the Looe Bathing Water Quality Project, is designed to raise awareness and encourage you to think about how you can change behaviour to reduce the pollution that finds its way into the ocean and rivers.

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

**Branch News**: On 6<sup>th</sup> May, the branch manned a stall at the West Looe May Fayre and held a charity auction in the evening. The May Fayre went well despite the weather and we would like to thank all members who assisted, especially Annette Bryan for her cake stall. The auction was held in the Salutation Inn, with entertainment provided by the excellent Polperro

Wreckers. We thank everyone who donated auction items or bid for lots and made the night such a success, along with the Salutation Inn for hosting us. The two events raised over £900 for this year's Looe Poppy Appeal, which now exceeds £10,000. The Appeal helps the RBL provide financial, social and emotional support to members and veterans of the British Armed Forces, their families and dependants.

**Getting Help – Veterans' Gateway**: A consortium of military charities, including The RBL, SSAFA and Combat Stress, have created the Veterans' Gateway. This provides a first point of contact for veterans and their families who need support, no matter what their needs. It is in operation 24 hours a day and seven days a week. **Lest We Forget**: Any casualty of war is a tragic loss but even more so in a close knit community like Looe. The enormity of the tragedy becomes more apparent when the casualties are related and even brothers.

Thomas Pinch Lamerton and his brother Richard came from a large family who lived at River View, Bridge End, East Looe. Both were career navy men joining the RN in 1884 and 1892 respectively. Thomas completed his RN service and had joined the Coast Guard, but was recalled to the Navy at the start of the WWI. He was one of the earlier casualties when he went down with HMS Monmouth in November 1914. Richard was serving on HMS Indefatigable when she was involved in the Battle of Jutland in 1916. She was hit several times, exploding with the loss of all but two of her crew of 1,019. The brothers are listed on the Plymouth Naval Memorial as having no known grave.

The Tambling brothers, Edwin and Harry, came from East Looe. Edwin served with the RN Patrol Service based at Lowestoft. In October 1940 he was mentioned in Despatches for his part in defending HM Trawler Edwardian in an attack by German aircraft. On 22<sup>nd</sup> July 1941 Edwin's billet was destroyed in a Germans air raid. His body was never found and he is listed on the RN Patrol Service Memorial at Lowestoft. His brother Harry originally enlisted in the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry but he eventually found himself serving with 2/11 Battery, 3 Medium Regiment, RA. On 17<sup>th</sup> April 1945, less than three weeks before the final German surrender, Harry's battery moved to the village of Otterlo in the Netherlands. The area had been captured by Canadian tanks but large numbers of German infantry remained nearby. That night, the battery came under intense fire from mortars and snipers as the Germans made a concentrated effort to break through to their own lines. The action lasted all night and the battery lost five men, including Harry Tambling. In the overall action, the Germans lost about 100 killed and 400 taken prisoner. Harry is buried with two other British soldiers in Otterlo village cemetery.

disabilities for life. Rett syndrome is usually caused by a fault on a gene on the X chromosome and there is research evidence that this genetic mutation could be reversed or its effects reduced. The charity Reverse Rett raises funds to support this research work.

My thoughts are that each Councillor should take one part of the Council's work and see how it can be developed so those Councillors who do not always feel involved or who cannot attend can do their bit towards making a difference for the town.

I thank you all for the support I have been shown throughout the year as we have developed as a council. The town's residents have, and do, appreciate the work you do around the town and the comments they make are complimentary.

Finally, I wish to thank our staff, who are often the workhorse of our ideas; they continue to support us and guide us in what are difficult and uncertain times for small councils.

#### PLANNING AND PUBLIC CONSULTATION COMMITTEE REPORT 2016/17

This year has seen a small, hardworking team consider over 107 planning applications, an increase of 60% over the previous council year, with over 92% of our recommendations in agreement with Cornwall Council.

In addition to the increase in applications, there has also been an increase in works carried out within the Conservation/Article 4 area either without planning permission or in contravention to the planning permission granted. With this in mind, the importance of the coming Neighbourhood Plan cannot be underestimated.

Pre-application and proposed draft plan presentations have also been made to the committee with all parties having received a copy of Looe Town Council's pre-app policy document prior to any presentations with their accepted agreement.

Having said all that, the Planning Committee is now at a crossroads. Average attendance at meetings stands at four, unapproved minutes now being a regular occurrence. It cannot continue with such few numbers, yet it is important to the town that it does continue. A minimum of six councillors is needed for it to continue as a meaningful Committee of Council. Without this, Council will need to consider disbanding the planning committee, with all future applications being considered at Full Council meetings.

Thanks go to those councillors who have supported the Committee when needed and also to the Committee members, whose hard work and patience, together with their willingness for turning out in all weathers to visit sites and attend meetings, I greatly appreciate. My thanks to Annette Keen for her hard work in keeping the website and planning applications list up to date and for keeping me on the right track during meetings. Thanks also to Anne Frith for all her hard work and support.

#### **TOURISM AND AMENITIES COMMITTEE 2016/17**

It has been a busy year for the Committee and I would like to thank those councillors and members of staff that have helped on the Committee.

The following summarises some of the work the Committee has been undertaking:

**Tourism**: The need for the TIC to modernise and also to become self-funding has dominated the Committee once again this year. Unfortunately, despite the makeover last year, new stock lines and the launch of the new website, the TIC failed to start becoming self-funding. This led to the difficult decision to make the post of TIC manager redundant. A working group has been set up with a mixture of councillors, staff, members of the public and businesses, to look at the future of the TIC and how it can be run more efficiently and adapt to the change.

**Traffic Regulation Order**: We consulted on potential changes to on street parking restrictions and the proposals for the new schemes were drawn up and passed to Cornwall Council for comment and pricing. Unfortunately what came back from Cornwall Council surprised us, as the total cost would be in the region of £68,000. We consulted the town again in light of the costs with the result being the TRO was no longer supported.

**Devolution**: Cornwall Council continues to consult on potential devolution, which includes services and assets such as land and buildings. We have expressed an interest in a number of sites and were awarded a grant from Cornwall Council to undertake surveys to ascertain potential liabilities etc. Work continues with Cornwall Council on the future of the library and the potential for LTC to take it over. This work is very important as this potentially puts us in a strong position to influence or control important assets for the town.

**Emergency**: Work on the Emergency Plan, which is designed to assist in the event of an incident/emergency affecting the town has now been completed.

Bathing Water Quality: Work continues with all the agencies to further understand the issues and to improve the water quality. This is a multi-agency approach that is well supported. Current initiatives include camera survey of sewers and encouraging businesses to install grease traps to prevent grease entering the sewers, which causes blockages and potential sewer spills. The Yellow Fish campaign is also underway to educate businesses not to pour waste water down street gullies. The public information campaign to encourage people not to put anything but the 3 P's down the toilet continues. Further work on catchment management with local farms is also continuing. The good news is that the bathing water passed the sufficient standard in 2016.

**CCTV**: Our successful CCTV system has been upgraded with a number of new cameras.

## FINANCE AND GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT MAY 2017

#### **FINANCE**

**Budget**: Income for 2016/17 was a little below budget but nevertheless broadly in line with budget expectations. On a more positive note, actual expenditure has been markedly less than budget, leaving income over expenditure in positive territory. The unaudited underspend being in the region of £31k.

A focus upon utility costs has continued during the course of the year to ensure that charges accurately reflect usage. Thanks to the Amenities' Manager, Laura Kellaway, for the continued work and effort in this area, being one that represents a significant cost to the Town Council. TIC operating costs were reduced during 2016/17, consequential upon a reduction in staffing levels, and reorganisation. It is anticipated that the TIC operating costs will be maintained at a sustainable level moving forward.

The major expense identified during the year was in respect of repairs to the Mariners' Garden riverside wall. Whilst the repair costs were identified during 2016/17, the actual repair expenditure will fall into the 2017/18 financial year. A provision has been made in the current year's budget accordingly. It is to be noted however that the expected repair costs are likely to be considerably less than first anticipated and the budget for 2017/18 will be reviewed in the light of the revised expenditure.

The aim for 2017/18 continues to be greater budgetary control with regular month-on-month reviews of income/expenditure in order to maintain budget limits.

**Clarity in Accounts**: In line with the objective to develop greater budgetary control, a greater level of detailed financial information and clarity in financial accounts was initiated during 2015/16. This focus has continued during the course of 2016/17 as a work-in-progress.

Moving forward, consideration has been given to changing the accounting package used by the Town Council. A view will be taken on this matter during the course of 2017/18.

**Annual Audit Return**: The Town Council has been advised that a new External Auditor has been appointed. Grant Thornton will undertake the Annual Audit for 2016/17 to be replaced by PKF Littlejohn LLP for 2017/18 and subsequent years.

**Internal Audit Council Member checks**: These have continued during 2016/17 and have been duly reported to the Finance and General Purposes Committee. Thanks to Cllr Chris Rose for undertaking this work.

#### **POLICIES AND PROCEDURES**

**Standing Orders, Policies & Procedures**: Work has continued during the course of the year on the Town Council's Standing Orders, Policies and Procedures. Standing Orders have been routinely updated and currently reflect the Council's statutory responsibilities and community obligations. New policies have been introduced and existing policies have been routinely reviewed to ensure that the Council's business activities are reflected in, and covered by, adequate governing documentation.

**Website**: The new website introduced during 2015/16 has proven to be an excellent communications tool allowing the Council to place relevant information in the public domain. Thanks to Annette Keen for managing the website and keeping it fresh and up-to-date during this past year. Similarly, the Town Council's Facebook account has proven to be an excellent communication tool for day-to-day matters. Thanks to Laura Kellaway for monitoring and managing the Facebook account during 2016/17.

**Thanks**: Thanks to all on the Finance & General Purposes Committee for their support during the year and their efforts in progressing the many changes that have been implemented.



#### **LOOE MUSEUM NEWS**

The Museum began its 'Bright Sparks' project on 16<sup>th</sup> May. This project, a great opportunity for children at Looe Primary Academy to share the experiences of locals involved with the sea and to learn about the rich maritime heritage of Looe, is a result of a Grant Award from Feast, a programme to make great art happen across Cornwall, with support from Cornwall Museums Partnership.

The Grant was awarded for our 'Discover Looe' project, based on the history of the sea in Looe, which will end with the production of two new feather banners for the front of the Museum. Three classes of Year 3 and 4 children at Looe Primary Academy will be led by Sue Field, a local textile artist. The project will start with coffee sessions at the school, with representatives from the RNLI and local boat builders, fishermen and sailors all coming to speak to the children and be interviewed by them. Our Mayor, Armand Toms, an ex-fisherman himself, will also speak to the children and show them how fishing nets are made. Museum volunteers will provide a display of old photographs of Looe's fishing industry, as well as RNLI and seaside pictures, to encourage the children to learn about the fishing industry and the importance of the sea in Looe's past. The children will use the stories and pictures to create their own art work, culminating in production of the new banners, which we hope to have ready for a Grand Ceremony at the Museum in early July.

The Museum will host a Heritage Lottery funded project on 2<sup>nd</sup> June, Dasserghi Kernewek, looking at the revival of Cornish in the early 20th Century. Mark Trevethan and Amantha Rayne from the project will be at the Museum from 10.30am-4pm with some wonderful items from the collection, including Henry Jenner's 1905 handwritten copy of 'Song of the Men of the West' ('Trelawny') and an early copy of the Handbook of the Cornish Language with Jenner's corrections/additions. They will talk to visitors about this fascinating piece of Cornish history and try to find people, especially fishermen, who can speak some Cornish.

We have received a request from The Netherlands, for information and possibly a picture of Harry Tambling who was a Gunner in the Royal Artillery No 5442026 and was killed on April 17<sup>th</sup> 1945 in the Battle of Otterlo, Netherlands. The people there are researching the battle and have 21 pictures of the 23 the soldiers killed and Harry is one of the two pictures missing. Harry Tambling lived in Lower Chapel Street, East Looe, and had a brother called Edwin and two sisters Emily and May or Mary. He may also have had another brother Harold. Any information would be much appreciated and passed directly to the researchers in The Netherlands. Please contact the ELTT if you have any information.

The next Family History Day will take place at Liskeard Public Hall on June 3<sup>rd</sup> from 10am-3pm and all are welcome to come and ask questions about family at our stall.

Lastly, we are hoping to organise a meal at the Sail Loft on 21<sup>st</sup> October at 7.30pm, to celebrate 'Trafalgar Day'. Please put the date in your diary – details will follow later.

## LOOE HARBOUR COMMISSIONERS LOOE SARDINE FACTORY RE-DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Looe Harbour Commissioners were delighted to receive confirmation recently, that funding bids to the Coastal

Communities Fund and European Maritime Fisheries Fund were successful. These, in addition to our own financial contribution to the project has ensured that the project will now proceed.

Work started on Monday 15<sup>th</sup> May 2017 with an expected completion date of 30<sup>th</sup> June 2018. For many months, work has been going on behind the scenes to ensure that the project runs smoothly and that minimal disruption is caused to residents and businesses during the demolition/construction period. There will be periods (particularly during the demolition phase) when a section of the Pennyland walkway will need to be closed in order to comply with Health and Safety regulations. This will be achieved by closing the metal gate directly outside the building, together with the gate at the end of the Pennyland walkway, at the top of the steps which joins Hannafore Road.

We believe that the Sardine Factory Re-Development will be a huge asset for the town, particularly West Looe. This project will provide sustained economic, social, voluntary and employment opportunities to the town and surrounding parishes over many years to come, and will help to ensure that Looe remains a thriving coastal community and popular tourist destination with a promising future, unlike some of our sister ports who now find themselves struggling, having not taken steps to embrace an ever changing society.

We ask for the publics support and co-operation during the construction stage, and apologise for any short term inconveniences encountered during the build.



The Looe Youth Project was the first local group to benefit from the Co-op's Community Fund, launched in September and was awarded £6762. The group meets on Wednesday evenings from 6.30pm to 8.30pm at the Millpool Centre. The project aims to enhance life opportunities for teenagers in an area of high deprivation, providing a safe environment in which they can learn life skills to enable them to maximise

their potential, and have access to advice and counselling on a wide range of issues, including health and sexual health. The funding received will enable the project to increase the number of members and to enhance the range of activities and equipment available to them to give them the confidence and skills to succeed.
