

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LOOE RNLI LIFEBOAT STATION Lifeboats

Shouts: Our crew at Looe have been ready to answer the pager and rescue those in difficulty. Between 20 July 2024 and 16 September our volunteer crews responded to 7 shouts.

One Moment One Crew: The visible part of any lifeboat station is the volunteer crew and our charity's lifeboats. Behind the scenes is a veritable "army" of shop volunteers and boathouse guides, who, together with our fundraisers engage with the public and our community promoting the work of the RNLI and raising valuable funds that enable our RNLI volunteer crew to do what they do best Saving Lives at Sea.

Our charity, which was founded in 1824, asked its volunteers and staff from around the UK and Ireland to take a photo of themselves, their crew or their team, at as close to 18:24 on 1.8.24 as possible. Whether lifeguards on a beach, lifeboat crew at a station, fundraisers at an event, or volunteers in a museum – all involved with the charity have been encouraged to submit a photo of themselves representing their RNLI role at wherever they may be on this date and time. Representatives including Looe's volunteer lifeboat crew, together with members of the station's shop, visits and fundraising teams have taken part. Their photo has been uploaded to an online portal and will be used to create a montage image. The RNLI celebrated its 200th anniversary on 4 March this year, and this photographic moment is one of a range of events and programmes which the charity has organised to mark its bicentenary.

Looe lifeboat station's Albatross boathouse was full of music at 18.24 on 1.8.24, hosting a Looe carnival week concert. Looe RNLI's One Crew mustered the evening before, to line the slipway, with the Albatross boathouse and the charity's Atlantic 85 Sheila and Dennis Tongue II as a backdrop. The D Class inshore lifeboat, Ollie Naismith II was on little beach. includes RNLI's Lifeboat photo Looe Operations Manager, David Haines, who. duty launch authority along with Bowdler, first volunteered back in 1992, when Looe Lifeboat Station was re-established. Joining David and Brian are senior helms

David Jackman and Toby Bray who joined the crew in the first year. The photograph also features the next generation of lifesavers with senior helm Clive Palfrey and his daughter Amber together with senior helm Matt Jaycock and his nephew Will. Amber and Will are carrying on the family tradition of volunteering as lifeboat crew.

In a co-incidence of timing, this current picture was taken 94 years to the day after our original lifeboat station was closed during the evening of 31 July 1930. David Haines says "It is great to see our current team lining the slipway, with some of the

original 1992/93 crew still volunteering with the station, alongside our latest volunteer crew, all continuing that early lifesaving tradition. This One Moment One Crew event allowed us to recognise and celebrate their contributions. We would like to thank them all for volunteering their valuable time to support RNLI Looe Lifeboat Station

Souvenir Shop: Subject to volunteer availability, and the weather, our souvenir shop is open daily between 11 am and 4pm. Our shop has a wide range of products, including Christmas cards and 2025 calendars. To commemorate the charity's 200th anniversary we have a selection of special souvenirs that have been carefully chosen and designed with our lifesaving heritage in mind for you to treasure for generations to come.

Albatross Boathouse: Our boathouse is open daily to the public and like our shop, subject to volunteer availability, operational requirements and the weather it will be open daily between 11 am and 4pm. Our team of volunteer boathouse guides will be on hand to show you the charity's inshore lifeboats and launch tractors. They can answer all your questions and tell you more about the RNLI, the Looe volunteer crew, our shouts and how to keep safe on the water.

Keeping safe on the coast

As we move into Autumn, the times and frequency of our SE Cornwall RNLI lifeguard patrols change. Patrols at Freathy have now finished for 2024, Patrols at Seaton, Tregantle and Sharrow will finish on 29 September. whilst Tregonhawke beach will be patrolled daily until 29 September, then only at weekends until 20 October and the final week of October half term when patrols finish for the year on 3 November. There have been several incidents with swimmers getting caught in rip currents. Please take notice of the red and yellow flags and follow the advice of the lifeguards when they are on duty. When there is no lifeguard cover on the beaches, please take extra care. Always Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help. If you need help or see someone in difficulties, call 999 and ask for the coastguard.

If you are on East Looe beach check the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.


Float to live:

However you end up in the water, if you get into trouble, remember to Float to Live. Cold water shock is our body's natural response to entering cold water and can very quickly lead to drowning. Floating, even for a short time, allows the effects of cold water shock to pass. It enables you to regain control of your breathing and your survival chances will greatly increase.

You can learn how to float following these five simple steps:

- 1. Tilt your head back, submerging your ears.
- 2. Relax and try to control your breathing.
- 3. Move your hands to help you stay affoat.
- 4. Your legs may sink but that's OK everyone floats differently.
- 5. Spread your arms and legs to improve your stability.

We actively encourage practising how to float in a safe environment. It's a lifesaving skill and having the confidence to float in a life or death situation could make all the difference.



If you see someone struggling in the water, fight your instinct to jump in and help. Stay on land and 999 and ask for the Coastguard at the coast, or Fire & Rescue when inland.

Tell the person in danger to float on their back and throw them something that floats, which they can use for buoyancy.

LOOE ISLAND NATURE RESERVE UPDATE





Our Pumpkin crop

So, as we enter autumn and the end of this season's trips the island is bountiful with apples, berries, seeds and crispy leaves. It's a time of year for harvesting from the wildlife friendly veg plots and this year we are pleased with the growth of some cracking

looking pumpkins! There are also multiple signs that nature is preparing itself for the colder months that lie ahead. We'll listen out for the piping calls of whimbrels as these long legged birds migrate south for the winter and watch out for flashes of the

white rumps of beautiful wheatears as they too head to warmer climes. The air is filled with the scent of flowering ivy - this plant attracts busily buzzing insects, hungrily filling

themselves up with nectar before supplies run out and winter falls over the island. Then there are the garden spiders – the dew clearly showing their carefully crafted webs. In summer the spiders mate and the females abdomens swell. Around now she'll lay eggs in a silky cocoon. Once laid, the female will not leave the eggs. In guarding the eggs she'll eventually die of hunger and cold... but if all goes to plan a mass of spiderlings will emerge next spring.

It's also a time to reflect and report on the visitor season that's passed.

Firstly thanks to all the recreational water users and commercial operators who have respected wildlife around the island. Giving wildlife space and consideration

when encountered on the water and not landing on the island will help wildlife thrive. Having said all that, this year there have been some very inquisitive young seals who have been approaching and interacting with us humans! Of course if a seal approaches a water user it's on the seal's terms – you are probably the most interesting thing they've seen that day! Still to make sure both us humans and seals remain safe, the advice is to stay calm, try to be 'boring' so that the seal loses interest and steadily move away. This way these

amazingly iconic animals will remain wild and won't be distracted from their natural routines and more essential behavior like feeding and resting. If you want to learn more, then there's LOTS of fascinating and useful information on the Cornwall Seal Group Research Trust's website

Now, to some very exciting and unusual bird sightings. Yes, white storks and great white egrets were both seen on the island this summer. Amazing! The white storks were first reported to us by local birder and regular island volunteer, Derek Spooner. He'd seen them on the mainland and gave us the heads up to look out for them along the coast.... so imagine our delight when a flock of 70 storks used

the thermals to gradually glide and swirl right over the island! Further investigations revealed that these birds were part of a rewilding and reintroduction project at Knepp in West Sussex. From the island the birds continued to head further west and would have been exploring their world and building knowledge to guide them towards migrating south for the winter. If you want to learn more check out Derek's excellent blog on the Looe Marine Conservation Group's website.

And the great white egrets? This was a brief but exciting chance encounter with these tall, yellow billed white birds. Clearly not little egrets (seen almost daily on the island's shores), these large egrets were spotted to the south east of the island and caused a rapid double take! They promptly flew off towards the south west – we are still waiting to hear if anyone else saw them? Were they also looking for a good southward passage for the winter? Still, a first for the island!

This year we've continued asking visitors to avoid parts of the main beach. Overall this has been a great success! Birds such as great black-backed gulls, cormorants and oystercatchers have often remained, resting undisturbed for long periods on the island's shores. There have, of course still been cases when the birds have been spooked and flown off but they have eventually returned to the beach as they learn that it's a 'safe' area. Overall as well as being a good

undisturbed place for the birds, it means more people get to enjoy the sight of plenty of wildlife in a wild place! So again, thank you to everyone who has helped the island's wildlife to thrive.

Now, as you'd expect we continue to monitor all the island's wildlife and this includes butterflies and moths. Overall this year hasn't been the best for insects. We hope it's just a blip due to the poor weather this summer. However, as always in late summer/early autumn we record large numbers of boldy coloured red admirals – they never seem to let us down! Masses of these butterflies can be seen feeding on sweet smelling flowering ivy. Numbers of red admirals are boosted during the summer by migrants from continental Europe – the thought of which is very impressive - imagine such small and delicate insects making such a long journey! Then, it seems that this species is increasingly over wintering here – meaningly that they are often one of the first and last butterflies spotted each year.

To wrap up, remember that every year public trips to the island end late September/early October. Over the winter the wardens can catch up on lots of maintenance and admin tasks.... all ready to prepare for re-opening around Easter 2025! 

Where we are....

completed their final training row in their ocean rowing boat named Catch of the Day on Sunday 22nd September. The conditions were ideal with calm seas and light winds and spirits were high! Although it was noted that these were not conditions we expected to experience a lot of during the Atlantic campaigns, Worlds Toughest row Atlantic challenge, leaving from La Gomera, Tenerife on 12 December 2024.

The final row was a row from Looe to Fowey and back, with a pit stop in Polruan and a cheeky pint at the Lugger. It was the final opportunity to ensure that all equipment worked as expected, with a focus on the auto helm directing us according to the waypoints plotted by Skipper Nat. The crew also took the opportunity to sample some of the snacks from our food sponsor which included Biltong and beef jerky from Hunters and flapjacks from SOAK'd OATS. All got the big thumbs up which is not surprising given the crews' focus on food!

On this row we took the full weight of our recent Tentmeals delivery, who are proving the bulk of the main meals and breakfasts for the row and the recently stocked medical kit provided by local GPs Emma and Dale Staff. We also took the opportunity to trial our new water containers to ensure they were robust enough for the challenge with a potential weak spot being the tap mechanism.

Kim trialled her ablution routine and all the crew ensured they were familiar with the jet boil, the sole way of heating water for hot drinks and to hydrate the Tentmeals.

The majority of spend has now taken place and the outstanding big-ticket items are the shipping cost, Comms package and final repairs and maintenance items.

How we feel.....

The motto is scared and prepared and at least two of us were feeling emotional at the thought of this being the last training row, with the next row being the pre-race qualifying row in La Gomera itself.

We are all extremely excited to have got this far and even more focused on getting to the start line. However, we all realise the immensity and scale of this challenge and are extremely grateful for the support received to date from friends, family, sponsors, and the public. We have met



some fantastically interesting individuals on this journey so far, as well as getting to understand each other's quirks!

What next?

There will be a degree of relief when Catch of the Day ships out to La Gomera from Rannock in Essex at the beginning of October, with the remainder of the time before race start being focused on strength and fitness.

Efforts will be focused on raising additional sponsorship to fund the challenge as well as the fundraising efforts to support the RNLI.

Old Guildhall Museum & Gaol - FANCY A PINT?



We are approaching the end of a busy and successful season. I know that the weather has had a detrimental effect on many people's businesses but the rain seemed to work to our advantage. Still, would have been good to see a bit more sunshine though....

Our pubs and hospitality sectors have taken a hammering over the last few years and the proposed outside smoking ban is another blow to them. I started to think about the inns & taverns that Looe has gained and lost over the centuries.

Here is my A to Z guide to East Looe drinking establishments:

The Admiral Boscarn - Built as a private house in 1870, Boscarn House became an hotel in the 1920s and in later years the pub we know today.

Britannia- Tricky. Is this the original name of The Fisherman's Arms? 1830- William Ball, landlord.

The Bullers - Still a private residence of the Buller family in 1798. Definitely a pub by 1822, possibly as early as 1808.

Church House/The Old Vicarage- These houses were once a tavern, I don't know the name or dates. Can anyone enlighten me?

The Fisherman's Arms- Known as The Red Lion from 1839, name changed to The Fisherman's Arms in 1856. Was this the Britannia mentioned in 1830? The building dates back to the early 1600s as a private house.

The Globe Inn- A relative new-comer, first referenced in 1873 but originally a private dwelling. Ideally located for the new passenger railway trade.

King's Head - I believe that this was the "Mountain Warehouse" building, originally the Queen's Head from 1791/ 1823-ish then King's Head from 1830-ish to 1847. Gone by 1851.

The Pier Inn - I found a reference from 1808 with Thomas Rowett landlord. I believe it was on the harbour at an old pier or jetty, near "Pier One Cafe" today?

The Salutation Inn - Already an inn in 1791, not sure when it first opened but its proximity to the harbour makes it a prime spot for many a drunken sailor....

The Ship Inn - An old Royal Mail coaching inn, the main road into Looe was along the cliffs and into town via Castle Street and Tower Hill area so it was situated at a busy location. It is referenced in 1791 but certainly earlier.

The Swan Inn - A document from 1748 already has it as a public house and it has continued to be so with accommodation for the weary traveller for much of the time. A name change to Looe Hotel in 1888, then back to The Swan and now to The Black Swan, it is still with us.

Right, see you in the pub. I would like a chilled glass of dry white wine and a bag of salt and vinegar crisps please and I really don't mind if you have a smoke outside.

NEWS FROM EAST LOOE TOWN TRUST

Usually at this time of year, we reflect over the summer season and look forward to autumn, however the weather has appeared somewhat confused this year and we didn't have the sunny weather that we associate with summer days on the

beach. However, it was good to see people enjoying the beach and seafront this year – even if the weather wasn't what was expected. Looe Beach Hire Activities have continued to provide excellent services on the beach with the ever popular Octopus roundabout and kayak hire along with the traditional hire of deckchairs, sun loungers and windbreaks.

The Old Guildhall Museum and Gaol is open until the end of October – please do call in and learn about the history of our town. The museum is run by a team of volunteers who are there to welcome you and tell you about the museum but there is also a team of volunteers who work more in the background, doing research, compiling displays and going through documents and artefacts. This work continues through the winter – so if you are interested in Looe history and can spare a couple of hours a week then please contact the museum and join our volunteer team.

Our team are also working hard to continue the conservation and ecology work on the Wooldown – ably assisted by Kernow Ecology. The aim is to continue the good work with the bee glades and to continue to provide an excellent habitat for wildlife and also to keep it accessible and enjoyable for humans and their four-legged friends

As you will have seen, The Watchtower and Old Lifeboat Station are still hiding behind their screen of scaffolding – although this is starting to come down now. Work is progressing inside, with the pointing well under way. Some interesting features have been found inside the building, including one of the original gas lamp fittings on the wall. The team writing the on-line history of the building are researching some of the features discovered and are hoping to be able to provide a full history of the building. The on-line digital history will be available to all, free of charge and will be available at the end of the project (Spring 2025). There will also be a heritage walk to encourage people to be out and about and maybe see Looe from a different angle. Maintaining our local heritage is a key part of our work and we are proud to do it.



Riverside United Church

The Quay, West Looe, PL13 2BU



The first chapel in Looe was founded by Sir Harry Trelawny, a Cornish eccentric, who converted to Congregationalism and built a chapel in West Looe Square in 1777. After he returned to the Church of England he pulled down his chapel, but his flock built another in 1797 on the site of the present Riverside Church. The present building was built by the thriving worshiping community in 1881 and has considerable historic interest.

Easily found from the A38 and then the A387 and just 20 miles from Plymouth. It is one of the earliest united churches in the country, when in 1966 two Methodist chapels in Looe as well as the Congregational Church (now URC) decided to come together as Riverside United Church.

In 1995 Riverside was completely refurbished when the old pews downstairs were removed and replaced by comfortable seating that can be arranged so that better use can be made of the sanctuary area. The pipe organ was also removed and we now have a very fine digital organ that sounds amazing. Riverside has the largest seating capacity of any building at sea level in Looe and excellent acoustics, so Riverside is used for a variety of concerts throughout the year.

The church is more than the building, the people and atmosphere at Riverside is special.







LOWER QUAY FISHERMEN'S STORES

DEMOLITION AND REBUILD PROJECT

Following months of 'behind the scenes' work by the project team, Looe Harbour Commissioners will be starting an exciting new project on 16th September 2024.

The aim of this project is to demolish and sympathetically rebuild the fishermen's stores on Lower quay, East Looe to service the needs of our fishing fleet.

The stores are fully occupied and LHC currently have a list of active fishermen waiting for stores to become available. The stores were built in the 1950s and are of a very basic construction with asbestos roofing. The doors, windows and rooves of the stores, are now in a poor state, and effective repairs are unable to be actioned. These stores are vital to our fishing community as they provide the only ground floor storage facility in the Port close to the waterside, where larger items (such as trawl doors and crab pots) can be stored when not in use.

As the site is in an area that is open to the public and one which gets very congested during peak season, it has been agreed that works would commence on 16th September 2024 when the area will be quieter and therefore a safer work environment.

The project is expected to be completed by March 2025.

Emergency access through the site will be maintained for Emergency Services. Harbour staff will do their best to minimise disruption to businesses and private dwellings on Lower Quay.

LOOE GOLF CLUB


Looe Ladies held their Open recently. 30 ladies from Looe entered and were pleased to welcome 34 ladies from visiting clubs around Cornwall & Devon.
