



Float to live

However you end up in the water, if you get into trouble, remember to Float to Live. Cold water shock is our body's natural response to entering cold water and can very quickly lead to drowning. Floating, even for a short time, allows the effects of cold-water shock to pass. It enables you to regain control of your breathing and your survival chances will greatly increase.

If you see someone struggling in the water, fight your instinct to jump in and help. Stay on land and 999 and ask for the Coastguard at the coast, or Fire & Rescue when inland. Tell the person in danger to float on their back and throw them something that floats, which they can use for buoyancy. Find out more at https://respectthewater.com/



Keeping safe on the coast:

RNLI lifeguard cover returns to Tregonhawke beach for the Easter holidays from 5 April to 21 April, then weekends until 3 May when daily patrols between 10 am and 6 pm start. Seaton, Tregantle and Sharrow beaches will have daily patrols from 17 May between 10 am and 6 pm. Patrols will return to Freathy beach for weekends and bank holidays on 19 July. If you are on a lifeguarded beach please swim and bodyboard in the supervised areas marked out by red and yellow flags, and when there are no lifeguards on duty, it is more important than ever to Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help.

If you are on East Looe beach, check the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.

Open water / cold water swimming: Open Water Swimming is becoming more popular around our coasts - whether you're swapping the swimming pool for open water or just enjoying a quick dip, please take care. Safety information can be found on the RNLI website:

LOOE GREEN ENERGY COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

Our progress on the Coastguard Flats is agonisingly slow and frustrating. We've been held up by paperwork and legal requirements for over a year, but we are starting to get it all settled, at last. While sorting all the documents and demands, we've been working on ideas for Green Energy generation on the building.

We are now running a full Community Consultation in Looe to ask residents for their opinions on the following:

• **New windows:** The current windows are single-glazed and aren't original. We want to replace them with timber sash windows, much closer to the original design and double glazed for energy saving.

• **Solar panels on the rear roof:** We first looked into panels on the front roof and front garden, but they would be massively intrusive in the Looe townscape, so we've decided against. Instead, we want to put panels on the rear of the roof, completely hidden from public view, to give us some solar electricity.

• Air source heat pumps: We want to install these in the yard to the rear of the building, to provide greener heating. These would be completely invisible from the town. Our consultation looks like this:

• Open for 4 weeks to April 26th

• Öpen Day at the flats too show our ideas: Saturday 12th April, 11.00 am – 2.00pm



LOOE'S LUGGER REGATTA RETURNS THIS JULY and it promises to be bigger and better than ever before.

After the Covid-enforced hiatus, the 2023 reunion of famous old fishing boats attracted a slightly disappointing entry, partly because the most suitable tides were in May and that proved too early in the sailing season for many of the likely participants.

New Lugger chairman David Darlington and his vice-chairman Jonathan Brice, who used to be secretary in the Looe-based Cornish Lugger Association's early years, knew something had to change, especially since at least eight of the traditional lug-rigged fishing boats have been 'lost' (either retired or scrapped) in the past decade. Clearly without action the very future of the regatta was in doubt, since many of the remaining boats, several of them built in Looe, are now more than 100 years ago and the cost of their upkeep continues to rise year-on-year.



FAITHFUL FRIENDS: Hoping to swell numbers at July's Looe Lugger Classics regatta will be a dozen or more of the East Devon Luggers from Beer. No longer fullyengaged in fishing – they were once employed in driftnetting, long-lining, crabbing and even smuggling! – these traditional clinker-built, chunky, beach boats now amuse themselves with weekend races



Armed with that disheartening situation, the new lugger committee has embarked on something of an event re-brand but it will still focus heavily on the old fishing boats whose town regattas can be traced back to 1911. This year's event, over the July 25-27 weekend, has been re-titled the Looe Lugger Classics with the entry no longer restricted to Cornish luggers. Those remaining grand old ladies of the sea will continue to take centre-stage, of course. Their owners, skippers and crews fondly remember the days when huge fleets of

Cornish, Brittany, Isle of Man and Scottish fishing fleets – fished off the Cornish coast, working long lines, deep out in the English Channel, for conger, ray, turbot and the like, or shooting miles of drift nets to catch pilchards, once the mainstay of the country's fishing industry.

But this year the lugger numbers will be buoyed by a varied fleet of other sailing boats, all of which also embrace the spirit of tradition. Looe's re-invigorated heritage reunion – which will also include the Madein-Looe Regatta, championing the port's rich boatbuilding history – will feature a series of events in the bay and on the river over the Saturday and Sunday, and will welcome modern replicas and old gaffers as well as the luggers.

The weekend will be followed by a 'Rest Day' in harbour on the Monday (July 28) after which the fleet will have an opportunity to feed into Fowey Classics rally on the Tuesday. Moorings and facilities have again been provided by the Looe Harbour Commissioners, whose continued generosity allows the regatta to thrive in the beautiful environs of the Cornish fishing port and holiday resort.

Plans for this year's Lugger Classics are evolving and include an event village on

West Looe Quay, with live music on two stages over three nights featuring sea shanties, rock bands, choirs and acoustic troubadours. A licensed bar, barbecue and other food outlets will be available and quayside attractions include talks on heritage maritime topics, with pictorial exhibits; an artist in residence; crab-pot and oar making demonstrations, and a model boat display.

For the first time this year, the regatta will also be part of the West Country Classics Series, incorporating similar summer events in Dartmouth, Falmouth and Fowey.

Spring has now sprung – although the weather may not always agree!

For East Looe Town Trust and the hard-working team of volunteers at the Museum this means it is time to open the doors of the Museum to the public again. The Museum is housed in the original Grade 2* listed Guildhall building on Higher Market Street – now known as the Guildhall Museum and Gaol. The building is often referred to as being the Museum's greatest artefact. It was built in 1450 and was used as the East Looe Town Hall and Magistrates Court between 1587 and 1878. When you visit – take time to note the pillories at the entrance and the wonderful timber framed roof. The Museum is spread over two floors – the main

entrance is up some granite steps from Higher Market Street which takes you into the first floor. The staircase will take you to the lower floor where the cells are. Are you brave enough to go inside and see if you meet the resident ghost Jennifer? For those visitors who are less mobile, we do have ramp access to the ground floor on Middle Market Street. East Looe Town Trust maintain the building so that the dedicated volunteers can provide such an interesting Museum for the town – why not come and visit?



East Looe Town Trust also own and maintain the Wooldown – this is nearly 20 acres of former farmland that we now maintain as open access recreational space for humans as well as flora and fauna. It is not a suburban park but a piece of Cornish countryside that provides a haven for nature. We provide litterbins and dog poo bins which are emptied and the waste disposed of at our cost – please do use the bins or take your rubbish home with you.

Did you know that since 2016 there has been a bee glade project ongoing? The habitat is managed to encourage bees but particularly the endangered longhorned mining bee. Kernow Ecology have been invaluable in this project with their advice and physical work on the glades. Every year Country Conservation assist us with their remote-controlled flail mower to cut back the overgrowth of bracken and bramble – a very impressive bit of kit!



One of the interesting things on the Wooldown is the wartime Observation point. What you call this informally probably depends on your age – either the Thrup'ny bit or the 50p bit. It was placed here as the best place to observe the coastline – if you have time, look out to see and see if you can identify the villages around the coastline and the ships heading to and from Plymouth. Imagine what you would have seen from here during WW2.

Also on the Wooldown you will see the cannons and the beacon. The cannons are

not functional but were created and placed there in 2005, along with the beacon, to mark Trafalgar Day. The beacon, due to it's nature, does need regular attention and was replaced in the last few years – thanks to the apprentices at Babcock in Plymouth. The beacon has been lit for special occasions and the next time will be to mark 80 years since VE Day.

Looe Shedders is delighted to announce that a project it's been working on for several months, a playground tractor, was delivered to Trenode Primary School on Wednesday 5th March. It was brought to the school in parts and assembled in the playground before pupils rushed out to play on it.

> "We're just extremely grateful to Looe Shedders that they've been able to create such a wonderful piece of equipment for our school. We love the fact that you can't buy this in a catalogue," said Bethany Pike, the School's Head. "The children know the community has contributed to it and I think that's something really special. We're just very fortunate with having the link to it being a tractor and being such a small rural school with farming families. That's why our children are going to absolutely love it."

Almost all of the tractor was made with recycled materials donated by local people. This includes composite decking and all of the wood. The large back wheels came from a cable drum from the Looe Harbour Commission and the steering wheels (two of them!) came from ride-on-mowers. Most of the paint was donated by Ronseal.

The tractor took so long to build because Looe Shedders doesn't have its own shed. As a result, it can only meet a couple of times a month in Looe's St Martin's Community Hall and any messy work has to be done outside, at the

mercy of the weather. Work was also hampered by the theft of a large amount of tools in November 2024.

Looe Shedders has launched a "New Home" campaign to address this issue. It's looking for land on which it could build a shed or an existing building that could be adapted for its use. "Having our own shed would be a game-changer," said Chris Roy, Looe Shedders' chairman. "It would mean we could meet more often and work on projects regardless of the weather. And that would encourage more people to join Looe Shedders." Can you help? http://www.looeshedders.co.uk/newhome

"As things stand it could take us years to deal with our current waiting list and we're having to turn down requests for some projects," said Chris Roy.

OLD GUILDHALL MUSEUM & GAOL, EAST LOOE



A Devastating Account of Loss and Turmoil

Attacks by Privateers, or Pirates, were a problem for centuries for sea-faring vessels. Many of these gangs had their own Governments backing and the rest operated as private individuals. From the16th century to about 1815 pirates from the areas we know today as Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia were the greatest problem to south-west vessels. These men were known as Turks, Barbary Corsairs or Pirates and Sallee Pirates.

A change in the politics in that area from 1603 resulted in a rise of piracy and kidnappings but the spring of 1625 saw an upsurge of attacks. Complaints made in Plymouth reported the seizure of over 1,000 men from south-western coastal ports and at sea. The Sallee Pirates sailed in fleets of about 25 ships and were ruthless, taking both men and their ships or boats. In spring of 1625 East and West Looe lost 80 mariners and sailors.

The loss of these men who were "bound in fishing voyages for the deeps", left half of Looe's remaining vessels unmanned. A letter of 25th April noted the "pitiful lamentation of the wives and children for their husbands and fathers is grievous."

On 10th August 1625 the Cornish Justices, citing a petition from East and West Looe, Polperro and Fowey, warned that the inhabitants of these places had "the benefit of their fishing to be taken away from them by which they are sustained".

William Harris and 14 other men from Looe (with 7 or 8 other Englishmen) were taken prisoner by a Turkish ship in 1628. After two weeks they managed to overthrow their captors and sailed to St. Ives but six of these men died in the brutal fight.

In 1636 Cornish JPs petitioned the King after the loss of eight boats and 30 men from East and West Looe, "The said towns are not only impoverished, but by means of the wives and children of these poor captives are so surcharged as they are likely to fall into great decay". It was reported that 69 men were taken in two years.

Between 1631 and 1640 14 Cornish vessels were taken into Algiers; four were from Looe. A letter from 1640 makes a reference to men taken from Looe but by this date the attacks were reducing. For many years though, along the coast, fishermen were afraid to go to sea and even those who wanted to found that there were not enough men left to man the boats.

Thankfully the resilience of the communities and families was strong enough to pull through but those were certainly dark days.



Victory in Europe (VE) Day 80th Anniversary:

On 30th April 1945, Hitler committed suicide, and on the 4th May the German Forces in Northern Europe surrendered to Field Marshall Montgomery. Three days later the Supreme Allied Commander, General Eisenhower, formally accepted the unconditional surrender of all German forces. The capitulation came into force the next day, 8th May, which was called VE Day and declared a UK national holiday. Yet the joy and relief were tempered by memories of the hundreds of thousands who had died, or were still missing, and concern for those still fighting the Japanese in the Far East until the August (VJ Day).

Now, 80 years on, this is our last chance to remember VE Day whilst that are still a few alive who fought in that terrible conflict. Our government has not declared the 80th anniversary of VE Day a national holiday as three days earlier, Monday, 5th May, is the Early May Bank Holiday. Looe Town Council have decided they will be the lead in the town's VE 80 commemoration, and we await their plan of events. For our part, Looe Royal British Legion will have a stall in the Guildhall Rose Garden on Saturday 3rd May collecting for the Poppy Appeal (a poppy is not just for November). Please come along and say hello and perhaps take a photograph with our unique Poppy Man. We plan to be there from 10:00 until 3:00pm. We are also hoping to arrange other events for VE Day, please visit keep an eye on our Facebook page for updates.

Visit to HMS Raleigh:

In February a group of our members visited HMS Raleigh which is the biggest Royal Navy establishment in the South West. It provides comprehensive training programs that equip new recruits with the essential skills and knowledge needed for a successful naval career. The invite to visit the establishment was given by RN Warrant Officer Kirk McCaffer who has ties with Looe and laid a wreath at the Looe War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday. Our members were treated to a very informative and entertaining day culminating in a launch trip up the Tamar, passing



the Dockyard and returning at speed. Our members thoroughly enjoyed their visit and presented HMS Raleigh with a British Legion plaque (see photograph). On their return trip to Looe the group managed a stop at the Elliot Arms, St Germans for a thorough 'assessment' of the day. The Royal British Legion is an organisation which aims to remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice and to raise money for those who have been left disadvantaged by their time in service. Obviously, many of our members are exservice personnel but our membership is open to everyone with the same ideals and objectives as ourselves. Our collections for the National Poppy Appeal totally go to fund our stated objectives. Why not come along to one of our friendly and informal meetings and get to know us. We always hold our meetings on the first Monday of the month, come rain, snow or New Year's Day. They start at 7:30pm sharp in the ground floor bar of the Looe Social Club, West Looe Quay. 

LOOE HARBOUR COMMISSIONERS

Looe Harbour Commissioners (LHC) were delighted to hear at the end of 2024, that their Multi Project grant application to Round 3 of the UK Seafood Infrastructure Scheme, had been successful. Against a total project cost of £870,000 + vat, the maximum grant of £500,000 was awarded, with LHC using reserves to fund the balance of the project.

The Multi Bid project includes:

- Works to Harbour Refrigeration facilities
- Replacement of 300 soft wood commercial mooring fenders with hardwood fenders.
- Replacement of 66 quayside ladders
- Replacement of the Forklift Truck and safety Platform
- Upgrade of the Harbour CCTV system
- · Lower Quay Stores demolition and rebuild.

It is anticipated that all projects will be completed by 31st March 2025.

LHC foresee a future in the fishing industry and are keen to invest in projects that will maintain our fishing community for generations to come. By investing in the Port, it will ensure that fishing remains a viable community resource, which ultimately will benefit the local economy. We apologise for any inconveniences that have occurred whilst these works are being carried out.

Please be advised that in the near future an ANPR system will be installed in Buller Quay car park, East Looe. There will also be the ability for customers to top-up their car parking (if they over-run their stay) before vacating the car park.

Any contractors will need to report to the Harbour office/Harbour Patrol on arrival.

Following several requests, the 50p ½ hour parking charge is being re-introduced to benefit short-stay customers. At the same time, the £2 overnight parking charge (6pm to 8am) will be removed and standard charges will apply between these hours.

Locals may apply for a 'Locals Overnight Parking Permit' if they wish to use the LHC car parks between the hours 6pm to 9am. Further details are available by contacting the Harbour office on 01503 262839 or email: <u>reception@looeharbour.com</u>.

These changes will occur following installation of the new equipment, which is expected towards the end of April.

The Harbour team have continued to support the Beyond Paradise film crew, as they prepare for a new series that is expected to be released in the Spring.

LHC continue to manage the Looe Defibrillator Project and have worked with the Seafarers Hospital Society to deliver lifesaving first aid training to the skippers and crew of our local fleet. The package also provided free defibrillators to commercial vessels with more than two crew, in addition to trauma and bleed kits for all commercially registered vessels. The success of this project in Looe, has meant that the project has been delivered in several other ports in the country.

The LHC team are now working hard to prepare for the forthcoming season, and we look forward to welcoming both regular customers and visitors to the Harbour area.

Marker Buoys Deployed to Protect Looe Island's Marine Life

To better protect Looe Island's Atlantic grey seals and wildlife, Looe Marine Conservation Group

(LMCG) has deployed two marker buoys to help reduce wildlife disturbance caused by kayaks, paddleboards, motorboats and jet skis. Situated between the Ranneys, and positioned 100 metres from exposed rocks, the buoys do not establish a controlled zone or restrict access, but serve as an important visual reminder to water users to follow Defra's Marine and Coastal Wildlife Code.

The project was part funded by LMCG and driven by the dedication of LMCG volunteer Cliff Davies. His work, in collaboration with the Looe hub of Cornwall Seal Group Research Trust, Looe Harbour Commission and Natural England, ensured successful deployment of the buoys earlier this month. The project is attracting global interest for its innovative approach, combining advanced technologies to protect the seabed while enhancing marine biodiversity. By integrating the Seaflex Mermaid-K Advanced Mooring System (AMS) and Reef-Cube® anchorage, the initiative minimises environmental impact while encouraging the growth of marine life.

Our projects have ranged from helping clean up Looe's bathing water quality, to introducing the Crab Line Recycling Scheme (run totally by our volunteers), to helping rid Looe of the practice of throwing water balloons at festivals. As well as our projects, we run our annual programme of beach cleans, rockpool rambles, talks and pop up events that benefit tourism. However, to date we've relied solely on donations and membership fees. LMCG now needs to find sponsorship and seek community support to sustain our conservation efforts. 

Spring is just around the corner and everybody at Looe Rowing Club seems to have a spring in their step too! This is because cold dark nights are gradually giving way to lighter evenings and that rarest of things, the sun, has been spotted, making the odd appearance through the clouds. And as everyone at the Club knows, longer, warmer days can mean only one thing. Racing Season is almost upon us!

A busy few weeks have seen the Club welcome back our Oars of Thunder rowers from their incredible adventure crossing the Atlantic, with a procession up the river with gig rowers from the club and an escort by the lifeboats from the RNLI. This was followed by coffee and cake at the Sailing Club...



And we have also taken part in our first competitive race of the year! On 8th March Looe took four teams to compete in the annual curtain raiser to the gig racing calendar: The 3 Rivers Race hosted by Caradon Gig Club. 3 Rivers is the longest race of the year for many of our rowers and. at 10km long, it is always a little bit of a shock to the system after the long winter months of racing inactivity. As the name suggests the course is

set on the Tamar, the Tavy and the Lynner rivers. It starts at the Tamar Bridge, follows the river up to the River Tavy before a series of turns takes us all the way back down to the Lynner, before turning again and finishing back under the Tamar Bridge.

All our crews had impressive results racing against a very strong field of 91 other teams from all across the South West. LOOE FLOOD DEFENCE AND REGENERATION SCHEME

The current stage of the Looe Flood Defence and Regeneration Scheme, to develop a recommended solution to reduce flood risk and enable regeneration in Looe has been successfully completed.


We would like to thank everyone who has been involved with the project for their contribution to this work.

Whilst completion of this phase marks a significant milestone for the project, work on delivering the scheme is dependent on securing external funding.

Changes in the national political and financial landscape, leading to reviews of a number of current national major infrastructure projects and significant uncertainty over the level of funding available for future projects, means that it is not currently possible to identify the sources of funding needed to take the recommended Tidal Barrier and Breakwaters option forward at this time.

While this is disappointing, the detailed work which has taken place to bring the scheme to this stage means that the project is in a strong position to move forward if the national picture changes and the funding needed to deliver the scheme becomes available.

In the meantime, the Environment Agency will be assessing the flood protection elements of the scheme this year with the aim of including some of the measures in the EA's next programme.

LOOE FESTIVAL OF WORDS



Who knew, a little over a year ago, that a casual conversation at a West Looe Christmas Market would turn into a new weeklong festival? That was how Looe Festival of Words began.

With an organising group of just seven people, with varying amounts of experience, we were able to put together a week of workshops, talks, walks, pop ups, and a bookfair in just nine months. I don't think we realised how popular it would be until we saw how quickly the tickets were booked, how long some of the waiting lists were, and the wonderfully positive feedback we received. So here we are, organising another for 2025.

Much of the groundwork is already done (the necessary admin like policy writing and establishing our aims and boundaries) and we're brimming with ideas for the programme. But there's still much to do in the planning stages: sourcing funding, booking venues, producing publicity, to name a few.

And why do we still want to do it? Especially when there are so many literary festivals in Cornwall?

The first thing is that we deliberately called it Looe Festival of Words. This is an event for anyone who loves words, as a reader or a writer. Last year we covered poetry, fiction, nonfiction, and TV production. This year, following the feedback, we're hoping to expand to script writing, performance, an exhibition, and competitions.

Our tagline is "by the community, for the community." We deliberately picked our dates just after the music and food festivals to help extend the Shoulder Season and bring more people into our town.

Like those other festivals, we encourage our visitors to make the most of our fabulous shops and eateries while they're here.

We don't want a festival that's all talks and celebrity authors. We want this to be about the wonderful local creative talent we have in the Looe Valley and its environs, to encourage and showcase what's already happening here. That's why we loved having Looe Marine Conservation Group run Poetry on the Rocks last year, for example. And we're extremely grateful to the support we've received in funding and venue provision, from organisations like Looe Development Trust, the Harbour Commissioners, the Millpool Centre, and Looe Library and Community Hub.

We're hoping to have more support this year, especially as three of our committee have had to stand down. Can you help in any of these ways?
