A Message from Mayor Cllr Stephen Remington:

I'm so pleased to have a chance to contribute to Looe Community News and tell you a bit about what I've been up to since I became Mayor in May. It's been a whirlwind of council meetings and events across Cornwall, all aimed at ensuring your Town Council runs efficiently, legally, and in the town's best interest!



Our Planning Committee, chaired by Cllr James Lundy, is guardian of the Neighbourhood Development Plan and reviews all local applications (73 last year alone) ensuring they meet planning criteria before advising Cornwall Council, which agrees with our recommendations about 75% of the time.

The Finance & Strategy Committee, chaired by Cllr Simon Barker, keeps a close eye on income and expenditure to ensure the best value for money we can achieve and, of course, balance the books. It also reviews all the many policies that any well run local government organisation needs to have in place.

Meanwhile, **The Services, Assets and Communities Committee**, chaired by Cllr Jon Holmes, oversees facilities like the wonderful Library & Community Hub and our five (sometimes tricky!) public toilet sites. We've also launched a "Looe's Loos" FAQ and working group to help address your concerns, available to view on our town council website.

Now for the fun bits! I've had the pleasure of attending many events, including Looe in Bloom's Organisation of the Year Award, Looe Youth Theatre's ***Peter Pan the Musical***, visiting the new Looe Greenspace Allotment Project, re-opening of Quirky's Boutique & Vintage and The Old Lifeboat House, a wet but fascinating search for Seagrass with Looe Marine Conservation Group, a creative workshop at Looe Community Academy, presenting the annual awards at Sheila's School of Dancing and the Looe Lugger Classics awards and judging the annual Carnival Parade. These are just a few of Looe's wonderful community organisations each one showcasing the amazing spirit of our town. I'll be taking a couple of breaks in August and September, with Deputy Mayor Jamie Pearn stepping in while I keep in touch through the wonders of the internet! Huge thanks to my fellow Councillors, who volunteer their time, and to our hardworking officer team, led by Town Clerk Sam White, who keep everything running smoothly.

LOOE FESTIVAL OF WORDS



After a very successful debut in 2024, the Looe Festival of Words will be returning this October. So, pick up your pens, open your ears and prepare to be entertained, amused, regaled, fascinated, entranced and captivated by local writers, poets and historians in venues around the town.

Running from October 1st to 5th the festival is a celebration of words, not just books, so as well as readings, workshops and a bookfair, there will also be a rockpool ramble with local children's author Ellie Jackson, a talk on creating content for digital media, a literary walk and much more.



This year's Bookfair will take place at the Hannaford Point Hotel, giving both stallholders and visitors more room to browse the books and chat to the authors. There's already a varied list of attendees planned, with more expected as we move closer to the event. Alongside the Bookfair there will be a couple of workshop/talks, broadening the spectrum of what we can do with words.

With the Festival still two months away, the list of events is still to be finalised, but already confirmed (as well as those mentioned above) are a book quiz, a poetry evening, an evening of ghost stories, a couple of writing workshops and a talk about the village of Trelooe. There will also be trails throughout the town, with children tasked to discover where the Festival's cheeky seagull is nesting, plus hidden books. You might even find authors popping up in bookshops at random times?

The organisers have tried to make the Festival accessible to all, with events taking place in venues such as the Hannaford Point Hotel, Looe Library and Community Hub, the Heritage Centre and the Millpool Centre amongst others. This has come about through working closely with bodies like Looe Town Council, Looe Harbour Commissioners and Looe Development Trust, and supported by FEAST, East and West Looe Town Trusts and the Welcome to Looe and Polperro website.

Shouts: Our crew at Looe have been ready to answer the pager and rescue those in difficulty. Between 21 May 2025 and 20 July 2025 our volunteer crews responded to 7 shouts.

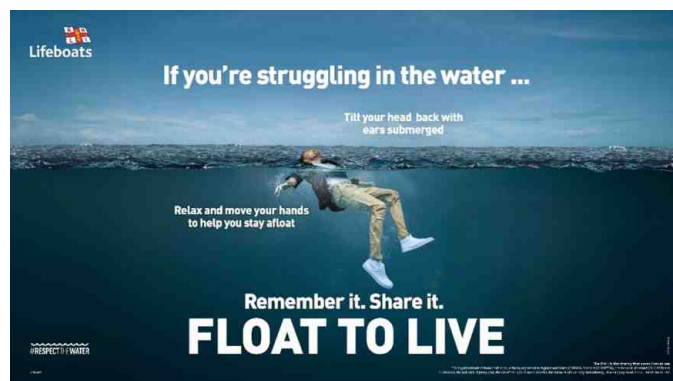
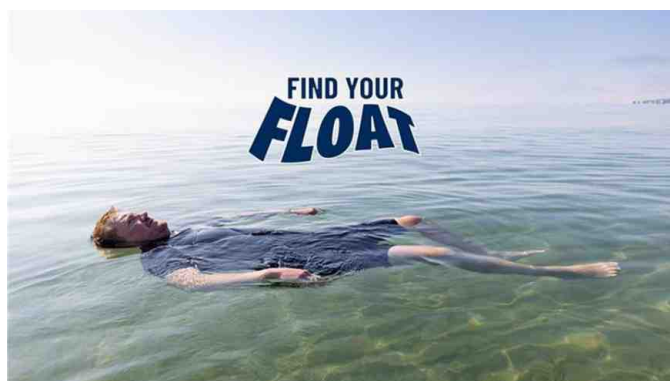

Find your float

Do you know how to [#FloatToLive?](#) This World Drowning Prevention Day, we want everyone to practise and [#FindYourFloat](#).

In a safe, lifeguarded location:

- Tilt your head back with ears submerged
- Relax and try to breathe normally
- Move your hands and legs to help you stay afloat
- It's ok if your legs sink, we all float differently
- Once you're over the initial shock, call for help or swim to safety

Remember it. Practise it. Share it.

Keeping safe on the coast

Our SE Cornwall RNLI lifeguard team are watching over Tregonhawke, Seaton, Tregantle, Sharrow and Freathy beaches with daily patrols between 10 am and 6 pm. If you are on a lifeguarded beach please swim and bodyboard in the supervised areas marked out by red and yellow flags, and when there are no lifeguards on duty, it is more important than ever to Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help

If you are on East Looe beach, check the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.

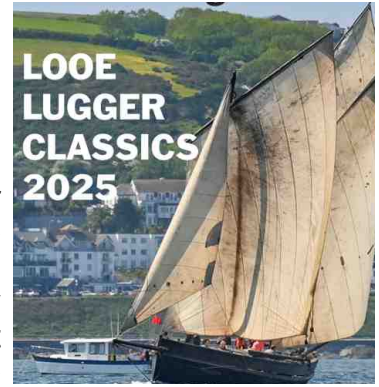
Open water / cold water swimming

LOOE LUGGER CLASSICS

New Chairman of the Cornish Lugger Association Dave Darlington said the success of the 2025 edition of the Looe Lugger Classics needed just two words: "Thank You." The shipwright and former charter skipper was looking much more relaxed than at any time during the past week as all the hours of hard work and draft in overseeing both the three-day regatta 'village' on West Looe Quay and being a drummer in some of the bands on stage, were brought to a fitting conclusion. "I say 'thank you' because without you, the skippers and your boats, we would have no regatta, let alone one like this has been, that seems to have been enjoyed by everyone in the town and all the visitors; it's been superb" he said.

Like so many other Looe born and bred young people, the Chairman now lives outside the town, in Pensilva, but his love of 'home' was clearly evident, and his prizegiving speech was echoed by the Mayor of Looe, Stephen Remington, who said that the Luggers had once again shone a spotlight on the rich maritime heritage of the town and port and it was crucial that the legacy was maintained. "May it never end" he said.



Racing

While the new, youthful Lugger committee was rightly on the receiving end of plaudits from far and wide, the festival itself could not have been staged without the full support of Looe Harbour Commissioners, the Harbourmaster Tina Hicks, her deputy David Jackman and their staff, plus the backing and co-operation of West Looe Town Trust, East Looe Town Trust, Looe Development Trust, Looe Town Council and Looe Sailing Club. It was the full encouragement from those authorities that has buoyed the organisers and spurred them on to keeping alive the tradition of old fishing boats and the part played in the historical fabric of the town.

As well as three sailing races in the bay – and the most wonderful daily sight of the fleet at anchor off the Banjo Pier, something not witnessed by the port for many decades – there was the Andy Brice organised full live music programme, supervised by sound technicians Sam Darlington, Luke Parsley and their team; Ashley Bussell's thought-provoking collection of memorabilia and old photographs; Jack Darlington's ever-busy barbecue; Joe Bussell's static model boat display; Adrian and Aaron Grigg's crab-pot-making demonstrations; historical talks by Cornish Lugger Association co-founder Mike Darlington and Old Gaffers author Robert Simper; Adrian Bishop as the artist in residence on the quay; the skill of oar-making explained by Marcus Lewis, and, finally, the start of a 'feeder' race to the midweek Fowey Classics Regatta.

The links between Looe and Fowey have strengthened in recent years and in 12 months' time, it will be Fowey providing the 'feeder' into Looe, reported Vice-chairman Jonathan Brice.

Explained David Darlington: "*We are now going to make the Luggers an annual event (it was always biennial), alongside our Made-in-Looe reunion regatta and the most suitable tides for 2026 will be over the July 31, August 1-2 weekend which will mean Fowey Classics (and Fowey doesn't have tidal considerations with which to contend) will be before us.*"

Attempted theft of racing marks: Royal Oak (Andy Fox, Cawsand), who hit most of the course rounding buoys during two days of racing.

Sportsman's trophy for overcoming hardship: Hannah (Giles and Hannah Frampton, Thorncombe, Dorset), whose boat trailer broke down on the A35 en route to Looe, but they still managed to sail with the Royal Oak.

Concours d'Elegance (Richard Pengelly Trophy): Hopeful (Paul Eedle's new replica Mevagissey crabber – and Paul dedicated the trophy to the boat's builder and designer, Chris Rees. Millbrook).

Endeavour award: Barnabas (Rob McDowell, Cornish Maritime Trust, Newlyn) for sailing 1,400 miles to the Scottish Highlands for new masts and spars.

Tetra Cup, best tender or dinghy: Hopeful.

Best motor boat: Ganesha (Adrian and Aaron Grigg, Penryn), a 36-ft former Looe mackerel fishing boat built by the Curtis and Pape 'yard in 1969..

Unstinting promoter and supporter of the event: Barnaby Sheppard for 'rallying the troops' in West Cornwall harbours and ports.

Diplomacy award: Brian Bowdler (Looe), principal race officer.

NEWS FROM EAST LOOE TOWN TRUST



On 25th June ELTT were very proud to officially open the renovated Watchtower and Old Lifeboat Station on the seafront. Our Chairman, Andy Bishop, welcomed guests and Trustee Brian Galipeau explained the background and warmly thanked all contributors. The Mayor, Stephen Remington, cut the ribbon to open the Old Lifeboat Station which is now the home of Penrock Distillery.

The Deputy Mayor, Jamie Pearn, did the honours for the Watchtower which is the new office for ELTT.



ELTT staff and Trustees worked very hard to get a grant from the Shared Prosperity Fund which partially paid for the extensive renovations but the Trust still had to pay a substantial amount from their own accounts. There were technical challenges with solving problems such as major cracks and rotten lintels but solutions were found and now the buildings are looking superb and bring a lift to the whole seafront area. We believe that we are among the first to utilise new technology in solar power by using solar slates to generate electricity – from the outside these just look like normal slates (and much more in keeping than using old-style solar panels).

As summer gets into full swing, we hope that many of you will enjoy a visit to our beach and seafront. Looe Beach Hire will be on the seafront offering the hire of deckchairs, sun loungers, parasols, kayaks and the famous Octopus roundabout for our younger visitors.

We are pleased to continue to offer the drinking water refill point on the seafront – so please refill your reusable drinking bottles. On your way to the beach, please take note of the safety signs and be aware of the direction and strength of the wind as well as the tides.

ELTT continue to work alongside other town organisations such as the Looe Lions (don't miss carnival week), Looe Rowing Club (having their regatta on the beach as well as regular training sessions), Looe Sailing Club (hosting national championships as well as regular sailing) to mention just a few.

Although the beach is always very popular, don't forget the wonderful walks around our town and especially the Wooldown. It is a lovely spot for a picnic, a leisurely stroll or a dog walk. Please respect the area and use the bins for litter and dog mess. We are very proud to say that our conservation work is ongoing and there are some very rare long-horned bees visiting the bee glades and wild flower meadows.

Have you visited The Old Guildhall Museum and Gaol recently? It is certainly worth a visit to see the fantastic artefacts and find out more about the history of our wonderful town. There are fantastic archives of photos and also family history records if you are a keen genealogist.

Old Guildhall Museum & Gaol, East Looe



As I hope you all know, in 1587 Queen Elizabeth I granted East Looe a Charter which allowed the town to hold several annual fairs and markets, regulate tolls and levies at the harbour, charge rents on land and properties, set our own bye-laws and, of course, hold a three-weekly Magistrate's Court.

The Mayor, Capital Burgesses and Free Burgesses were the men responsible for the smooth running of the town - the Corporation. (Oh the irony, a powerful female monarch signed the Charter but only men could carry out the tasks involved...)

I have recently improved and expanded a research project that I began a few years ago. Back then we installed a display about Court procedures, punishments and bye-laws with some mini-plays based on genuine Court cases. Don't panic, we didn't hang anyone here, and those cases went to Launceston and Bodmin. If someone tells you that criminals were hung in The Ship, feel free to set them straight for me please.

There is now an information folder detailing Court cases, the help given to the poor of the town & those in genuine need who were just passing through, the rights of Settlement & Removal and a day-to-day selection of jobs necessary in just keeping things working.

There was a lot which required continual maintenance, renewal and improvement. The Corporation was in charge of slaughter yards, animal pounds, streets, quays, water-courses, St. Mary's Chapel, The (Old) Guildhall, keeping the peace and order in town and maintaining our defences from sea-faring enemies. (There was a defensive sea-wall with cannons and cannons mounted on the cliffs, in case you were wondering.)

Here are a few samples of how life went on:

1670: Four men were in Court for feeding "hogges" at their doors.

1673: Jo. Pope "drew blood" from Philip Scadgell and threatened the Mayor. A relative of Philip, Richard Scadgell, abused the jury by calling them "a company of bottle heads."

1677: Two persons who refused to pay His Majesty's Duty had goods seized - 44 hats, one feather boulder and two feather pillows.

1788: (This made me sad.) William Nancarrow was convicted of bigamy having married Elizabeth Callaway of St. Germans while still married. He, Elizabeth and daughter Mary were living in East Looe. Elizabeth died shortly after the case so young Mary was declared illegitimate and "Removed" to St. Germans.

1844: John Parsons, victualler, told the Court that labourers John Mousehill and Jas. Butters destroyed seven cabbages and damaged his spinach bed.

I hope I have piqued your interest and that you might want to learn more, if you do you know where to find us!

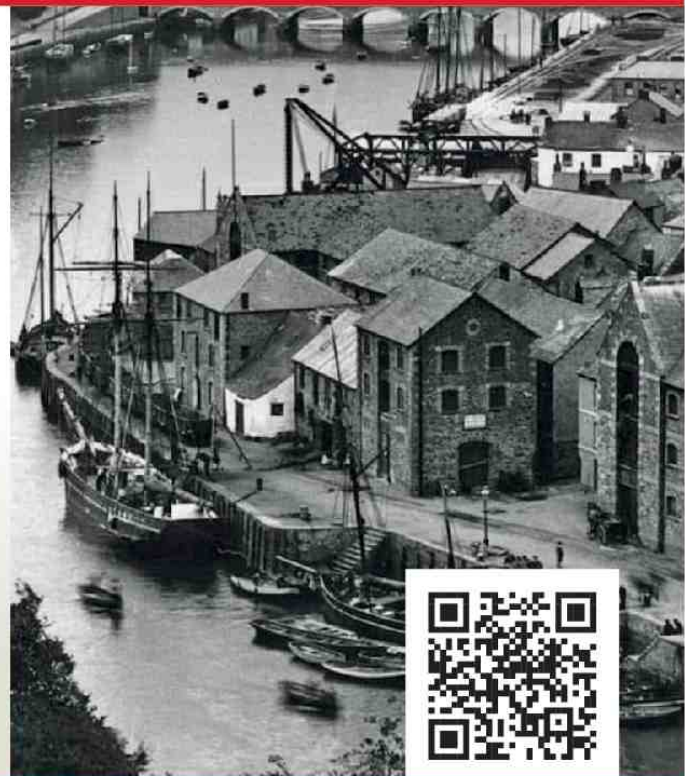

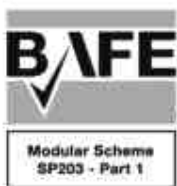

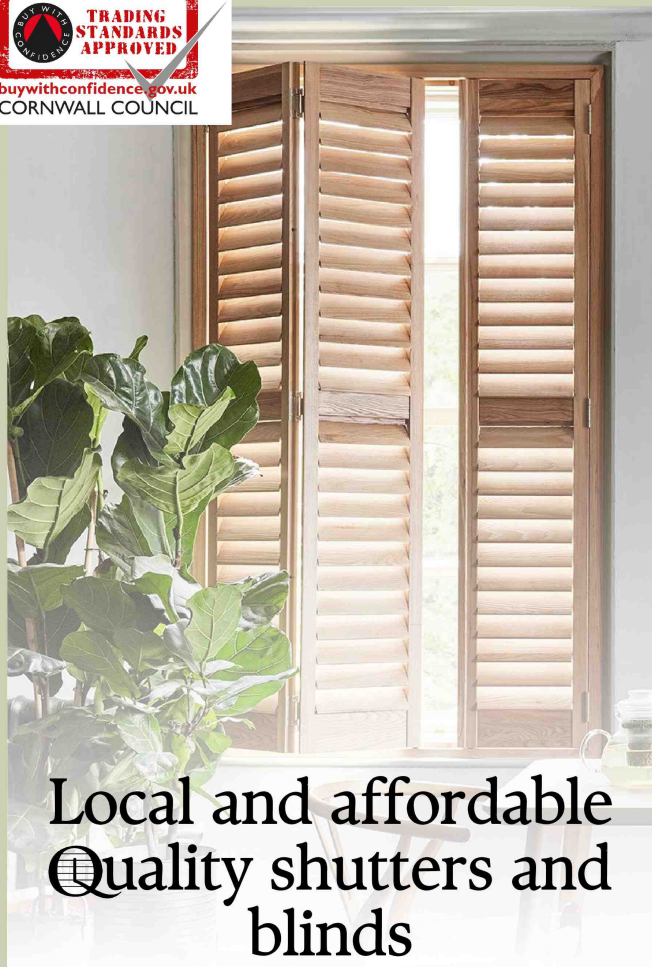

LOOE ISLAND



So summer is upon us and it seems to be turning into a butterfly bonanza year!

The overall decline in butterfly numbers is depressing news. 80% of butterfly species in the UK have decreased in either abundance, distribution, or both since 1976.

But every now and then they have a better year, and it certainly looks that way from all the delightful fluttering we've been seeing here on Looe Island Nature Reserve.

As usual, we have seen plenty of the grass loving species such as meadow browns, ringlets and gatekeeper. The species all belong to the group called the browns. Now we know this doesn't sound very exciting but patterns on these generally tawny butterflies are beautiful, so we encourage our visitors to slow down, and take time to really look at all wonders of the natural world.

Part of the island's management is to monitor wildlife - this includes everything from the flowers to the trees, the butterflies and birds and of course the seals. Using the information gained from monitoring, we've worked hard to improve the Island's grasslands and one plant that has benefited is the wild carrot. The plant has many other common names, including Queen Anne's lace, which perhaps helps to describe the delicate finery of its pretty flower umbels. Wild carrot is, of course the ancestor of the cultivated carrot but it's root is small and woody, so not really enjoyable to munch upon! However, it is still useful for both gardeners and wildlife as it attracts those all-important pollinators.



At the end of July we were joined by a regular group of surveyors who are linked to Cornwall Seal Group Research Trust and Looe Marine Conservation Group. These local volunteers carry out monthly seal surveys and record the Island's birds and the butterflies. The surveyors are excellent at spotting seals both in and out of the water. They record where the seals are seen and their behaviour as well as trying to get zoom photos to identify individual seals. Experienced

surveyors can tell whether it's a male or female seal and whether it's a mature adult or a young seal. Then they can even study a seal's unique fur pattern and identify individuals.

We also record incidents of disturbance which sadly happens when people get too close or too long to wildlife both in the sea and on land.

Wildlife disturbance is easy to avoid but perhaps more difficult to understand. Sometimes the accumulated impacts and long-term effects of disturbance might not be immediately obvious, so people may think it doesn't matter but it does. We all need wildlife to thrive so please give wildlife space.

Looe Shedders Expands Activities in Local Schools

Looe Shedders is adding another string to its bow - collaborating with Looe Community Academy. The first results of this occurred in June when some of our members ran a couple of workshops during the school's "Challenge Week", when pupils that hadn't gone away on school trips were given opportunities to try something new.

In our case, we brought in materials and worked with the teachers to help the "Crafty Crew", a group of about 16 students, make Caribbean carnival masks and bird boxes. They turned out to be a talented bunch (see photos) . For some of the pupils it was the first time they'd done any woodwork, and something they really enjoyed.



Both Looe Shedders and the school see this as the first step towards working more closely together on a regular basis. The idea is that our members have a wealth of experience that could be put to use, particularly in helping pupils that might benefit from learning practical skills. It's also likely that Looe Shedders will help pupils participating in a planned community festival celebrating the history of Looe's lifeboats next Spring.

The developments at Looe Community Academy follow on from projects we've undertaken at primary schools. We've just finished building three raised beds at Looe Primary Academy (see photo). The school plans to assign each bed to one of its Key Stage 1 classes and let the children decide what they will grow in them. This follows on from a playground bus that we delivered in May 2024. Since then we've also made a playground tractor for Trenode primary school, and we are working on further projects for both schools.

MAJOR TWO-DAY AUCTION OF TONY MARTIN'S REMARKABLE COLLECTION

A lifetime's passion for antiques and art is set to go under the hammer this September, as the extraordinary collection of the late Tony Martin - a well-known and much-loved antiques dealer from East Looe, Cornwall - is offered for sale by public auction.



Tony Martin ran his antique shop in East Looe for over 50 years, earning a sterling reputation throughout Cornwall and the wider Westcountry as a true gentleman of the trade. He passed away in December 2024 at the age of 84, leaving behind a remarkable legacy - and an astonishing collection of antiques and artworks.

Now, Plymouth Auction Rooms has been entrusted with the sale of Tony's estate, a vast and diverse array of items sourced not only from his renowned shop but also from his home and a nearby cottage, both filled to the brim with beautiful objects.

Auctioneer Paul Keen, who is leading the sale, remembers Tony fondly: "I knew Tony from my very first auctions over 30 years ago. He was incredibly knowledgeable, always generous with his time, and had a real passion for art and antiques. Visiting his home was like stepping into a treasure trove."



Among the standout pieces are over 50 stunning 19th-century marine paintings, a cabinet of exquisite Worcester porcelain, and a rare collection of around 20 original artworks by Beryl Cook. Tony was a close friend of the late Beryl Cook and played a key role in her development as one of Britain's most beloved contemporary artists. He even appeared in several of her paintings, famously playing his bowed cello.



Perhaps the most significant highlights of the sale are four rare Newlyn School paintings by Harold Harvey, each expected to achieve in excess of £10,000. These works were exhibited at the Penlee House Gallery & Museum and are likely to draw national interest.

In a further twist of artistic history, the auction team uncovered one of the largest collections of Clarice Cliff ceramics they've ever seen, housed in the cottage that once belonged to Beryl Cook and later purchased by Tony.



This remarkable sale offers something for every collector: from Chinese porcelain and antique furniture to 18th-century Worcester, fine art, and modern treasures. It's truly a once-in-a-generation auction.

The Tony Martin Collection will be sold over two days, on Monday 2nd and Tuesday 3rd September 2025, at Plymouth Auction Rooms.

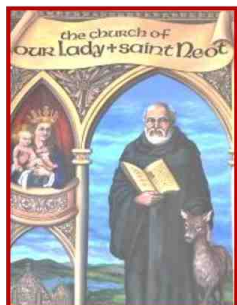

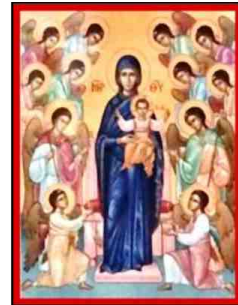

Armed Forces Day: Our branch was present in Guildhall Rose Garden on Saturday 28th June to mark the National Armed Forces Day. We were there to promote the work of the 'Legion' and collected donations which will go to the National Poppy Appeal fund. The Poppy Appeal provides support to the Armed Forces community in six key areas: Financial Support, Advice, Employment, Mobility, Housing and Mental Health. On the day we raise over £700, so a big thank you to all those that donated and to our members who gave their time and effort to make the day such a success.



VJ Day (Victory Over Japan Day): We will be in the Rose Garden again on Friday August 15th from 10am, to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II in the Pacific. As usual, we will have our stall and be collecting for the Poppy Appeal. If possible, please find the time to stop and say hello to us. Music will be provided between 1pm and 3pm by the local, broad genre group, the NobZ. On the same day, our members be multi-tasking by being at the Looe war Memorial to take part in the National VJ Day two-minute silence at 12 noon. If you can't be at the war memorial, then please still try to observe the two-minute silence wherever you are.

Trebah Military Day Visit: On the 31st May a group of our branch members attended the Trebah Garden's Military Day. The annual event is organised by the Parachute Regimental Association, Royal Cornwall Division, and commemorates the 7,500 American Soldiers who sailed sent sail from the nearby Polgwiddden Cove on 1st June 1944. They were heading towards Omaha Beach in Normandy where they landed on D-Day, 6th June 1944. The military day featured military vehicles, performances, a memorial service, and wreath laying. It was well attended and enjoyed by veterans of all our armed forces. Our branch members laid a wreath and present a British Legion plaque to the Cornwall Parachute Association.

The Looe Branch of Royal British Legion meetings: These are held on the first Monday of the month, start at 7:30pm sharp in the ground floor bar of the Looe Social Club, West Looe Quay. Anyone is free to come along and see what we are about. Although we were in the middle VE Day activities, at our meeting on the 5th May our Poppy Appeal Organiser, Annette Bryan, gave an update on this year's Poppy Appeal which runs from October to October. Our Branch's current figure stands at £11,442.99 (£3,000 up on this date last year). The National figure stands at £51.4 million (1.3 million up on last year). Percentage wise, our branch's increase is well up on the overall national figure.

Obituary

It is with a heavy heart that I start this article with an obituary. Our talented accompanist, composer and arranger Liz passed away on 18th June 2025. CORNWALL SUPER 9S CROWNED SOUTH WEST DISABILITY CRICKET LEAGUE CHAMPIONS

Cornwall Cricket Board is proud to announce that the Cornwall Super 9s Disability Cricket Team has been crowned South West League Champion - an extraordinary achievement in just their second competitive season. The team sealed the title following back-to-back wins against Dorset and Hampshire in two thrilling and hard-fought matches. The victories not only capped off a perfect run of form but also secured Cornwall's place in the upcoming national semi-finals, where they will compete against other regional champions.

Victory Over Dorset at Blandford CC: Cornwall's clash against Dorset was a pivotal moment in the campaign. On a scorching but windy day at Blandford Cricket Club, captain Josh Raven won the toss and chose to bat. Despite an early setback with opener Ben Mailes dismissed for 2, Josh and Giles steadied the innings with a vital 80-run partnership. With tight fielding and only four wides conceded all innings, Cornwall restricted Dorset to 128, securing a comprehensive win.

Triumphant Home Finale vs Hampshire at St. Stephen CC: The final home match of the season against Hampshire Royals proved to be a memorable occasion. Cornwall, again choosing to bat first, showed their class. Josh Raven struck a maiden half-century before retiring, and father-daughter duo Giles and Chloe Francis added a crucial 54-run partnership. Cornwall posted a competitive 154 despite tight bowling from Hampshire and an emotional farewell spell from Hampshire DDO Michael Powell, who was playing his final match. Cornwall's bowlers then delivered a clinical performance. Archie Ball starred with figures of 3 for 4, dismantling the Hampshire middle order. With wickets falling regularly and pressure mounting, Hampshire finished on 96 for 8, confirming Cornwall's third consecutive win.

League Champions & Heading to the Nationals: This week it was confirmed that Cornwall had clinched the South West League title - edging out Somerset on net run rate. This remarkable achievement is a testament to the hard work, unity, and spirit of the players, coaches, and support staff behind Cornwall Super 9s. They now look ahead to the national semi-finals.

Cornwall Super 9s Coach Daniel Tonkin said: "I'm extremely proud of our team—it's been exciting to be part of their journey. They've grown so much together and worked incredibly hard. I can't wait to see them dive into the national finals!"

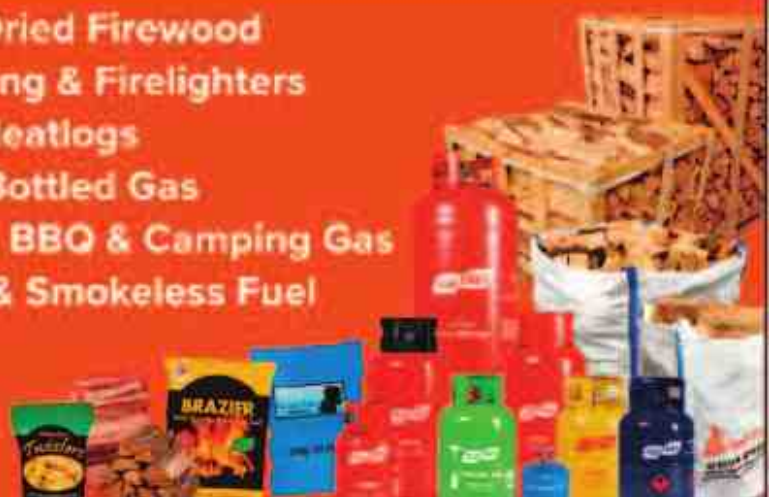

Seagrass:

In early July, volunteers from LooeMCG were joined by Looe's Mayor, Stephen Remington, on a glass bottom boat trip to explore the seagrass beds in Looe Bay. Our inspirational guide was Eden Stevens, a seagrass specialist from the Ocean Conservation Trust. Stephen said 'Seagoers who drop anchors have a lot to learn about the impact on these precious plants and all of us who love the oceans can cooperate to protect them'.

Seagrass is one of several precious marine habitats along Looe's coastline, part of a Marine Conservation Zone. It's an important nursery bed for juvenile fish and home to rare and endangered species like sea horses. It also plays a critical role in the fight against climate change, absorbing carbon up to 35 times more efficiently than tropical rainforests.

Proprietary closed formats, (for example .pub (Publisher) or .psd (Photoshop)) are incompatible with our software.

Articles should be text documents, not images or PDFs, and It would be really helpful if images could be sent separately, rather than embedded in documents.

Poster images and adverts should be full, half (landscape) or quarter (portrait) page A4 size.
