Trustees

Like many others in Looe we were very saddened by the news in December of the sudden death of one of our Trustees, Michael Tolley. Michael gave a vast amount of time to the Trust and his wealth of knowledge and humour will be greatly missed at our meetings. Our thoughts also go to his partner Eileen at this difficult time.

We warmly welcome a new Trustee, Colin Freemantle. He replaces retiring Trustee, Colin Cotton, who we thank for his work with the Trust over the years.

Museum

The Trust Old Guildhall Museum received a cheque from the local Co-op stores in the town on the 25th November for the sum of £2523.75. This funding will be used towards various pieces of equipment including a display screen and computer equipment. Our thanks go to the local community for supporting this funding scheme, the Museum being just one of the charities benefitting.

Guildhall Windows

Towards the end of February you will see the Guildhall wrapped in scaffolding to enable repairs to the stained glass windows. The Trust have been fortunate to receive a grant from the Pilgrims Trust towards the cost of this work. The grant received will help, but significant additional costs will be met by the Trust. This demonstrates our ongoing commitment to keeping in good repair the buildings in our care. We will also take this opportunity to repaint the window frames and soffits and carry out any maintenance required to the exterior of the building.

Bathing Water Quality

Many congratulations to the Cornwall Wildlife Trust (CWT) who at the Cornwall Sustainability Awards were Highly Commended in the Contribution to Sustainability by Increasing Resilience in the Community category for the Looe Bathing Waters Project. CWT are a valued member of the Looe Bathing Waters Group, of which the East Looe Town Trust is a founder member. The Group continues to work hard on maintaining improvements in bathing water quality off our beach.

After the meal, the Commodore Enys Dan summed up another very successful year for the club, thanking everyone involved in running the sailing for a job well done. He then invited Janet his wife to join him to make the end of season presentations.

Christmas events for the club have included running a bar on Buller Quay on the day of the arrival of Father Christmas and, on the Saturday before the big day, a children's party in the clubhouse. Christmas Eve saw a large gathering to listen to the music of Richard James, enjoy a dance and toast in the big day.

New Year's Eve once again proved to be an excellent evening with many members enjoying the comfort of the clubhouse away from the nasty weather outside.

LOOE ROWING CLUB

After a wonderful season of results, on the water rowing drew to a close for the winter. Looe Rowing Club once again focused on fundraising as the nights drew in.

First up. A beautiful Saturday morning in November, Looe Rowing Club set out to row 100,000m inside the foyer of Morrisons Liskeard, during opening hours, The rowing machines started whirring at 10 o'clock sharp and the metres started counting down. After a rapid 3³/₄ hours, we'd reached our target! Not being a club to leave early, we carried on rowing and fundraising. One of our members, Keith Holder, racked up a cheeky half marathon towards our total!

We had Junior members, veterans, male and female crews each taking their turn on the rowing machines and offering bag packing services for customers. After a long and tiring day, 1900hrs steadily arrived to mark the end of the event for the club and with 215,186m rowed, our original target was well and truly smashed. If the club had actually rowed from Morrisons Liskeard, they could have reached Southampton or the island of Jersey!

The club is very grateful to Morrisons for hosting us and we are extremely grateful to their generous customers who helped raise £833.89! Also shout out to Lee Major for organising the event and even racking up a few metres himself. Barclays have kindly offered to match our event bringing the total to over £1660 for our new gig! Looe Rowing Club would like to thank all that made this possible.

Next up, was a favourite of the club – Pig Racing! Held at The Old Sail Loft in Looe an impressive crowd turned up to cheer on, and place bets on the pigs, some dubious named ones to say the least! After several races and shall we say 'interesting – a bit blue' commentary from the co-hosts Lee and Simon, well in excess of £1000 was raised for the club and The Mission to Seafarers. Again, this is generously being match-funded by Barclays, making it over £2000 on the night. LOOE MARINE CONSERVATION GROUP

2018 has started on a positive note with the people of Looe and its businesses taking proactive steps toward becoming a more 'plastic clever' town. BBC's Blue Planet and Sky TV Ocean Rescue campaign have given considerable exposure to the threats posed by ocean plastic so most people now have a far greater awareness, not only of the issue, but also the steps they can take on an individual basis to make the changes that are needed.

REFILL SCHEME: 19 businesses in Looe have signed up to the Refill Scheme permitting drinking water bottles to be refilled for free at their premises thereby reducing the demand for single use plastic bottles.

FINAL STRAW CAMPAIGN: Looe schoolchildren have written to local businesses to encourage them not to give out plastic drinking straws. And an advocate for 'The Final Straw Campaign' has emerged with a local Looe supplier sourcing paper straws and other eco friendly packaging.

A WARM WELCOME AT ST. MARTIN'S THANKS TO VIRIDOR CREDITS

A congregation of nearly 100 was delighted to experience the newly installed heating system at St. Martin's, Looe, on Christmas Eve, when the children enjoyed searching the church for Nativity figures to create the Christmas Story, led by Revd. Philip Sharp, and accompanied by organist John Trethewey.

This is the fourth project at St. Martin's which Viridor Credits has enabled, as in recent years they have funded UPVC doors and windows in the hall, a disabled access ramp to the church and also resurfacing of pathways. This latest project was to replace a defunct oil-fired heating boiler with a modern twin-system equivalent, which will also be much more efficient to run, and has enabled the Grade 1 listed building to be used all year round once again.



The PCC would also like to thank the Looe Town Council and the East and West Looe Town Trusts for their contributions to the project. These bodies have been very supportive of our town churches, both now and on past occasions, and we are extremely grateful.

LOOE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

THE ROYAL BRITISH

Branch News We wish all our members best wishes for 2018 and our thanks to all those that give their time and help with our fundraising over the previous year. We hope to hold a fundraising Quiz Night, in the Portbyhan Hotel, in March. Please look out for posters advertising the event. By donating to The Royal British Legion, you're helping us to help

those in need within the Armed Forces community. The 'Legion' provides support for members of the Royal Navy, British Army, Royal Air Force, veterans and their families.

Lest We Forget The Looe War Memorial contains the names of 10 members of the RAF who died in the service of their country in WWII. Surprisingly, five of those died whilst undergoing training, whilst only three lost their lives in enemy action.

Edwin Giles was a member of the RAF Volunteer Reserve and, at 18, he was learning to fly at No 3 Elementary Flying Training School. On 16th August 1940 he was flying solo in an Avro Cadet training aircraft when the aircraft stalled and crashed near Farringdon, Oxfordshire. Edwin was killed instantly and the aircraft was destroyed by fire. He is buried in West Looe Cemetery.

Owen James Geach Stevens was born in Looe in 1914, and in August 1939 was awarded his Aviators Certificate (Flying Licence) having learned to fly as part of the Civil Air Guard. When the war started he was commissioned in the RAF Volunteer Reserve and operated as a flying instructor at 9 Flying Training School. On 18th March, 1941, Owen was instructing a James Swinburne when the aircraft, a Miles Master 1, spun into the ground at Babdown Farm, Gloucestershire. Both the instructor and pupil were killed. Owen was buried at St John's Church, Wembley, Middlesex.

William Soady was a Leading Aircraftman with No 5 (Coastal) Operational Training Unit at Chivenor. On 13th October, 1941, he was unlucky enough to be taken along as a passenger on a training flight. The aircraft was a Bristol Beaufort, a twin engine torpedo bomber, and piloted by a Canadian, trainee pilot Frank Redfern. One of the engines failed, the novice pilot couldn't maintain altitude and the aircraft crashed north of Braunton, Devon. William and the pilot were killed instantly. William is buried in West Looe Cemetery.

William Stevens joined the RAF in 1938 and became an air gunner. He flew on the Bomber Command 1000 Bomber Raids, in May to August 1942, before seeing service in the Middle East. He was eventually posted to 10 Operational Training Unit at Abingdon, probably as a rest from operations. On 24th June, 1943, William was part of the crew of a Whitley Bomber taking part in an army cooperation exercise. The aircraft carried out a mock attack on a bridge, but whilst climbing away

the port wing struck a tall tree. Out of control, the bomber crashed five miles from Aylesbury. Of the seven airmen aboard the ill-fated flight, one man survived, but the rest, including William, were killed. He is also buried in West Looe Cemetery.

Eric Madge joined the RAF Volunteer Reserve in 1943 at the age of 18. He qualified as a Flight Engineer and joined 626 Squadron, flying Lancaster Bombers, at RAF Wickenby, Lincolnshire. On the night of 8th September, 1944, Eric's crew were sent out on a night training flight. About midnight they were returning to base when the pilot had to take evasive action to avoid colliding with another Lancaster. This caused the aircraft to crash-land at 200mph, narrowly missing a cottage. All the crew were injured, but Eric was the only fatality. He is buried at Efford Cemetery, Plymouth.

FREE FIRE SAFETY CHECKS

It's timely to remind residents that Cornwall Council offer free fire safety checks for certain home owners, and online advice for businesses.

Those with the greatest need in the community will be eligible for a free home fire safety check and will be contacted to arrange an appointment to do this. In this case we will visit your home at an allocated time and accompany you around every room in your property with the aim of:

- Identifying and making you aware of the potential risks in your home including electrical safety to ensure your sockets are not overloaded.
- Making sure you know what to do in order to reduce or prevent these risks.
- Helping you put together an escape plan in case a fire breaks out in the future.
- Ensuring you have a working smoke alarm and if you don't, we will fit a free smoke alarm (type of alarm will vary depending on the need).

The home fire safety check will take about half an hour. A member from Cornwall Fire, Rescue and Community Safety (CFRCS) Service will be wearing a uniform and carrying an identification card. Please ask to see the identification card, and if you require confirmation telephone the freephone helpline 0800 3581 999.

To help us determine if you are eligible for a free home fire safety check please complete a home fire safety check short survey. You will find the link to the survey via the webiste link above.

If you are eligible an officer will contact you and arrange a convenient time to visit your home. Please be aware that there is a waiting list in place.



FIRE BARBICAN HILL

It is with great sadness that I start this report with the news of the death of a local resident on New Year's Eve in a fire at a residence on Barbican Hill. The resident is a member of a very local family and our thoughts and prayers are with them at this difficult time. We must say thank you to the fire service for their work on this incident with crews from Liskeard, Polruan, Saltash and Looe attending. The work for the Looe crew continued for a couple of days and the investigation is ongoing. The community response was outstanding with a number of people offering help in many different ways, we are lucky to live in such a kind community.

I attended the funeral of Mike Tolley who died suddenly in November. He was involved in many organisations in the town and will be missed. A man who gave time and energy to all he did.

LOOE TOWN COUNCIL AMENITIES REPORT

UPDATE ON PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

The Millpool toilets were targeted over the Christmas school holidays with repeated minor damage to the toilet pans and general increase in rubbish being left and the decision was taken to close the toilets at 3pm daily until the start of new term (Jan 4^{th}). The toilets have now reopened and no further damage as been reported.

New flooring works commence at West Looe toilets on Monday 8th January for two weeks and it is anticipated that they will be finished by 22nd January.

Maintenance works have been completed on the Seafront and Guildhall toilets, both inside and out, including the seating area between the gents and ladies and to the shower area at Seafront. Maintenance works will shortly commence on Hannafore toilets which will mean closure for approx one week. Work on Millpool toilets will follow after that.

SALT BINS

An audit of all Town Council owned salt bins was completed in November and refills/ new bins ordered as required. These works have now been completed by Cormac.

Refuge Levabling FREEDOM FROM DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND ABUSE FOR PETS AND THEIR OWNERS

We are a local charity based in St Cleer, providing a pet fostering service in Cornwall and Devon to enable individuals and families to escape violent and abusive relationships; to access the safety and support that they need before being reunited with their pets. Often people escaping such relationships are unable to take their much loved pets with them. In many cases this will stop people from leaving. Domestic violence and abuse is one of the most significant public health concerns that we experience in the UK, combined with the fact that over half of all households have pets, this is a vital service!

December was our busiest month yet, with fundraising events and pets coming in for fostering. We raised a phenomenal £2,500 in donations in November and December, including a craft fair in Looe. We also received lots of queries from potential foster carers and we have nearly caught up with the home checks we do with all of our volunteer pet carers. Since we began, in September 2017, we have fostered 25 pets and supported 19 families to escape violent and abusive relationships. We have also been privileged to reunite 7 pets with their families and have more pets going home soon which is always emotional. Seeing pets reunited with their owners reinforces the important role that animal companions play in helping their humans cope and move forward, particularly children.

We will foster any pet we can, providing we have a suitable foster home including dogs, cats, horses, rabbits, small furries, reptiles, birds and exotic pets. So far we have fostered dogs, cats, rats and rabbits! It's largely dogs who come in for fostering and in particular we are looking for foster carers who can care for large breed dogs or multiple dogs. If this is you, we would love to hear from you! We pay for vet treatment and food so there is no cost to pet foster carers, all you need to do is provide the love.

Thank you so much for your support in our first few months, it's been tough, overwhelming, fun and sad at times, but we are excited about the year ahead! A very special 'thank you' to our pet foster carers and project volunteers without whom there would be no Refuge4Pets!

POLPERRO FISHERMEN'S CHOIR

Polperro Fishermen's Choir, one of the oldest in Cornwall, is preparing to celebrate an impressive anniversary this year. It was formed 95 years ago and is still based in Polperro Methodist Chapel where it started.

Tommy Marks, a fisherman and lay-preacher, attracted large congregations to his services. Meanwhile Eva Cloke, who was the wife of a fisherman and organist at the chapel, realised the value of preserving the tradition of the singing fishermen. So in 1923, Tommy and Eva formed the first Polperro Fishermen's Choir. Their uniform was a home-knitted roll neck woollen jersey, continuing the tradition of the old days when wives and daughters knitted jumpers for their men folk and each man could be recognised by the pattern on his jumper. It was not until 1982 that the choir modernised and adopted the black blazer and roll-necked shirt by which it is now so easily recognised.

Eva continued as conductor until the late 1960s, since when it has had only four more musical directors, including Jack Libby and Phil Carrigan, who both played an important part in developing the style and repertoire of the choir. In 2017, Stuart Reeves accepted the challenging role.

These days, there are very few true fishermen singing with the choir but the roots and traditions remain deep. The choir's love of singing and of making it fun helps raise thousands of pounds every year for charities and good causes.
