Bathing Water Quality

As we hit the Community News copy deadline, some excellent news has arrived for the town. The new DEFRA bathing water classifications for 2021, which are based on monitoring data collected by the Environment Agency between 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2021, have now been published on GOV.UK. The designated bathing water for Looe is East Looe Beach, and its bathing water quality is once again classified as 'Good'.

Several years ago, after the bathing water quality was classified 'Poor', the Trust helped lead a working partnership with Looe Town Council, the Environment Agency, South West Water, Looe Marine Conservation Group, Cornwall Wildlife Trust and SECTA to drive up bathing water quality through a variety of measures – from engineering improvements to educating everyone to stop putting the wrong stuff in the toilet or down the drains. It's great that nowadays most people are very aware of the crucial role we all play in protecting our bathing water quality.

Is there a music composer who can come up with a catchy jingle for "only flush pee, poo and paper", and "only rain down the drain"?





Beach

Still on the subject of the town beach, one of the swimming season daily tasks for our maintenance team is to prevent seaweed building up, and to rake the sand with our tractor-drawn litter picker. Sand and salt create a tough environment for machinery and sometimes more than routine servicing is needed. Last week the rake was taken away for a manufacturer's rebuild, which, though expensive, we hope will extend its useful life and avoid the need for a new machine.

Clocktower

Work is progressing well on the major repair of the Guildhall Clocktower. The scaffolding will be raised again for access to the Clocktower parapet and for work on the clock-face. We have tried to minimise the work's impact on traffic and pedestrians. And, most importantly, there is still full access to the Guildhall businesses – Pier One, the Guildhall Market, Guildhall Barbers, and, of course, Quirky Boutique. Incidentally, the Rose Garden community tearoom is reopening in February. Please pop in to ask for details or phone the ELTT office on 01503 263709 and they will be happy to help.

Old Lifeboat Station and Watchtower

We are busy pulling together everything we need to make a strong bid to the Lottery Heritage Fund hoping for a grant to restore the Grade II listed Old Lifeboat Station and Watchtower. Part of the project is to create, on the ground floor of the Watchtower, an open access Crew Room where people can learn about the exploits of the brave crews who served there between 1866 and 1930. The ELTT office would move to the Watchtower, and the refurbished old boat shed will be let as a gallery and showcase for local artists.

Finally, when visiting the beach you may see, off the Banjo Pier, a small boat shooting a seine net. No, not catching sardines. It's part of a scientific environmental impact study commissioned by the Looe Storm Defence project.

On the Wooldown from February you will see new flowers coming into bloom daily from hedgerow to meadow – perhaps we will put some pics up on our Facebook page.

It's a great escape.

WEST LOOE SQUARE JUBILEE PARTY FOR THE QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE

The West Looe May Fayre Committee have met to discuss whether to hold the May Fayre on 7^{th} May 2022.

We don't believe Covid now poses the same barriers to holding the May Fayre event as it has for the past two years; we have been unable to hold the event since 2019. However, we are concerned about the capacity and resources required to hold the May Fayre when three weeks later there is an opportunity to hold a Party for the Queen to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee over the extended bank holiday weekend, from $2^{nd}-5^{th}$ June, as part of the town-wide celebrations.

The West Looe May Fayre Committee are therefore proposing that we collaborate with others who may want to hold a traditional street party in West Looe Square around the fire station, including a Big Lunch on Saturday 4th June and NOT hold the May Fayre on 7th May this year.

LOOE COMMUNITY MEALS: VOLUNTEER DRIVERS THANK YOU

The Looe Community Meals group recently held a cream tea at the Portbyhan Hotel to thank the volunteer drivers/deliverers.

The Looe Community Meals project was launched over a year ago in collaboration with Looe Development Trust and provides over 35 families in the Looe and Polperro area with two hot nutritious meals per week. Volunteers deliver the food which has been freshly prepared by local restaurants and hotels on Wednesdays and Sundays.

We are so grateful to all the volunteers, we just could not undertake the project without their commitment and generosity of their time.

In 2022 the project steering group plans to expand the service to reach more people in need and develop more social settings for people to meet over a meal. We are currently gathering feedback with a telephone survey to help improve the service. The group has also been fundraising through the Spirit of Christmas initiative and have received contributions from West Looe Town Trust and other grants.

Project coordinator Sara Barron said, "People using the service are often lonely and don't see anyone from week to week, so they welcome having a chat with our volunteers."

All volunteers are DBS checked and can signpost users to where they can get further help and occasionally report to safeguarding. Service users are sometimes elderly and infirm, may have just come out of hospital, are families finding it hard to cope, or are living in poverty.

LOOE ISLAND MARINE NATURE RESERVE UPDATE

It might be cold and wintry outside, but signs of Spring are here on Looe Island Nature Reserve!

Back in mid-December we noticed Shags building nests on the southern cliffs, "What, signs of sea birds breeding in winter?" I hear you say. Yes, it is very early for these sleek black long-necked birds but given the right conditions it shows how our wildlife needs to press on with producing the next generation.

Of the seabirds, it's usually Cormorants (also black birds with long necks) who win the Island race to be first to build nests. Each year they normally start nest-building in mid-January and 2022 has been no exception, with around 10 nests already built. As the year progresses this number will increase, making the Island an important breeding site for these reptilian-like birds.

Other early wildlife sightings include the unmistakable flutterings of the Red Admiral butterfly. With its black velvety wings and red stripes, it is also the last butterfly that we usually see each year. I guess this makes such a delicate insect a surprising hardy wintertime creature! Most species of butterflies spend the winter as caterpillars. But, the Red Admiral, along with four other species (the Brimstone, Comma, Peacock and Small Tortoiseshell) over-winter in their adult form. Perhaps you've seen them in sheltered spots on sunny winter days or hibernating inside your home? If so, why not share your sightings with the Environmental Records Centre for Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly (ERCCIS). Just go to the Cornwall Wildlife Trust's website and follow the links to wildlife recording: https://www.cornwallwildlifetrust.org.uk/wildlife/wildlife-recording. All records help improve understanding of our local natural history as well as being of use in decision-making, education, research, and other public benefit purposes.

At the start of each year, I look forward to the first sighting of my favourite seal – an adult female called Duchess. Like many other wildlife lovers, I just want to know that she has survived another winter and has chosen to spend time around the

Island. This year we didn't have to wait long – using the unique patterns in her fur, we identified Duchess resting in the Island's waters on 4th January 2022 – yippee! Then on 20th January more records of seals were collected by a dedicated group of volunteers linked to Looe Marine Conservation Group and Cornwall Seal Group. The volunteers have been monitoring the Island's seals for over a decade. When conditions allow, they are ferried over to the Island for monthly surveys where they also monitor the Island's birds and butterflies. January's highlight was observing Flowstones (a beautifully marked female seal) having what looked like a particularly satisfyingly scratch!

New Year: A belated 'Happy New Year' to all our members and friends. A special thank you to all of those who managed to attend our first meeting of the year on Monday 3rd January even though it was officially New Year's Day Bank Holiday.

Branch Meetings: We always hold our meetings on the first Monday of the month, come rain, shine or even New Year's Day, with the only restraint being any Covid-19 restrictions. Everyone is welcome to attend our friendly and informal meetings. If you are thinking of joining the 'Legion', or just want to know what we do, then please come along to one of our meetings with no obligation to become a member. Meetings start at 7.30pm sharp in the ground floor bar of the Looe Social Club, West Looe Quay. They don't last more than an hour and then become a social evening. You don't need to be a member of Looe Social Club to attend our meetings.

Looe RBL Annual Dinner: We are glad to announce that our annual dinner will be held at the Rivercroft Hotel, Station Road, East Looe, on Friday 18th February. Meeting at 6.30pm for a 7pm meal. Looe War Memorial Railings: We thank the Looe Harbour Commission for taking the initiative and looking into the refurbishment of the Looe War Memorial railings. The actual granite memorial is a grade 2 listed monument. The railings are over a hundred years old and have become badly corroded in some areas and could become dangerous due to sharp edges.

British Nuclear Test Veterans' Association (BNTVA): The BNTVA is a registered charity set up with the aim of providing welfare for British nuclear test veterans, their families and descendants. The association promotes research into the effects of nuclear radiation and also wants to gain recognition for the British Nuclear Test veterans. The veterans were part of the British and American nuclear tests in Australia and the central Pacific Ocean. Many of them were on their National Service, few volunteering for the tests, and most in their early twenties. They performed a wide range of duties, from highly technical preparations for the detonations to catering and clerical jobs. But whatever their role, they were all required to witness the detonations as part of their 'indoctrination' for the possibility of nuclear war. Most of them were required to line up on the beach, with their backs to the detonations and their hands over their eyes for the first minute or so. They were then allowed to turn around and look at the awesome sight as the mushroom cloud plumed thousands of feet into the air. Very few wore more than shorts and sandals during their time at the tests; only those who were thought to be at risk from radiation injury were issued with protective clothing and radiation dose badges.

It is believed that over 22,000 British servicemen participated in the tests and clean-ups between 1952-1965. Due to the passage of time and illness most of them have now passed away, but it is estimated that ten percent are still with us. In the Looe branch of the RBL, we have at least one nuclear veteran and just a few years ago we lost another nuclear veteran, due to cancer. We Will Remember them: We are always interested to hear of stories or anecdotes referring to Looe's wartime history or the military service of the people of Looe. We are also pleased to receive additional information or corrections on the information of our fallen that is displayed at the war memorial. Once such case was that of Thomas Peake Martin who was killed when the destroyer he was on, H.M.S. Jaguar, was torpedoed and sank in the Mediterranean in March 1942. His daughter has contacted us and pointed out that that, unknown to us, Thomas had been widowed and had remarried in 1939. She, the daughter, was born in 1941 and, although Thomas knew of her, he never managed to set eyes on his daughter. We've apologised for our error and are in the process of updating the information about Thomas displayed at the war memorial.

The 1932 Absent Voters Roll: During the reassessing of our information on Thomas Peake Martin we came across his name in the 1932 Absent Voters Roll for the Parishes of East and West Looe. Absent voters are away from their home but can still vote by post or proxy. There are 52 men, including Thomas, on the 1932 roll for Looe and it makes interesting reading. The largest group, not unsurprisingly, are at sea in a civilian capacity, five are in the Merchant Navy but another 18 are listed as 'yachtsmen' and another one is given as a 'sailor' on the yacht "Tamises". Then we have 21 men in the Royal Navy, with trades such stoker, cook, plumber and a number of Petty Officers. There are three men listed as serving in the Army, another three in the R.A.F. and one in the Royal Marines. It seems a lot of men to be away from home in peace-time but it must be remembered that in 1932 the country was in the grips of the 'Great Depression', so perhaps they had no other alternative than to find employment away from home. Keeping safe on the coast

Over the winter months there is no RNLI lifeguard cover on any beaches. Please take extra care, remember to Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help. If you need help or see someone in difficulties call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

Remember to pay attention to the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.

Open water / cold water swimming

Open Water Swimming is becoming more popular around our coasts – whether you're swapping the swimming pool for open water or just enjoying a quick dip, please take care. Safety information can be found on the RNLI website https://mli.org/safety/choose-your-activity/open-water-swimming.

DEFIBRILLATOR APPEAL



- Each year, there are over 30,000 cardiac arrests where emergency services attempt resuscitation outside of hospital, in the UK.
- · Cardiac arrests can affect people of any age and fitness.
- Only around 1 in 10 people survive a sudden cardiac arrest in the UK, and a person's chance of survival decreases by up to 10% every minute without CPR and defibrillation.
- Bystanders can make a big difference if they take the right action fast.

Currently public access defibrillators are used in fewer than 1 in 10 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests, according to RCUK, even though there is an initially shockable rhythm in approximately 1 in 4 patients. When it comes to cardiac arrest, members of our community are the most important links in the Chain of Survival.

The first three steps: early recognition and call for help, early CPR and early defibrillation – all depend on a speedy response by members of the public. However, early defibrillation is dependent on a public access defibrillator being nearby. When 999 is called for a patient who is unconscious and not breathing, normally the caller will be told how to provide CPR. If there is someone else available, they will be sent to get the nearest defibrillator. In order to be most effective, it is suggested that there should be a defibrillator available every 200m in highly populated areas. Unfortunately, communities do not have the resources available to achieve this.

During 2018, the Looe community, supported by South Western Ambulance Service Foundation Trust (SWAST), raised funds to place 14 public access defibrillators around the town (making 17 in total). In addition, a number of Basic Life Support and Defibrillator training sessions have been provided to members of the public, clubs and local schools, by SWAST during the past four years. Since the project was established, the units have been deployed to many incidents and the training provided has been used to help family members, friends and complete strangers.

We now need to raise £16,000 by May 2022 to enable us to continue providing lifesaving training and to extend our defibrillator contract for a further four years. This equipment and training really can be the difference between 'life and death'. We are therefore once again asking for people to support this very worthwhile cause. We all hope that a cardiac incident will never happen to us, our family members or our friends. But in reality, cardiac arrests can affect any one of us, as was proven by the incident with the professional footballer Christian Eriksen, back in June. Last summer, I lost a very dear friend due to a cardiac incident. Within two minutes of the 999 call being made, CPR was being given to my friend by members of our community and one of the town's defibrillators had been retrieved and was in use. On this occasion, it was not possible to save a life. However, thanks to the knowledge of members of our community and the availability of a defibrillator, my friend was given the best possible chance of survival, and I am comforted by that.

Two days previously, a different community defibrillator was taken to assist a visitor in the town who was taken ill in one of the restaurants. This person was not known to our local community and yet they were afforded the same care and availability of equipment as 'one of our own'. Having worked closely with SWAST since the Looe Defibrillator Project was established four years ago, I am able to advise that these are just two of a number of incidents that have occurred in the town since the project was established. I would like to say a personal huge 'Thank You' to all the organisations and individuals who, by for raising funds for the original Looe Defibrillator scheme, gave my dear friend a chance of life. I would also like to say 'Thank You' on behalf of all the other people, where Looe's defibrillators have been taken, either as a precaution or used for their intended purpose, on friends, family members or loved ones. I am sure that they are just as grateful to you all, as I am.

Everyone is aware that the Ambulance service is currently stretched beyond its means. It is therefore, more important than ever before, that all small towns and villages in Cornwall, do their best to educate as many people as possible (regardless of age) in basic life support and defibrillation, in addition to providing the equipment that could help to save a life.
