NEWS FROM THE EAST LOOE TOWN TRUST



Platinum Jubilee: 2nd-5th June 2022: The Jubilee weekend will kick off with beacons being lit nationwide on Thursday 2nd June at 9.45pm. ELTT are delighted to have registered the Wooldown Beacon as one of the 1500 taking part. The lighting of the beacon will be the climax to an evening Wooldown event which is being organised by the Looe Lions in conjunction with the Trust. They have organised similar events before and will take care to liaise with neighbours to ensure a safe and enjoyable event, from the music and refreshments, to the parking, transport and portaloos. The highlight will be the lighting of the beacon supervised by Trust staff, who have been itching to fire it up since they erected the replacement beacon last year. It had been constructed by apprentices at DML Devonport Royal Dockyard.

The Swim Zone Buoys have been put out for their second season by the maintenance team and Trust Manager Jane Day, making the most of a big spring tide to get them in position. They were universally well received last year, and although it is a little before the 1st May start date for the swimming season it is important to get them in place during a suitable low tide. We are confident that they will do a good job of preventing a clash of water-based activities inside the swimming zone, as the beach gets busier from Easter.



Look, no hands!

Guildhall: Lime Mortar is marvellous stuff. It plays an important part in our Guildhall Clocktower restoration work, because it has a soft grip on the stones; but it does not like being too cold, too wet or too hot. Happily, we have not lost very many days work - and those mainly through high winds on the scaffolding! We have taken advantage of a once in two lifetimes opportunity to get high access to all four clock faces. The fretwork frames will be fully resealed and all glass replaced. Clock hand bearings mechanisms will be fully serviced and gold leaf reapplied to the dial rings. It's specialist work and it must be done right. The Clocktower is without doubt the most prominent building in East Looe and because of that can help lead the way in the regeneration of the town centre. The work is

supervised by conservation surveyors, Scott & Co. of Truro.

Museum: The Old Guildhall Museum & Gaol will reopen for the season on Monday 4^{th} April. Come in and check out the new look and features. All my Trustee colleagues would like to give our thanks to the brilliant team of volunteer guides, without whom we could not open the Museum to the public.

TripAdvisor has pages for three attractions owned by ELTT in Looe – The Old Guildhall Museum & Gaol, the Wooldown, and East Looe Beach. 

It looks like we had engaged some local help in those days and were planting trees at the bottom of the Downs. I cannot see any date on the photo but I am sure some of you will recognise some faces.



Adults included: Dave Symons (the Clerk to the Trustees back when I worked at Lloyds Bank), Alan Lancaster (local police), Margaret Dan (teacher at the top school), Jim Soady (Trustee), John Bassett (WLTT Chairman/Trustee), Ken Pengelly (WLTT Chairman/Trustee).

Children are now all my age: Jeremy Lancaster, Morys Southern, John and Neil Scantlebury.

Nowadays we are lucky to have a great team of maintenance contractors (Tris Wearing, Dave Ede and Peter Samuels) who help us keeping the Downs in good order to be enjoyed by all of us.

Our work today is the same as it was back then and we are still working on enhancing our areas in West Looe and helping the residents of Looe. Some of the works we are currently looking into include providing new and additional lighting in the car park area at Downs Gate, providing more dog bins on the Downs and repairing our seats on the walkway at the Bridge.

School Grants are still being offered and this year we are looking to donate £38,000 to over 70 local children to help them with the studies and associated expenses. Please do watch our website for the new application form to be completed for 2022/23 grant applicants available later this year.

WEST LOOE SQUARE QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE STREET PARTY

Plans are moving forward for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Street Party in West Looe Square. The event combines the West Looe May Fayre into Jubilee celebrations for this year only over the long bank holiday weekend on 4th June from 10.30am-3pm.

May Fayre organiser Edwina Hannaford said, "We were concerned about the capacity and resources required to hold the May Fayre when three weeks later there is an opportunity to hold a party for the Queen to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee over the extended bank holiday weekend from 2nd-5th June as part of the town-wide celebrations."

Sheila Brock who runs Sheila's School of Dancing in Looe and also organises the May Fayre said, "The West Looe May Fayre Committee are therefore proposing we collaborate with others who may want to hold a traditional street party in West Looe Square around the fire station, on Saturday 4th June and NOT hold the May Fayre on 7th May this year."

"The West Looe May Fayre committee would be pleased to help organise stalls, dancing and entertainment as usual, but would need to attract others to organise other elements of the street party and help on the day."

May Fayre organiser Julie Simmons said, "We are working with the Town Council to feed into the town-wide organisation of the Queens Platinum Jubilee celebrations."

Edwina concluded, "We are looking for a wider pool of volunteers to help plan this event, obtain all the necessary permissions, licenses, insurance and risk assessments, promotion, the food element and of course help on the day."

LOOE ISLAND NATURE RESERVE UPDATE



Yes, as ever Spring marks the start of another season of public trips to Looe Island Nature Reserve. We like to try to open around the end of March as the island looks so beautiful at this time of year. Before then there's always a flurry of jobs to be completed before we can open — benches to repair, signs to put up and paths to clear. And the speculation...who will be on the first public boat trips?

Once landed, our first visitors can follow the self-guided trail and encounter the delights of an island Spring. One of the highlights is the enormous variety of blooming daffodils. When the Atkins sisters purchased the island back in the 1960s it still had a horticultural business, with the focus on cut flowers. Today, in certain parts of the island it's mainly the daffodils that remain growing in brightly coloured rows.



Elsewhere there are carpets of lush green leaves of wild garlic (ramsons) and clumps of 'prima rosa or 'first rose' of the year...which in fact alludes to the pale yellow flowers of Primrose.



Photos by Claire Lewis: Former horticulture field with pale yellow daffodils and Primrose Flitting amongst the early blooms we've already spotted six different types of butterfly. Some of the earliest individuals will have overwintered as adults, hidden away in sheltered corners, emerging on the first sunny days of Spring. One of my favourites is the stunning, rich russet coloured Peacock butterfly. It also has those striking azure eyespots which it can flash to deter potential predators. Did you know it also makes a threatening sound? It rubs its wings together to produce a warning hissing sound.



Another highlight of any trip is the chance to see wonderful grey seals. Most visitors encounter seals as they rest in the sea. When we tell people that the seal is probably asleep, this always surprises and impresses them, as wouldn't it be lovely and relaxing to sleep in the sea? Seals can sleep on land too – indeed they do need plenty of undisturbed rest as it's a time to digest food and replenish their energy levels, especially if they are going through their moult.

As to the birds, well we spotted our first attempts of nest building by the wonderful reptilian like Cormorants way back in December! So now there are plenty of young nosily calling as they beg for food. Another black bird that's nesting on the secluded cliffs is the impressive Raven. Even if they don't see these birds, many visitors will hear their deep cronking calls as patrol the island. A similar honking noise comes from the Canada Geese, as yes, again at least two pairs have chosen the island as a place to breed. And finally, there are the magnificent Great Black-backed Gulls – remember these are the world's largest gull! We are proud to say that the island supports Cornwall's biggest breeding colony of these gulls and nest building is underway!

LOOE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION





Falklands 40: To mark the 40th Anniversary of the start of the Falklands War Looe Royal British Legion have commissioned a sand drawing of the Falkland Islands on East Looe Beach on Saturday 2nd April 2022. The sand drawing will be carried out by the Plymouth College of Art and, weather permitting, the work on the sand drawing will commence with a two-minute silence at 11am to remember all that served in the conflict and especially those who never returned home to their families. Seven members of our Looe Branch were involved in the conflict which started on 2nd April 1982. It was the first military action since the Second World War that utilised all elements of the Armed Forces plus the invaluable contribution by the British Merchant Navy. The conflict lasted 74 days, during which seven ships were lost to enemy action, nine aircraft were shot down, and 255 British personnel lost their lives. Their names are all inscribed on the Armed Forces Memorial at the National Arboretum, Alrewas, Staffordshire.

There are veterans of the Falklands Conflict who still struggle with physical and mental scars, and some have faced life challenges or hardships since then. The Royal British Legion remains committed to ensuring that service and sacrifice in more recent conflicts is recognised and that all generations of the Armed Forces community know the RBL is here to support them, for life.

Looe Poppy Appeal: All the work carried out by the Royal British Legion is made possible by the generous contributions made by the public to the Poppy Appeal. True to our unofficial branch motto that "A poppy isn't just for November" our branch will be present in the area of the East Looe Guildhall on Friday 1st April and collecting for the Poppy Appeal and, as always, looking to recruit new members. Looe Defibrillator Appeal Donation: Our branch has donated £100 to the appeal to extend the town's heart defibrillator maintenance contract for another four years. We must stress that the donation did not come from the Poppy Appeal, but from generous contributions by our branch members. Our Poppy Appeal collections go directly to the Cornwall Poppy Appeal and then on to the National Poppy Appeal.

Looe RBL Annual Dinner: Our annual branch dinner was held on Friday 18th February at the Rivercroft Hotel. It was attended by over 30 members and friends, and enjoyed by one and all. Our thanks go out to everyone who braved the weather to attend the dinner and especially to the Rivercroft management and staff for producing a wonderful meal and great evening.

Looe War Memorial: The refurbishment of the Looe War Memorial railings by the Harbour Commission is due to start shortly. Also, one of the boards displaying the potted histories of Looe's WW2 casualties has 'disappeared' from the railings. We have therefore decided to remove all the displayed histories of our WW2 fallen. Hopefully, we will eventually come up with a method of displaying the histories of all those named on the memorial, 35 from WW1, 39 from WW2 and Paul Upton killed in Afghanistan in 2009.

Lest We Forget: In 2017, various organisations in Looe, including the RBL, were contacted by a Mr Jan Vos from the Netherlands who was writing a book on the Battle of Otterlo, the last battle to take place in the Netherlands in WW2. He was seeking a photograph of Harry Tambling, from Looe, who was killed in the battle which took place just three weeks before the end of the war in Europe. After five years still no photograph of Harry was forthcoming until just recently when Ivor Toms unearthed one. The Looe Museum then passed a copy to the book's author and, kindly, ourselves. We are informed that Harry Tambling is on the right of the photograph, Maxwell Pengelly in the middle and William Jay on the left. Sadly, all three Looe lads died in WW2. Maxwell (William Hoskin) Pengelly was killed when the Japanese sank the battleship H.M.S. Repulse in December 1941. William (Toby) Jay was killed in the Battle for Normandy in June 1944. We have sent a copy of the photograph to Toby's son, Peter, who was just a month old when his father died. Peter hadn't seen the photograph before and he is about to visit France in the next few weeks to see his father's name on the Normandy Memorial.

A Dyslexic friendly leaflet.


A 'social story' that tells users what they can expect when they visit the library.

The Millpool, and only the Millpool, will be fitted with a contactless payment system. A large amount of research has gone into this project, and we are confident that this decision will enable us to better provide for our town. We are looking at options such as "locals' cards" to allow for continued free use for residents. We want to provide the best service possible for the community and we need to be proactive now to be able to do this.

Our long-term aim is to use the income to refurbish every public convenience across the town and become more environmentally friendly! Our mission after all is all about how we can make Looe a great place to live, work in, visit AND invest in. We did not take this decision lightly – we are aware that the cost of living is ever rising, and we wanted to take a proactive step now to ensure we could keep the precept as low as possible for all of you in the future.

Keeping safe on the coast

With the lighter evening as the clocks go forward and Easter fast approaching you may be thinking about going out on the water again. Before you venture out it is a good idea to check your lifejacket is still fit for purpose by getting it checked and serviced by the manufacturer or recommended agent. More information about lifejackets can be found at: https://rnli.org/safety/lifejackets

The same goes for your boat engine or outboard motor, have they been serviced and checked for any defects before going out to sea for the first time this year? More information and advice can be found at:

RNLI lifeguard cover has not started yet an many beaches so please take extra care, remember to Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help. If you need help or see someone in difficulties call 999 and ask for the coastguard.

If you are on East Looe beach, check the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.

Open water / cold water swimming

Open Water Swimming is becoming more popular around our coasts – whether you're swapping the swimming pool for open water or just enjoying a quick dip, please take care. Safety information can be found on the RNLI website https://rnli.org/safety/choose-your-activity/open-water-swimming

LOOE FLOOD DEFENCE SCHEME


We remain committed to ensuring all parts of the local community have the opportunity to help shape the emerging design for the flood defence and regeneration scheme. Building on the engagement events held last November, we are holding a series of workshops during the last week of April to provide an update on the scheme and further explore what stakeholders, the community and businesses see as the key priorities for the breakwater layout of the flood defence design.

Details are being confirmed but will include a public event at the Quayside Centre on Saturday, 30th April. We will be publishing information about the workshops, with details about how people can get involved, on the Let's Talk Cornwall web page site https://letstalk.cornwall.gov.uk/hub-page/looe-flood-defence and in the media as soon as the arrangements have been finalised.

The last few weeks have been incredibly busy as we have been collecting information on tidal levels and tide flows, completing additional bird and bat surveys, together with further work on mapping the sea grass beds and the location of stalked jelly fish, and assessing options and locations for the flood gates, Hannafore Walkway and working on the designs for the modification of and extension to Banjo Pier and the associated new southern breakwater. We have also been working with partners to identify up-river opportunities to enhance fish spawning and migration to help enhance the local environment.

The engagement events are part of the ongoing conversation regarding the overall scheme and we want as many people as possible to take part. Further events will also be taking place later in the year.






