

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# NEWS FROM THE EAST LOOE TOWN TRUST



As September draws to a close, East Looe Beach and Seafront can look back on a season of mainly good-to-marvellous weather, and visitor numbers on the beach as high as people can remember in recent years. People seemed relaxed in what felt like a proper post-Covid season.

The safe swim-zone buoys that we tethered last year continue to be appreciated by beach users and do a good job of keeping unauthorised boats and jet skis away from swimmers. On one occasion that came to notice, some antisocial behaviour was dealt with by our team with some good cooperation with Harbour Commissioner's staff. The buoys will be brought in for the winter after the end of September.

The Wooldown bee glades and wildflower meadow should be cut at the end of September. Being on a steep slope facing the sea the bee glades will be cut this year using the same remote-controlled flail mower that was used to beat down dense bracken and bramble in year one when it stood more than six feet tall and totally obscured the sea view from the main higher path. Over the years, it had taken over and severely restricted biodiversity.

This year we are grateful to Trelay Holiday Park for their generous £500 donation towards the conservation work. Species of flowers and wildlife are increasing year on year, mainly by natural regeneration.

ELTT are again working with town organisations to bring on the Christmas light display that cheers the town centre. The Big Switch-on is planned for Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> December and we will be powering up the East Looe festoons as usual. Power costs are up, but happily the festoons are modern ones with relatively low power consumption. Our thanks to Dave Holford and the lighting crew, the Harbour Commissioners, our own staff and all who make it happen.

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
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## CHANGING OF THE GUARD

### A PERSONAL VIEW

As we travelled up to London on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> September, little did we realise what a different weekend we would have from what we were expecting. I looked at the news on my phone to see what had happened in Parliament re energy price caps. But the headline was something very different – the statement from the Palace. Immediately we realised that this was very likely leading to the end of the reign, and life, of HM Queen Elizabeth II. In the evening shortly after the announcement of her death, the restaurant we were in asked for a minute's silence in honour of Her Majesty. This was perfectly observed by everyone.

On the Friday, we were due to attend the second day of the test match at the Oval. As this was called off we decided to go to the Tower of London to hear the 96 gun salute. We thought that it would be less crowded – we were wrong. There were people from all walks of life, international tourists, UK tourists, workers on their lunch breaks. There were crowds on both sides of the river. Shortly before the first shot the crowd fell silent and reflective. All you could hear for the next 15 minutes or more was each round of the salute followed by the echo of the Hyde Park salute. After the 96th round, the crowd broke into sustained applause. Walking around the streets, there was a sense of quiet, people lost in their own thoughts. Personally, I felt unsettled and, actually, just plain sad.

Another thing that struck us was that many of those who normally get their news online had reverted to printed editions on Friday. There was not a national newspaper to be had and I can assure you I trudged miles looking for one!

The powers that be decided that cricket would resume on Saturday and asked that everyone arrive early for a tribute to Her Majesty before play started. A few minutes before play was due to start members of the services came out to form a guard of honour and the crowd fell silent. When the umpires and teams walked out the silence continued. The South African National anthem was sung and then our national anthem. It seemed surreal to be singing God Save our Gracious King and having to concentrate to make sure the words were right, but the whole crowd did so in full voice — a sound I will never forget. Followed by a huge and long-lasting round of applause.

The Queen meant many things to many people and always will. But the things which shone through were her kindness, loyalty and dedication to duty. May she rest in peace.



## Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

On behalf of everyone involved with Looe RNLI Lifeboat Station, we send our heartfelt condolences to The Royal Family on the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The Queen dedicated 70 years as Patron of the RNLI. Her Majesty's support for our lifesavers – and our cause – will never be forgotten.

Over the period of mourning, we adhered to the UK Government flag protocol, lowering our station flag to half-staff. Our flag remained at half-staff until 8am on the day after the funeral of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

As a mark of respect and in line with RNLI protocols our shop and boathouse remained closed to the public until after the funeral.

#### **Shouts**

Our crew at Looe have been ready to answer the pager and rescue those in difficulty. Between 28<sup>th</sup> July 2022 and 12<sup>th</sup> September 2022 our volunteer crews responding to eight shouts. More information on these shouts can be found at www.looelifeboats.co.uk/recentshouts.

### Keeping safe on the coast

As autumn approaches, RNLI lifeguard cover starts to wind down on our beaches, and patrols on Freathy beach have already finished for the year. RNLI lifeguard patrols on Seaton and Sharrow beaches finish on 25th September. Tregantle beach will have weekend only patrols until 25th September. Tregonhawke beach will be patrolled daily until 25th September, then weekends only until October half term when lifeguards will be there daily from 22nd-30th October when patrols will finish for the year.

Please check the beach information boards for duty times and any safety messages.

When there are no lifeguard patrols it is more important than ever to Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help. If you need help or see someone in difficulties call 999 and ask for the coastguard.

If you are on East Looe beach, check the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.

#### Float to live

All our RNLI volunteers are asking you to make the right call.

If you see someone struggling in the water, fight your instinct to jump in and help. Stay on land, phone 999 and ask for the Coastguard at the coast, or Fire & Rescue when inland.

Tell the person in danger to float on their back and throw them something that floats, which they can use for buoyancy.

## LOOE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION







Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II: It is with deepest sorrow that the Royal British Legion mark the death of our Sovereign and Patron, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The Queen has served as Patron of the Royal British Legion since 6<sup>th</sup> February 1952. We are immensely thankful for her faithful service, and we join the entire Armed Forces community in mourning her loss. Her unwavering commitment to the Armed Forces will be deeply missed and our sincere condolences are with the Royal Family at this time.

King Charles III: At the moment the Queen died, the throne passed immediately, and without ceremony to the heir, Charles, the former Prince of Wales, but he was officially proclaimed King on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> September. As throughout the country, Looe Town Council read an official proclamation of the accession to the throne, at the

Looe War Memorial on Sunday 11th September. We, Looe RBL, weren't officially involved in the event but it was well attended by our branch members, and our Chairman, Louis Portman, raised and lowered the Union Flag at the short ceremony. As ever, the St Pinnock Band was in attendance and played beautifully. Our branch would like to thank Powell's Garden Maintenance for tidying up the War Memorial grass and garden on the day before the ceremony. This was volunteered at short notice and free gratis.

**Armistice Day 2022:** We will be holding our normal Looe Royal British Legion Armistice Day Service at Looe War Memorial on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> November, which will mark the 104th anniversary of the end of 1st World War. The short service will start at 10:40am and end with a two minutes silence at 11am, followed by a bugler playing the Last Post. We hope as many of our branch members and members of the public as possible will attend our service.

**Looe Festival of Remembrance:** On Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> November 2022, St Pinnock Brass Band is holding a community 'Festival of Remembrance' in the Riverside Church. The band has well established links with the town and is delighted to provide this night of entertainment and reflection on the armistice weekend. Featuring traditional music alongside new, soloists and full band arrangements, it should be an excellent night of music. There will also be a reflective section where the Looe roll of honour will be read, and we rededicate ourselves to the act of Remembrance. Information about tickets sales will be available on the St Pinnock Facebook page.

**Remembrance Sunday 2022:** Looe Town Council will be joining with the Royal British Legion for the Remembrance Sunday service at the Looe War Memorial on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> November. The event will start at 10:30am with a procession of Councillors and wreath layers from the Guildhall to the War Memorial. Again, after the wreath laying and prayers, there will be a two minutes silence at 11am.

This year the formal Poppy Appeal runs from the last Friday in October until Remembrance Sunday but, as ever, our branch collects for the appeal throughout the year.



# NEWS FROM THE OLD GUILDHALL MUSEUM AND GAOL



The Museum will be closing for the season on October 30<sup>th</sup>. We thank all of our visitors for your lovely comments, and special thanks go to all of our volunteers who give up their time for so many weeks and make all of our visitors, young and old, feel so welcome.

Our 2023 season will begin on March 27<sup>th</sup> with a new exhibition about Thomas Bond, a solicitor who was appointed as Town Clerk in East Looe in 1789, the same year that his father was elected Mayor of East Looe. In 1823, while still in office, he published Topographical and Historical Sketches of the Boroughs of East and West Looe, which he described as a 'labour of love'. This is now recognised as a very important history of Looe.

We will also have a new exhibition about the Boats of Looe, and we hope to have an exhibition of John Southern's photographs and stories of Looe towards the end of 2023.

The Mayor, CIIr Edwina Hannaford, made the following address at the Commemorative Civic Service for HM Queen Elizabeth II on Sunday 18th September 2022:



"Welcome.

We are here to celebrate and acknowledge a life of incomparable service. We are here to offer sympathy and support for a family who have lost their mother, grandmother, great grandmother.

She has been a constant in all our lives, the Matriarch of the nation and of her family.

She has always been there, so we rightly feel a sense of loss. She was a human anchor of familiarity and stability in a scary world.

This may be the end of the second Elizabethan era but what we have seen is a seamless transition in proclaiming King Charles III as the new monarch to perpetuate that constancy.

We also feel the weight of history. Her Majesty and indeed King Charles have a direct lineage that reaches back to Mary Queen of Scots and James the VI of Scotland who became James I of England in 1603. Over those 600 years our constitutional monarchy has developed. There is much to commend in the separation between head of state and parliament in that it provides a governing continuity, the checks and balances that prevents one body or individual obtaining too much power and a cultural identity.

Queen Elizabeth II leaves behind an extraordinary legacy: the most fantastic example of duty, public service and steadfastness, and a constant, steadying presence as our head of state for more than 70 years. And a wicked, playful sense of humour.

She has given her whole life selflessly to the people of Great Britain, Northern Ireland and the Commonwealth.

She exemplified loyalty, duty, respect, consistency, and love.

She espoused British values of tolerance, patriotism and internationalism demonstrated by her affection and support for the Commonwealth. She operated for the first years of her reign, principally in a man's world and did so with courage, conviction, grace, and intelligence, adhering to her pledge to serve our country and its citizens.

She was driven by duty. This duty underpinned her whole being. She kept her promise to dedicate her life to her role. She was sustained by faith, made happy by her love for her dogs and horses and of course her family. She was a remarkable human being, kind, considerate, consistent, instinctively generous and forgiving. She was the best and brought out the best in others. A wonderful example to us all as civic leaders.

I've heard the term 'soft power' used a lot to describe how she operated. Coined in the late 1980s, the term soft power is the ability of a country to persuade others to do what it wants without force or coercion, shaping the preferences of others through appeal and attraction. She was the master of soft power.

I admit I felt unsettled at the news of her passing, a bit discombobulated. It hurt because it mattered. I've learned that grief is another name for love and that no matter how deep your grief makes a home inside you, love will always leave a door

open.

Rest in peace Ma'am.

God Save the King."

# LOOE FLOOD DEFENCE AND REGENERATION SCHEME: UPDATE

Following the success of the engagement events earlier this year, we are finalising plans for a series of further events towards the end of October.

The team has reviewed the feedback provided by members of the public and local businesses on the draft plans. The aim of these events is to enable people to hear the story so far, give an update on progress and options considered, and to provide an opportunity to input into finishes and materials.

Three community drop in events are scheduled to take place in the town. These are:

- 2pm and 6pm, Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> October
- 10am and 4pm, Friday 21st October
- 10am and 4pm, Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> October

All three sessions will be drop-in events which will be open to all. As before, members of the project team will be on hand to provide the latest information and answer any questions.

There will also be an online event on 31st October - 6pm start on Zoom.

We are also exploring how we can work with Cornwall's artist community to design installations which celebrate Looe and can be incorporated into the final design.

As well as staging the engagement events we want to hear from local businesses. During October we will be inviting businesses to take part in a survey to help support the business case that we are preparing to submit to the government for funding. Information and feedback from local businesses will help us to demonstrate the economic benefits of the project and support our case for investment in flood defence and regeneration in Looe.

Members of the project team will be contacting local businesses in the coming weeks to take part in the survey and we would be very grateful for your time and participation. If you would like to know more or are interested in participating in the survey please contact us at: LooeFloodDefence@wsp.com.

Looe is already the most frequently flooded coastal town in the UK. Over the next 100 years, sea levels are predicted to rise by more than one metre as a result of climate change, threatening even more parts of the town. These include the Health Centre, the Police and Fire Stations, main food stores and cafes, and the Fish Market, as well as major transport links such as the A387 and the Railway Station. Doing nothing is not an option and we want to ensure that the final Flood Defence and Regeneration Scheme meets the needs of all parts of the local community.

We will be providing more details about the events on our Let's Talk site: https://letstalk.cornwall.gov.uk/looe-flood-defence and also in the local media, so watch out for more information.

### LOOE COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS

I'm not sure how much the people of Looe know about CFRs but we are volunteers who are trained by the NHS to support their local community by attending emergency calls ahead of an ambulance.

CFRs attend particular types of emergencies where it is essential for the patient to receive immediate life-saving care. This includes conditions such as:

- cardiac arrest
- chest pain
- · breathing difficulties
- · unconscious patients
- · fitting patients
- · patients suffering from a stroke

We also have CFRs who have undergone additional lifting training, who carry lifting chairs, enabling them to attend patients who have fallen and who are uninjured but who are unable to get up from the floor.

Looe also has a Tri-Service Safety Officer (TSSO). This is an innovative and flexible role. It combines Police, Ambulance and Fire and Rescue Services. The Tri-Service Safety Officer's purpose is to provide early intervention and prevention. The role provides an operational response (Fire and Ambulance only) through collaborative working between:

- Devon and Cornwall Police (DCP)
- · Cornwall Fire, Rescue and Rescue Service (CFRS) Service
- South Western Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust (SWASFT)
- Cornwall Council's Anti-Social Behaviour Team

The role has an innovative approach to resolving community safety matters. The role targets and aligns with the service's priorities of:

- protection
- prevention
- response

Many of us also volunteer for FLEET (Front Line Emergency Equipment Trust). FLEET provides equipment to the emergency teams in Cornwall, 999 Ambulances and Coast Guards. This year FLEET raised enough money to deliver a state-of-the-art Raizer chair to every care home in Cornwall. Working with Kernow Clinical Commissioning Group, Kernow Health CIC and the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Health and Care Partnership, FLEET are providing every care home in Cornwall with a Raizer 2 Lifting Chair. The aim of this project is to reduce "long lies" after a fall and reduce the pressure on Cornwall's emergency response.

With the Tri-Service responders, FLEET will provide training to nursing home staff in the use of the Raizer chair. I had the pleasure of delivering a chair to Rivermead care home in Looe, I don't think they could quite believe that they were being given this chair for nothing!

However, as a mark of respect for our late Queen who passed away in the afternoon of Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> September, the RNLI cancelled its programme of events in all its branches until after the funeral. We look forward to singing again for the RNLI in 2023.

We were due to sing as part of the programme for Looe Live which unfortunately had to be cancelled. Instead, we were asked to sing on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> September at 2pm in the Rose Garden in East Looe.

Our diary for November and December is already very full and we will let you know those dates in the next edition of the Looe Community News.

### **Fundraising**

We need to fundraise all year round as the choir needs to pay for its music, musical director, accompanist, the rent for its rehearsal venue etc. We have a Fundraising Coordinator but everybody in the choir is asked to think of fundraising ideas which they could hold. ## WHAT'S NEW ON LOOE ISLAND?



Apples are ripe for the picking, the sea is getting wilder, and the woods are carpeted with crunchy brown leaves – autumn has arrived early this year. In fact, the weather has changed so much and so quickly that the Island is almost unrecognisable from its summer splendour. The wild September weather, though, brings its own beauty. It is getting darker earlier, and the temperature is dropping, which allows us to appreciate a more moody, mysterious side of the Island. In keeping with the changes in weather and season, we've been seeing fewer butterflies, but more moths, ladybirds, and lots of pale tussock caterpillars. We have also been spotting more mushrooms than ever!



Due to some strong easterly winds, we had a whole week where it was not possible for day trippers to visit, but over the last few days we've been welcoming visitors once more. Even though the warmest and busiest part of the season is now over, there is still so much wildlife to see. Recently, a kestrel has been spotted on the Island, as well as a kingfisher!

When it comes to birds, however, it's unfortunately not all good news. There has been an increasing number of dead birds on the island, and testing has confirmed that avian flu is now present here. Seeing the gulls sick and dying is a devastating aspect of wildlife to observe. In response to the presence of avian flu, we've introduced some protective measures on the Island to reduce the risk of spreading the disease further.



Amidst all that's been going on here, the Cornwall Wildlife Trust Marine Team visited the island on 12<sup>th</sup> September to carry out surveying work. We really enjoyed meeting the team, and were grateful to get a closer look at the Island's marine wildlife. Whilst the team was here, we also spotted this washed up conger eel.

### **OUR EXPERIENCE: HIGHLIGHTS AND CHALLENGES**

Lukas: "For me, the highlights are endless! I have loved getting to meet so many moths and butterflies, and observing how the species that we get to see change so much over just a few weeks. Seeing an oystercatcher chick hatching out of its egg in front of my eyes was also a really special moment. I'm also quite happy with how this log pile turned out!



Although I have loved chatting to people who visit during day trips, I've found it challenging interacting with members of the public who land without permission. On one occasion, an individual threw litter at me, which was very disappointing behaviour. It was disheartening being treated this way, especially since I was just doing my best to protect wildlife, and keep people safe."

Megan: "I agree with Lukas that there are many highlights to choose from! I have enjoyed acquiring new skills, learning so much about wildlife, and getting to spend every day out in nature. I've particularly enjoyed surveying seals, especially when we spot juvenile ones! When we are off-duty, I've enjoyed walking in the woods, swimming in the sea, and stargazing.

Most people imagine that the greatest challenge of island life is the months we've spent sleeping in a tent, or the fact that we are limited to infrequent showers. However, it is racism that has presented the greatest challenge for me. Although it's been great getting to meet the many friendly faces from the local community, not all encounters have been positive. At this current moment, in the wake of Chris Kaba's death, it feels particularly important to highlight this issue. We believe wildlife is for everyone, and an intersectional approach to environmentalism is essential."

#### WHAT'S NEXT?

As the season draws to a close, we are enjoying the cosiness of our tent (which has held up remarkably well through all manner of weather conditions) and reflecting on the months we've spent living on Looe Island. We will still be welcoming public trips to the island until early October – weather permitting! Alongside this, we are continuing with usual work, including monitoring and surveying duties. Before we leave, we also hope to finish building the flight of steps in the woods as this is a project we've been working on for some weeks. Although we have built dozens of steps now, our favourite one is a beautiful tree root which naturally falls into place alongside our human-made ones which are, by comparison, oafish and clumsy.



As our time on the Island draws to an end, we are thinking about the brief role we have had in its history. Around us are trees who remember the days long before the Atkins sisters set foot here and cemented their legacy. Among these trees are young saplings – yet to be planted – that were donated from Kilminorth Woods earlier this season. One day, these young trees will tower over future visitors to the island, and they will revel, just as we have, in the wild beauty of this special place.

In late October, we will return to the mainland and embark on our own unknown future, and the island will remain, crouching and silent, awaiting the next chapter in its sprawling history.

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
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
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### LOOE SAILING CLUB

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
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### THE FESTIVE SEASON

authorities and those mentioned, the colourful and oft praised displays of lights could not be produced for the town's benefit.

These local authorities and organisations want the lights to be displayed for the benefit of Looe and area to celebrate Christmas 2022, yet, at the same time, they realise we live in a very fluid state at the moment with news changing daily. Everyone is watching and waiting for the next energy news bulletin, hoping for defining news that will lead to a definite result.
