Looking back and looking forward

East Looe Town Trust has put away its Christmas lights from the Rose Garden, the Old Guildhall, and the Seafront for another year, and the Christmas lighting volunteers have unplugged their East Looe festoons from the ELTT electricity meter. We thought the Rose Garden lighted canopy looked great, and several local organisations used it for events and performances. We enjoy being part of the town celebrations and are already thinking about next Christmas.

Based on storm warnings, the New Year's Eve fireworks team made a good call when they cancelled the midnight display. The pyrotechnics were combined with the 6pm children's display that was enjoyed by crowds on the Seafront, Hannafore Point, and the Wooldown. Thank you to the Looe Co-op for leading the fireworks team in recent years. This was apparently their final year, and ELTT looks forward to working with whoever succeeds them in the pre-event planning that goes into providing a safe and professional display.

Many people have been asking us whether there will be another beacon lighting celebration on the Wooldown for Coronation of King Charles in June. Details of the Coronation Weekend have now been published, and do not include beacon events. ELTT will be working closely with leading organisations in town to make sure that Looe will enjoy a memorable weekend. It is now official that there will be national beacon lighting on 6th June 2024 to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the D-day landings.



How did Louisa Ingle go from being a hard-working nurse at London's Guy's Hospital to despised outcast, shunned and condemned for manslaughter?

Caught in a bitter dispute between the hospital's modernisers and traditionalists, she was a scapegoat for the warring factions when the conflict tumbled out of control in the summer of 1880.

This is the story of that struggle and her downfall, and how she learned of the conspiracy that entangled her and drove her into deep despair at the rank injustice of her betrayal.

But it is also the inspiring true story of a group of pioneering women as they stepped out of Florence Nightingale's shadow to establish the value of nursing as a profession for independent women. Their lives were crushed, and their story was buried in a footnote of the history of Guy's. But, because of their efforts, Guy's hospital now has one of the finest Nursing Training Institutes in the world. This is their legacy.

THE FACTS: There are 30.000+ cardiac arrests each year in the UK where emergency services attempt resuscitation outside of hospital. People of any age and fitness can be affected. Only around 1 in 10 people survive a sudden cardiac arrest in the UK, and a person's chance of survival decreases by up to 10% every minute without CPR and defibrillation. Bystanders can make a big difference if they take the right action fast. Currently public access defibrillators are used in fewer than 1 in 10 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests, according to RCUK, even though there is an initially shockable rhythm in approximately 1 in 4 patients. Statistics show that if you can get a defibrillator on a patient within four minutes of a cardiac arrest, the patient has a 70% chance of survival. Each minute after that, a further 10% is lost. When it comes to cardiac arrest, our community provides the most important links in the Chain of Survival. The first key steps; early recognition and call for help, early CPR and early defibrillation, all depend on a speedy response by members of the public. However, early defibrillation is dependent on a public access defibrillator being nearby. When 999 is called for a patient who is unconscious and not breathing normally, the caller will be told how to provide CPR. If there is someone else available, they will be sent to get the nearest defibrillator.

LOOE DEFIBRILLATOR APPEAL - OUR STORY

In order to be most effective, it is suggested that there should be a defibrillator available every 200m in highly populated areas. Unfortunately, communities do not have the resources to achieve this.

January 2018: In early 2018 Looe Harbour Commissioners were contacted by South West Ambulance Service Trust (SWAST) who advised that the defibrillator located on Harbour Commission land, was past its 'use by date' and needed replacement. There was only one other unit in the town at this time. Looe Harbour Commissioners agreed to allow the Harbour Master (Tina Hicks) to lead a town project to get four units funded and installed in key areas in Looe.

July 2018: Over the next few months, the Looe community, supported by SWAST, raised funds to place not four, but 14 public access defibrillators around the town! In addition, Looe Pioneers (with the assistance of Looe Lions) raised funds for three additional FLEET defibrillators, making 17 in total. A four-year support package was agreed with SWAST, and a number of Basic Life Support and Defibrillator awareness training sessions were provided to members of the public, clubs and local schools.

During the first few months of installation, the units were deployed to a number of incidents and the training provided within the project, used by local people to help family members, friends and complete strangers. The same units have been deployed on many occasions since installation, particularly during the summer months, when the town is at its busiest.

November 2021: To maintain the current coverage of defibrillators in the town, the community needed to renew the contracts (for a further four years) on 14 of the 17 community defibrillators, by July 2022. The cost of doing so was estimated to be in the region of £16,000 + VAT. A decision was therefore taken to start fundraising, to ensure that the target was reached in good time.

December 2021: Fundraising began in earnest. Previous sponsors were contacted, and new 'potential' sponsors approached. A huge 'boost' to the fundraising appeal was received when Tregoad Holiday Park agreed to sponsor four of the 14 existing units (that needed renewal), plus one additional unit for Looe Island. A 'Go Fund Me' page was developed, donation avenues publicised, and grant avenues pursued. The Looe Defibrillator brand was developed, with small quantities of merchandise produced to sell at fundraising events and street collections. Local clubs, organisations and members of the public held a wide range of fundraising events from street collections to danceathons. The whole community joined together to reach the fundraising target of £16,000 + VAT.

April 2022: Requests were received for additional defibrillators to be added to the scheme, from the residents of Barbican Hill (whose nearest unit was Lower Quay stores or the Primary School on the Barbican), and the wardens on Looe Island. Concerns were raised with consideration to the increased visitor numbers to the island and the fact that there were two permanent wardens living on the island; the nearest defibrillator being at the Lifeboat station on the mainland.

November 2022: In July 2022, contracts were renewed for the 14 public access defibrillators, plus the additional two that were requested for Looe Island and Barbican Hill (16 units in total). These, with the three FLEET units already in situ, meant that by working together, the Looe community have now installed 19 defibrillators over a much-increased catchment area. Which is fantastic news for locals and visitors alike.

December 2022: The 2022 'Looe Defibrillator Fund Raising Appeal' is now closed. Donations and fundraising efforts raised a further £24,079.74 on top of the funding required for 2022, making a grand total of £44,239.74 raised since December 2021.

This phenomenal sum will mean that (if unit costs remain stable) the funds can be held by Looe Development Trust, to secure the provision of 19 Community Defibrillators for a further eight years!

The Next Steps: A small amount of the funds raised will be used to produce additional signage (indicating defibrillator locations) placed in prominent positions around the town. A QR code system will be developed and publicised, which will be linked to the 'Looe Defibrillator Appeal' information page and will provide details of how to donate to the project moving forward, for anyone wishing to do so.

Our community: is the most important link in the chain of survival. Anyone can use a defibrillator (with or without training).

A Little Bit About Us

Welcome to Looe & Polperro launched at the end of July 2020 as an independent, professional and proactive website and social media campaign. The aim being to give the tourism, hospitality and retail sectors a much-needed boost as Covid was at the height of its impact.

The site was funded and curated by myself, Peter Friend, as a way of giving something back to my home town.

In a short space of time, the site has gained over 200,000 visitors and the Facebook and Instagram pages have approaching 13,000 followers. Over 200 businesses are listed on the site and there has been widespread positive feedback for what's being achieved.

Divided into five key sections for Accommodation, Eating & Drinking, Shopping, Exploring & Activities and Weddings, the website provides an affordable way for local businesses to advertise; illustrating to visitors and potential visitors that our corner of Cornwall should be high on their list of places to visit and stay.

MOOR TO SEA



Throughout the year you will be hearing a lot about a new project called 'Moor To Sea'. This is supported by the Looe Development Trust, and funded through a partnership of organisations, which include the National Heritage Lottery Fund, the Cornwall Heritage Trust, Cornwall and west Devon World Heritage Site, Liskeard and Looe Town Councils and the Devon and Cornwall Rail Partnership (DCRP). Through DCRP the Moor to Sea project secured some further funding from the Community Rail Partnership to focus on the role of the rail branch line in shaping the history and environment of the Looe Valley. Overall, the project is funding heritage-related and environmental volunteering throughout the Looe Valley, including Liskeard and Looe, and aims to celebrate our connection to these wonderful places.

This is a project for the local community and your help in co-creating this is so important. There are many ways you can participate including:

- Tell your story about the Looe Valley and take part in an oral history project.

LOOE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION





A belated 'Happy New Year' for 2023 from the committee and branch members of the Looe Branch of the Royal British Legion. We hope for a Covid and strike free year, but above all we would like to see the end to the cruel Russian aggression against the Ukraine. Our thoughts are with the gallant people of the Ukraine.

Cost of Living Grants: We know how tough things are now, especially with the very large increases to the cost of living we are experiencing. The Legion has launched a national 'Cost of Living Grants Programme'. This is designed to allow us to assist people who need help in a quick and easy way with everyday essentials such as kitchen appliances, clothes, and energy costs. The programme is open to anyone who is eligible for our support (serving, or have served in the Armed Forces, and their dependants or carers) and struggling to pay for items and services they need. You can apply online using Lightning Reach link below: https://www.lightningreach.org/application-portal?referral=rbl

Lightning Reach is a one-stop online grants portal, transforming how people in financial hardship access support. It enables charities and public sector institutions to get financial support to those who need it most, quickly and securely. The aim is to assess applications within 5 working days of submission.

Internet Access: We are fully aware that not everybody has internet access to apply for grants, so we are pleased that the Looe Library has two computers available for public use. To book a computer please telephone the library on 01503 262255.

Veterans Rail Card: In this time of 'belt tightening' we are pleased that a number of our members have provided positive feedback after using the Veterans Rail Card. The card gives a third off most rail fares including Standard and First Class Anytime, Off-Peak and Advance fares across England, Wales and Scotland. You can also nominate a companion to get a third off when travelling with you. If you have served for at least one day in HM's Armed Forces (Regular or Reserve) or have been a Merchant Mariner who has seen duty on legally defined military operations, you should be eligible for a card. An annual Veterans Railcard costs £30 or a three-year card £70. The Veterans Railcard is available to buy online and by post. To learn more about this and other railcards, visit online: www.railcard.co.uk.

War memorial Railings: We are glad to report that the Looe War Memorial railings are now back in place after their refurbishment. Our thanks go out to the Looe Harbour Commission for organising and funding the work at not an inconsiderable cost. Let's hope the railings and memorial last for another 100 years.

Nuclear Test Veterans Medal: It has been announced that a new medal is to be awarded to honour the veterans and civilians who participated in the UK's nuclear test programme from 1952 to 1967. This work contributed to Britain achieving the nuclear deterrent which is still the cornerstone of our defence policy. Sadly, when

the test began the effects of nuclear radiation were little known and safety precautions were rudimentary. It wasn't until much later that a correlation was made between cancer cases and nuclear test veterans. In 1983 the British Nuclear Test Veterans Association charity was set up to gain recognition and restitution for the British nuclear test veterans. The charity also provides welfare to nuclear test veterans, their wives, widows and descendants.

Approximately 22,000 British servicemen participated in the programme but only about 10% of them are alive today. Thankfully, the medal can be awarded posthumously. Veterans, their families and next of kin will need to apply for the medal, which will be free of charge. It is expected that the first awards of the medals will be made in 2023. We will publish more on how to claim the medal when it becomes known.

The Invictus Games: The Games are a multi-sport events, open to all wounded, injured and sick serving military personnel and veterans. The charity 'Help for Heroes' had led 'Team UK' at the Invictus Games since the event was launched, but in 2022 it was announced that the RBL would take over leading the team. The Government said the decision had been made because the RBL could provide 'more personnel', 'secure funding' and 'a commitment to support the team in the future'. The next Invictus Games will be held in Germany in August 2023 and we hope that some recent unfortunate comments in an autobiography will not make the Games a terrorist target.

The Battle Back Centre, Lilleshall, is heavily involved in selecting and training the participants for the 2023 Invictus Games. The centre was established by the Royal British Legion in 2011 to support wounded and injured service personnel returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. It aims to help ensure the best possible recovery for the Armed Forces community, whether it's returning to duty or successfully transitioning to civilian life. More recently the centre has expanded its services with the introduction of wellbeing courses for veterans. Centred around adaptive sport and adventurous training activities, such as wheelchair basketball, archery, mountain biking, climbing and caving, Battle Back helps build camaraderie as well as the chance to connect through shared experiences. The programme is designed to help grow confidence and improve motivation as well as the ability to deal with stress. Delivered alongside expert coaching, it also helps to develop positive thinking – focusing on what someone can achieve instead of what they cannot.

The Defence Medical Rehabilitation Centre (DMRC): The RBL also part funds DMRC Stanford Hall which is a state-of-the-art MoD clinical rehabilitation facility, which replaces the original rehabilitation centre at Headley Court and provides expert care and support for wounded, injured and sick Armed Forces personnel. The RBL is able to fund the Royal British Legion Complex Trauma Gym at the centre; the largest of the DMRC's indoor spaces. Here, patients with complex injuries can focus on regaining mobility, fitness and independence. The Gym demonstrates how your donations can make a huge impact in helping those from suffering major trauma or injury in service. The gym is at the heart of patients'

recovery and rehabilitation, meeting all exercise therapy needs, and run by an expert team of MoD physiotherapists and specialists.

Helplines: If you, or your family, need help or advice from the Legion then please call the Royal British Legion's free helpline on 0808 802 8080. Lines are open 8am to 8pm, seven days a week. Another alternative is the Veterans' Gateway which is a consortium of forces charities, including the RBL, with telephone access 24 hours a day on 0808 802 121.

We'd really like to thank all those involved with Christmas and New Year events in Looe, including East Looe Town Trust, Looe Harbour Commissioners, West Looe Town Trust, Looe Development Trust, Rev. Ben Morgan-Lundie, the Fireworks Committee, Young Farmers Club, Looe Pioneers, Looe Lions, Mike Allsopp, St Pinnock band, all the singers at the lights switch-on and, of course, Santa and his helpers. As things got back to normal after the Covid restrictions, it was great to see Looe so alive throughout December and the community coming together for all the celebrations.

Lots of preparation takes place before the Christmas events, including the lantern-making workshops in November. Thanks to Tencreek for hosting one of those in 2022, we were able to have even more people joining in these fun craft sessions and some great lanterns were created for the procession. Numbers at the lantern procession and Christmas lights switch-on was way above expected, so thanks to all those in the community who came along and joined in. We've already started preparations for this year so watch this space for announcements about future dates.

LOOE COASTGUARD COTTAGES – A PROPOSAL TO BUY AND REFURBISH THE FLATS, FOR SECURE RENTAL TO LOCAL PEOPLE

Cllr Edwina Hannaford, Mayor of Looe, has been working with Simon Ryan of Three Seas Trust and Cornwall Council, supported by Looe Town Council, to bring back into use the flats at Coastguard Cottages in West Looe. The cottages were poorly converted in the 1980s and have suffered from damp, poor sound insulation and drainage issues for many years. The building is Grade 2 listed and has proved difficult to maintain to a high standard by Cornwall Housing Limited because of lack of funds.



Edwina said "As the Cornwall Councillor for Looe West I have been campaigning for the investment required and a better solution to ensure that local people are accommodated first and that the flats are refurbished to the highest standard. I had seen what Three Seas had achieved in Cawsand and on the Rame so made contact to see if they could help. I'm delighted that they were receptive and keen to work with our community to help us deliver much needed social housing in Looe. The need is huge across Cornwall but more so in coastal resorts like Looe. We have seen a collapse in the private rental market where house owners have converted to Airbnbs and holiday lets, leaving a black hole that once accommodated key workers like fire fighters, care and shop workers who work in the town. Rents shot up (if you could find a home) and became unaffordable for local people. This has left shops and care companies unable to fill essential jobs making trading in the town a real challenge."

The idea: The property sits on North Road above Looe harbour and has 11 small one-bed flats. Most are empty, and Cornwall Council is not able to repair them, so they could have been sold at auction for second homes. Three Seas instead propose a community trust for Looe, owned and run by local people to buy and refurbish the flats, then let them at low rents to local people.

How would it work? - In 2021, a community trust in Cawsand bought three ex-Council houses, did a high-standard refurbishment and then let them to local families, at low rents. Some of the people who did that work are starting a new charity, called Three Seas, to copy the Cawsand success in other Cornish coastal communities. Our first project is the Coastguard Flats in Looe. Three Seas has all the skills needed to replicate Cawsand: architect, specialist builder, finance worker, community organiser, publicity/web team. The Charity also has strong support from Looe Town Council and County Councillors.

What happens next? - We now need to know whether the people of Looe want this project to happen. We have to prove there is strong local support, so Three Seas is publicising the project and holding a public meeting.

ACCESSIBILITY IN LOOE

Access Cornwall's audit suggests that we are more accessible than many Cornish towns and we hope that we can continue to welcome all visitors regardless of their access needs. Councillors and Officers are now in the process of collating the available information to help all visitors plan their stay in Looe.

Mayor's Charity: My Mayor's charity this year is Boundless Trust, so with Town Council Officers' help we have been organising a series of Mayor's fundraising events to help with the Trust's invaluable work in helping young people. 100 YEARS OF POLPERRO FISHERMEN'S CHOIR



Polperro Fishermen's Choir is 100 years old this year! One of the oldest male voice choirs in Cornwall, Polperro Fishermen's Choir is unusual because of its two influential founders: Eva Cloke and Tommy Mark. In 1923 Eva Cloke, herself the wife of a fisherman, persuaded many of them to form a choir to preserve their tradition of singing while working. As the organist at the Methodist chapel, Eva had the musical ability to coach the men to sing in harmony and so the newly formed male voice choir of the Polperro fishermen became the first in Cornwall to have a female conductor.

Tommy Mark had been a Polperro fisherman before turning to lay preaching, when he became known as the Fishermen's Bishop, blending religion and the sea in his homilies. His sermons attracted large crowds, sometimes well over 1,000 people, to the combined services and religious concerts given by the choir. Newspapers reported that a 1928 concert in the Devonport Central Hall had a congregation of about 1,500 with many more unable to get in. Such was the fame of the choir and Tommy Mark at the time that a report and photograph appeared in The Sphere, published in London as 'The Empire's Illustrated Weekly'.

Eva Cloke was the choir's musical director for more than 45 years. Murray Collings, who is now the choir vice-president, joined the choir as a teenager in 1952 – the year that Phil Carrigan, our present musical director, was born! At that time, Eva would still be in post for some years to come, so Murray provides a direct link right back to the founding of the choir. As Polperro Fishermen's Choir became a fixture in the village in 1923, non-fishermen were so keen to join that it soon included carpenters, blacksmiths, builders, shopkeepers and farmers in the membership. One founder member, Jack Libby Senior, worked as builder and four of his sons sang in the choir, including Jack Libby Junior who became the choir's musical director in 1971. As a self-taught conductor, it was not always easy for Jack Junior to have father Jack making comments from the back of the choir!

In recognition of his service to choral music in Cornwall, Jack Junior was received into the Gorsedd of Cornwall as a Bard in 1986. He is remembered every December when the Jack Libby Cup is awarded to the choir member with the best attendance

record. Jack Libby Junior was the choir's musical director for over 28 years, handing over to Phil Carrigan in 1999. Phil's 24 years in post (so far) mean that, apart from a few relatively short periods with interim conductors, there have only been three main musical directors in the whole of the choir's 100-year history.

Equally important to the choir is the accompanist. The retirement in 2012 of long-standing accompanist Maisie Hall, daughter of a choir founder member, caused a certain amount of panic in the choir until, so the story goes, a choir member saw a piano being moved into a newly purchased house in Polperro. As if by magic, the incredibly talented Lorraine Forsdick not only accepted the position, but also started writing and arranging music which is unique to the choir and among our most popular pieces.

The choir is also very fortunate in having Adrian Wilton as our compère and comedian. Adrian is very much in demand all over Cornwall but we are very fortunate that he chooses to be a member of our choir. We are also very proud of our supportive presidents. In 2015, the singer Peter Skellern agreed to be our president and remained in post until his very sad early death in 2017 at the early age of 69. Our current president is the writer and broadcaster Richard Madeley who, although constantly busy, gives his active support to our publicity and charity fund-raising, and comes to visit us when he can.

These days we are sometimes confused with the Fishermen's Friends from Port Isaac. We have a similar name, both come from a small Cornish fishing village with a tradition of free concerts, we sometimes sing in the same location at the same event, and the Fishermen's Friends have a similar repertoire to the Polperro Wreckers, a sub-group of the choir. We allow that they have the fame but insist that we have the pedigree!

The choir has a long tradition of giving free concerts while raising thousands of pounds for charities and good causes, and this centenary year will be no exception. The Wreckers can be found every Wednesday evening in Polperro and will be at the Jolly Sailor in West Looe on Saint Piran's Day, Sunday 5th March. At 4.30pm on Saturday 22nd April, Polperro Fishermen's Choir will be welcoming and singing with our guests, the Cotswolds Male Voice Choir, at the Looe RNLI lifeboat station.

LOOE FLOOD DEFENCE AND REGENERATION SCHEME

Following the engagement events held in Looe at the end of last year, we have been analysing the feedback from members of the local community, stakeholders and directly affected property owners.

It was great to welcome so many people to our third information sharing event which sought to explain the background and the need for a flood defence scheme, as well as asking for views on potential materials and finishes for the proposed new structures.

426 people braved the weather to attend one of the face-to-face engagement events held at the Quayside Centre at West Looe, with 627 completing feedback forms, either in person or online. A further 26 businesses have also taken part in our flood-affected business survey.

A copy of the full engagement report is available on the Let's Talk site but below is a summary of the main findings.

More than half of those taking part in the engagement (58%) live in Looe, with 24% stating that they had directly experienced flooding, either as residents or as the owners of local businesses. The most frequent source of flooding cited was the drains (34%) followed by the sea or harbour (30%).

While 44% of respondents said they either strongly supported or supported a scheme to reduce the risk of flooding to Looe, the same number expressed their opposition to the proposed scheme, highlighting concerns over the designs and potential impact on marine life, the environment and the character of the town.

We would like to understand these concerns from the perspective of local businesses and residents more. Therefore, we are currently in conversation with some of these groups and will be continuing to engage with the community to guide the project whilst being mindful of the need to make informed decisions based on the full understanding of social and environmental impacts as well as technical feasibility.

LUGGERS PREVIEW: MAY 19TH - 21ST 2023

Much has happened since 1989 in everyone's lives – and the Cornish Lugger Association family is no exception.

The Association was forced to abandon plans for a 2021 reunion of these old wooden-built working fishing boats because of the Coronavirus pandemic – and although it had been hoped to resume activities in 2022, a clash of dates with Mousehole's Sea Salts and Sail Festival in West Cornwall led to a decision to go back to the traditional 'odd years' format.

Sadly, men, women and boats have all been affected by the ravages of age and ill-health since the 30th anniversary regatta of the luggers in Looe Bay four years ago. People like Happy Return skipper Peter May (Mount's Bay) and Guiding Star's former owner-skipper Barry Jobson (Bristol) have sailed to the heavenly oceans as has former Penzance publican and lugger man Les Rowe (whose brother, Jeff, better known as comedian Jethro, was among the Covid victims) and one-time proud keeper of the I.R.I.S Andy Skentelbery (ex-Polperro).

The French, so often passionate supporters of the Cornish regattas, are mourning losses, too; most recently Le Grand-Léjon's musician and crewman Alexandre Chabrier.

And the organisers of the Regatta have not been immune to the cycle of life either. That familiar and lovable character Lionel ('Leo') Bowdler, for so many years a stalwart of both on-the-water and shoreside activities of the luggers' biennial get-togethers in Looe Bay, has since died and will be missing when his son, Brian, fires the starting gun as race officer for the first parade of sail in May.

Many more will be mourned, too. But life for the lugger community has to go on. And, after a hiatus of four years, caused primarily by the Covid pandemic, there are changes everywhere you look.

Founding chairman Paul Greenwood, universally regarded as the father of the fleet, decided to retire after the last 30th anniversary regatta of the luggers – 'I will be 72 by next time,' he said back then, not knowing 'next time' would, in fact, require 74 candles on his cake – and his plea for some younger folk to join the committee is probably one of the reasons why co-founder Mike Darlington, now in his 80s, also originally decided to step down as vice-chairman.

His change of heart, possibly influenced by new committee members David and Sam Darlington (son and grandson respectively) will be warmly welcomed for the experience he brings to the bridge.

The port of Looe in South East Cornwall remains the spiritual home of these now redundant fishing boats with their wonderful 'lug' rig or sails that give them their distinctive name.

Many of the boats have been on the water for in excess of 100 years since being launched from the quayside at Looe but Cornish Luggers can be found anywhere in the world where the smell of salt water is not far away.

New Chairman of the Lugger Association is Jeff Penhaligon, well-known Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Harbourmaster, whose last posting was at Looe. Born in Truro, Jeff's seagoing career started in the Royal Navy in 1967, where he spent most of the time in conventional class submarines, before retiring in 1993. He then worked at Falmouth Boat Construction, refitting RNLI Lifeboats and operating them on sea trials before spending ten years as Harbourmaster at St Mary's on the Isles of Scilly before returning to Looe to take up the post of Harbourmaster in 2005, where he succeeded former lugger fisherman Teddy Webb.

Jeff knows only too well what big seaboots he has to fill but, with the loss of the Looe Fish Market as the shore-based centre of regatta entertainment, he has been thrown a blank sheet of paper on which to draw the 2023 agenda for the May 19-21 regatta, now just months away.

With the continued co-operation of Harbourmaster Tina Hicks, and Looe Harbour Commissioners, who have actively supported and encouraged the regatta since the first one back in 1989, the shore-side centre of operations will now be at the Quayside Centre on West Looe Quay, known locally as Mally's Shed, after the late former Looe fisherman and Harbour Commissioner, Mally Toms, who guided its development.

The new venue, which will be more accessible to the visiting boats and crews, will host three nights of live music for the competitors, including a bumper Saturday dance which will be open to all members of the public. There will also be a crews' reception there, as well as prizegiving at the end of the weekend regatta.

The town itself is delighted that the fleet of old fishing boats is returning to the port – and past stalwart supporters like West Looe Town Trust, Looe Town Council and Looe Sailing Club remain in the background eager to make the weekend successful.

Entries on the water are expected to be as high as in previous editions of this popular event and may even include some newer boats from neighbouring ports.



Open water / cold water swimming

Open Water Swimming is becoming more popular around our coasts. Whether you're swapping the swimming pool for open water or just enjoying a quick dip, please take care. Safety information can be found on the RNLI website: https://rnli.org/safety/choose-your-activity/open-water-swimming.

Keeping safe on the coast

There is no RNLI lifeguard cover on the Whitsand Bay beaches over the winter months, so it is more important than ever to Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help. If you need help or see someone in difficulties call 999 and ask for the coastguard.

If you are on East Looe beach check the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.

Float to live

All our RNLI volunteers are asking you to make the right call.

If you see someone struggling in the water, fight your instinct to jump in and help. Stay on land, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard at the coast, or Fire & Rescue when inland.

Tell the person in danger to float on their back and throw them something that floats, which they can use for buoyancy.

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
