Proposals For The Development Of Wishing Well Site, Guildhall (Former Ladies' Toilets)

A planning application, with the necessary supporting documents, was submitted to Cornwall Council on 1st July and this should appear on their website in due course. As previously reported, following public consultation the proposal is for a single storey retail/catering outlet, with outside seating. If approved, we hope to complete the work in the winter months.

LOOE MARINE CONSERVATION GROUP

Wish we could claim that we'd built these giant fish on Looe Beach at our 'Plastics Awareness Day' on June 11th! but instead we had 'art in the sand' creating pictures from plastic found on Cornish beaches. In a two minute micro beach clean in a square metre of East Looe Beach, we found a disturbing amount of tiny plastic particles within the grains of sand. Have you considered how you might reduce your use of plastic? This amazing Brazilian art was created from discarded plastic bottles making a powerful environmental statement - a reminder to recycle - as they emerge from the sands in Rio de Janeiro hosting the UN Conference on Sustainable Development.



After a recent meeting, we have several new plans for the Museum, which include new notices for all the exhibits and more digital photographs as displays. We are now cataloguing the whole collection onto Modes, a museum collection computer programme, and each artefact now has its own individual Looe Museum identity number. This will take several months but is all part of our accreditation plan, and it will help us to improve our displays, as well as helping us to continue our conservation work. We will be holding an Open Day for all the inhabitants of Looe at the end of our Season which will be free, and we hope to encourage many of you to come and visit us and let us know how you think we can improve the museum to serve the community of Looe. We are very interested in starting a Looe Living Archive, where we will ask the local community to help us identify photographs and record people's memories of the town for the use of future generations. More information will follow about this in later editions, but if you think you can help us with this project please let us know.

The Museum has an excellent team of volunteers who welcome our many visitors from all over the world, and we are always pleased to welcome more members to our team. We are in particular looking for any young people in the local area who would be interested in learning about the archiving and conservation work of the Museum, as well as helping to look after our younger visitors, who will be able to have a go at semaphore, knot tying, morse code, designing a smuggler poster, being the judge in court, and looking at old photographs of the town. If you are interested in history then come and join us. Either come to see us at the Museum or leave your details at the East Looe Town Trust in the Guildhall (tel: 01503 263709). Our new visitor notice board has many encouraging messages of support for our work here, and we encourage all our summer visitors to come and look at our displays.

A circus, based in the area of Barbican Farm, used to bring the elephants down Barbican Hill to bathe in the sea at Looe Beach. One of the elephants was used to pull a car out that was stuck in the sand at Plaidy Beach! Other holiday memories from the past include the steamers that used to come from Plymouth and drop off people at the Banjo Pier, and the Punch and Judy man who used to walk around the beach and seafront on stilts with the children running behind him.

This year's Looe Raft Race, organised by Looe Boat Owners Association (LBOA) to raise funds for Looe Lifeboats, was held on Sunday 12th June.

The start time of 11.30am was earlier than normal, due to tide and safety reasons. Poor weather conditions and other events, local and national, resulted in a slightly lower audience but did not dampen the fun. Despite this 23 rafts, six of which were children's rafts, and 162 rafters took to the water and the resulting mayhem and laughter could be heard all around the town. This year the children's course was shortened and arranged so that their rafts avoided the adults as much as possible by travelling directly across the river and up West Looe Quay.

There was a new trophy 'The Looe Harbour Master Award' and as usual the trophies were presented by Jeff Penhaligon, Looe Harbour Master. The public were very generous filling several buckets with cash. This combined with entry fees and sponsors resulted in generating over £2,000 for Looe Lifeboats.

Dave Peat, the organiser and Clerk of the Course said "It was a pleasure to see so many people both participating and visiting the town. I would like to thank all those involved on the water and shore who help to make this such a special event."

Dear friends,

Writing for Community News is often a challenge for me because the deadlines mean that I am preparing my letter several weeks in advance of publication and events in this country are, at present following the Brexit vote, moving rather rapidly. It was a former PM, Harold Wilson, who once said "a week is a long time in politics" and looking at the momentous events that have taken place in recent weeks, who can dispute that sentiment.

It is at times such as these that the Christian faith has much to offer society in general - as the old church service book stated, God is the same yesterday, today and forever. It is this sense of stability and certain future hope in an ever changing world that faith in the eternal God brings to those who place their trust in Him. King David, the author of many Psalms (a series of poems in the Bible), whenever his situation and circumstances looked bleak (and they often did), would reflect on the trustworthy nature of God and how He had acted in the past and draw comfort and hope from these actions despite the obvious difficulties of the present.

Another Bible writer, Jeremiah, puts it like this: "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

That led to some local residents (I remember who!) being prepared to stand outside with placards, if necessary fasten themselves to the tables and chairs and call in the media. It was quite unusual in Looe.

The Forum circulated a leaflet detailing cafés where one could sit outside and it did prove popular. Things have moved on – nowadays the town has quite a few al fresco locations, thanks to all those who pursued the efforts and provided the permissions and locations.

The Forum, over the years, has provided a number of additions to the town. Remember, the Forum is YOU - residents, volunteers with ideas, suggestions, able to join in and action things for the town and your benefit. The Forum is always willing to listen to new ideas. In the past, the organisation has helped to provide the outcome, or was instrumental in helping to secure funding for various results, such as the summer themes, annual and biennial festivals, the all-year-round quayside lighting, Christmas lights and festivities, the formation of the Looe Development Trust, to improve the amenities with the Computer Centre, the Millpool Centre, children's play area and much more . . .

Planning Meeting - Land South of Polperro Road

Can I thank the residents and the Councillors for the meeting regarding the housing development on the land South of Polperro Road? I believe that the debate was strong and showed the concerns that the community has for such a large scale development in the town. A strong policy-lead reply to the application has been sent to Cornwall Council for consideration when they consider the application.

Civic Service

The Council's Civic Service was again well attended and I am delighted that this year it was held at the Riverside Church. This was to celebrate the 50th year of the Church becoming a congregationalist, joining together churches in East and West Looe. It was a lovely service and I would like to thank Rev. Andrew Hill for his the way the service was conducted.

Service to Mark the 150th Anniversary of the Lifeboat Station

On Sunday the 3rd July, I attended the service to mark the 150th anniversary of the Looe Lifeboat Station. The service, conducted by Rev. Philip Sharp with Polperro Fisherman's Choir, was a great way to mark this important date for the town. The two current boats in the station were blessed and there was some excellent singing from the choir along with some good humour.

Graffiti

I again write with more concerns over a spate of Graffiti within the town which now appears to be increasing. This is something I believe reflects badly on the town and I will be, via social media, trying to engage with those involved and try and find out why they are doing this. Can you all reach out to the community to help stop this, as there needs to be a solution.

A Long Day Talking About the A38 Monday 11th July, 2016

I spent a long day travelling to London and back with Councillors Andrew Long, Joe Ellison, Phil Seeva and Jeremy Edwards (Highways Officer) to talk to about highway improvements on the A38. We had the invitation to speak to the then Secretary of State for Transport, Patrick McLoughlin, by our local MP Sheryll Murray after discussions locally with all the local Cornwall Councillors in SE Cornwall. We were able to highlight the many issues that do not help the free movement of goods and people in and out of the area via our main highway route. This joint effort with cross party support showed that we want to get this important message across to government that SE Cornwall needs support. The issues that we highlighted were:

Carminow junction Bodmin Parkway Twelve Woods roundabout Lean Quarry/Menheniot junctions Polmarkyn railway arch bridge Tideford (air quality) Landrake A38 Trerulfoot to Carkeel Tamar Bridge Plus minor road junction improvements

Although the time we spent with the then Secretary of State was short, it was an opportunity to express our case and to help put the A38 improvements into future funding plans. We also evidenced the issues surrounding the low-wage economy and the need to provide better opportunities for business growth.

What made this an important day to be in parliament was to see the activity surrounding the new PM, Mrs. May. I must thank Sheryll Murray and Bob Davison for the tour of the building and the visits to watch the debates in both houses. The parliament building is full of history and the pageant surrounding it.

LOOE TOWN COUNCIL PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Looe Town Council Planning Committee has seen a 114% increase in planning applications during the first quarter of the new council year (May to July). These applications range from small extensions to major housing proposals.

The Planning Committee meets monthly to discuss and make recommendations to Cornwall Council. Looe Town Council is a statutory consultee but the final decision is made by Cornwall Council.

The Town Council and Planning Committee no longer receive paper plans and associated documents from Cornwall Council, therefore all applications and comments are viewed electronically via the Cornwall Council Planning Portal. All Planning Meetings are open to members of the public where questions or statements about particular applications to be discussed at that meeting can be made prior to the Committee considering said application.

Once the Committee has discussed and made recommendations, which are based on Material Planning Considerations, these are then forwarded to Cornwall Council Planning, to be taken into consideration before they make their own recommendations and final decisions.

The Town Council website now has a dedicated Planning Information web page. Log on to www.looetowncouncil.gov.uk, and click on the Planning Information tab to the right of the opening web page. You will then be able to link to up-andcoming applications to be discussed at the next planning meeting, as well as linking to the Neighbourhood Plan website and to frequently asked planning questions. There is also a tab on the front of the opening web page to view the agendas and minutes of previous meetings and the recommendations made.

New Website for the TIC

It's been over 10 years since the TIC launched its visit-southeastcornwall website, a joint project with the then Caradon Council tourism department. In that time we have increased the traffic by around 30% each year with over 115,000 views last year. When we started, the internet was something you accessed at home over the phone line, nothing moved very fast and if an individual business had a website, it was fairly basic.

Things have changed; every business has a website, a Facebook page, a Twitter account. People access the web from a wafer-thin phone in their pocket. They can be in the car, out at sea or walking the South West Coast Path. Everything is now done online, and the role of the TIC is changing because of this. Our old site was not compatible with modern technology, not easy to read on a mobile phone and unable to offer online booking. It was also proving very costly to run; changes had to be made.

So, I have spent the last few months working with local web designers Westernweb and online booking specialists Inn-Style in creating a new website. It will keep the current address www.looeguide.co.uk but be brand spanking new, with an emphasis on images of Looe and South East Cornwall. It will have all our accommodation providers listed, hopefully offering online booking. There will be details of shops, restaurants, places to visit and, most importantly, a much better "What's On" diary.

This is where we need you, the organisers, to help. Whereas in the past I have contacted you for information and then added a monthly list, I now want you to add your own events! It's going to take a little bit of subtle persuasion I know, but I hope you will come to realise how much publicity you can get from a listing on the site. LOOE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION



Branch News: On Saturday, 25th June, the Looe branch of the Royal British Legion marked Armed Forces Day with a charity stall and a cake stall in the Rose Garden at Looe's Guildhall. The two stalls raised £731 for the Poppy Appeal and the Cornwall Royal British Legion Welfare Fund. This takes the Looe Poppy Appeal, which was launched in November 2015, to over £8000.

A further charity event is planned for Saturday 27th August when a Quiz and Pasty Night will be held in the Portbyhan Hotel. Proceeds will again be shared between the Poppy Appeal and the Cornwall Royal British Legion Welfare Fund. Posters advertising the event will be displayed around the town in the near future.

Lest We Forget: The 1st July saw the centenary of the start of the battle of the Somme. It was one of the bloodiest battles in history with the British suffering 57,470 casualties on the first day alone. The battle lasted until the 18th November 1916 with the casualties for all sides exceeding one million. It is therefore perhaps surprising that, of the thirty five WW1 casualties on Looe's War Memorial, only one fell at the Battle of the Somme.

Captain Alfred Edwin Peter was born in 1882 in East Looe and was the youngest son of Reginald Arthur and Adela Peter of Kylmiarven House. His father was the Commanding Officer of the local Territorial Army unit, the 3rd Company, Royal Garrison Artillery.

Alfred worked in Ceylon as a tea plantation manager but, with the start of WW1, he returned to the UK. He was commissioned into the North Staffordshire Regiment but went to France, in July 1915, with the 9th Leicester Regiment. By September 1916 he was an acting Captain and commanding a company of the Leicester's. On the 25th September, as part of the Battle of the Somme, the 9th Leicester Regiment took part in an attack on the villages of Gueudecourt, Lesboeufs and, ironically, Morval. The battalion ran into an enemy artillery barrage and suffered heavy casualties with seventy men killed, including all the officers. Alfred's body was never recovered, but his name is remembered on the Thiepval Memorial along with the names of over 72,000 British and Commonwealth soldiers who died on the Somme sector and have no known grave.

Although we are now actively seeking information on Looe's WW2 casualties, we are still pleased to receive information on the fallen from the First World War. In recent months we were pleased to receive photographs of two WW1 casualties, Thomas Fletcher and Austin Stripp. The casualty information sheets, displayed on the war memorial, have been updated to show the new photographs. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Roger Norman of Manro Photographic for the printing of the casualty information sheets displayed on the war memorial.





Own paper. It was a self-righting boat and was crewed by 13 men, 10 rowing.



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

West Looe Downs Planning Application

The Looe Community Forum recognises the strength of public opinion in connection with the current planning application for 174 houses beyond West Looe Downs which has the potential to lead to a total of 500 houses in the future.

In a ballot held at the consultation day in February and subsequently on the Looe Strategy Group blog, 94% said they were against the developer's proposals. At a Looe Town Council Planning Committee Meeting held at the Community School last week, residents who attended made it known that they were overwhelmingly gainst the proposals. At this meeting, members of the Planning Committee voted unanimously to support Looe Town Cllr. Hannaford's motion to Reject the proposals.

Looking at the Cornwall Planning site - planning.cornwall.gov.uk - (enter PA16/03990 under Keyword and then Search)... one can view 86 (or more) objections, with none in favour. Is this the end of the matter? No! Cornwall Council's East Planning Committee will make the final decision, as reported in The Cornish Guardian. Herein lies the problem ... There are recent cases in other areas where Cornwall Council has gone against Town Council's objection to large housing schemes and given approval, as the Cornish Times reported recently re the Liskeard situation.

What can WE do? If the voice of the people of Looe is to be heard in respect of the West Looe proposals, then it is down to residents themselves to make as much noise as they can, and for as many people as possible to exercise their right to submit a personal objection. Comments MUST be made **before the end of July**. They can be submitted online or emailed to planning@cornwall.gov.uk and headed PA16/03990.
