NEWS FROM THE EAST LOOE TOWN TRUST

We were pleased to take part in the Societies Day event held on 27th February to make known the activities of the many different organisations in Looe. It was striking that a number of people were not aware of our role and the services we provide for the town and its visitors. So, for those not in the know, this gives a flavour of what we do and why.

Taking the "why" first, in the 1890s (yes, that long ago) the former East Looe Town Council and former West Looe Town Council decided to put all their property into trust so that the successor body, a unified Looe Town Council, could not take over these assets. As a result the East Looe Town Trust, a registered charity, owns open areas like the beach, seafront and the Wooldown; as well as buildings, including the Old Guildhall and Gaol, housing the Museum, the "new" (1878) Guildhall and a number of other old properties.

The "what" is essentially the maintenance of all these areas and buildings for the benefit of the community now and in the future. We have three members of staff, one in the office and two keeping the public areas looking attractive and the buildings in a proper state of repair. All of this can be expensive and we receive no grant from Cornwall Council or Looe Town Council for these purposes. Our income derives mainly from leases and the seafront car park which, accompanied by constant downward pressure on costs, enable us (just) to balance the books. Where funds are available we make modest local charitable donations.

We are often surprised by some of the issues that we have to deal with like waste removal and bathing water quality but it all serves to keep us on our toes! We strive to work cooperatively with the town's other bodies and the benefits of that are seen in developments like the Looe Bathing Water Quality Partnership.

We try to keep the public informed in articles like this, on our website (eastlooetowntrust.co.uk) and through social media. We welcome interest and enquiries and, within our limited resources will try to respond as best we can.

All equipment provided - just turn up suitably dressed (preferably with a small donation in your pocket!) and our expert volunteers can introduce you to the weird and wonderful creatures that live on the seashore.

For our next talk "Do Seahorses live in Looe Bay?" guest Speaker, Mark Parry from the National Marine Aquarium will be giving an overview on the Community Seagrass Initiative. The seagrass beds in Looe Bay are part of this pioneering research project in which everyone from school children, sailors, canoeists, divers, kayakers and even internet users can get involved. THE OLD GUILDHALL MUSEUM AND GAOL, East Looe

All the volunteers were saddened by the recent death of Neil Birchwood-Harper who was the archivist at the museum and, with his wife Barbara, the curator, had developed the museum to what it is today. Although they resigned due to ill health last year, they laid the foundations for the recent Full Accreditation of the Museum by the Arts Council and enabled us to receive a grant for database software to allow us to catalogue our collection on the computer which was bought for Barbara and Neil by the ELTT and passed directly to the Museum.

The Museum is now being managed by a small committee of volunteers together with external support from a professional museum mentor, a representative of the ELTT and Mark Camp from the TIC. The volunteers are keen to keep up the good work of Barbara and Neil and opened for the season on 21st of March, opening each day between 11am and 4pm through to the end of October. This requires a good supply of volunteers and we are keen to attract more in order to undertake

the programme of work that accreditation entails and to develop the computerised catalogue of objects in the museum. We are particularly interested to hear from people with computing, digital photography and social media skills in order to progress this work. Training and support will be given to those who would like to learn new skills in conservation and museum related activities.

However, we also need new volunteers to help to welcome the many visitors during the season. The work is very rewarding meeting, greeting and conversing with the wide cross section of visitors, many from abroad and many who have family connections in the area. This is an opportunity to develop your own knowledge of the town and locality.

In the coming months the Museum will be participating in the Festival of The Sea on the 1st May and in the West Looe May Fayre on the 7th May. We look forward to meeting you all.

For those interested in family history the Museum will be participating in the Family History Day in Liskeard Public Hall on Saturday 21st May 10.00am to 3.00pm, organised by the South East Cornwall Museum Forum. Nine Museums with exciting research material, together with representatives of many active family history groups will be present to help you trace your ancestors and your heritage in Cornwall and beyond. Entrance to this event is free of charge.

Looe Museum has a new display based on 'Holidays by the Sea'. We are still seeking any items that you may have and are willing to loan to the museum in order to enhance this display. Please bring them along to the museum.

2016 is the 150th anniversary of the lifeboats in Looe and the Museum will be loaning some of its objects to the RNLI for the exhibition that will they will be launching during the year. The Museum will also be placing special emphasis on the Lifeboats in Looe to complement the RNLI display.

Some 566 years after it first opened, the Old Guildhall had a grand opening on the 21st March.

And finally, Looe Museum has recently received a request for information about the Dickens Class vessels that were built by Curtis and Pape during WWII. There were 10 of these Generals Service Vessels built for the War Department and the gentleman making the request has recently purchased Number 7, which was named Gummidge completed in March 1945. If anyone has any information about these vessels, please let the museum know so the information can be forwarded to the gentleman. Thank you.



LOOE ROWING CLUB

First real regatta of season over, 3 Rivers Race, and our rowers excelled themselves. This is a challenging course of around 5/6 miles, covering the Tamar, Tavy and Lynher rivers. It is designed to be a row of 'stamina' – all good practice for the Scillies St. Agnes to St. Mary's first race! Men's A came 2nd with a time of 46 mins. 49 seconds, Ladies A 7th in 59 mins. 3 seconds. Men's B came 33rd and Ladies B 35th. There were 70 crews taking part. The weather was challenging - crews and coxes all got a bit wet in places. However, all enjoyed it!

Next stop = World Pilot Gig Championships early May in Scillies. Our Men's A came 3rd last year and are determined to better this. Would be good to beat Falmouth, and it will not be for the want of trying hard. Anyone up early at the weekend will see our crews out practising, and now the evenings are lighter they will be out on the river or in the bay some early evenings too. Been a pretty poor winter for rowing, weather not so good! We are fortunate enough to have three fibreglass training gigs to fall back on whilst our three 'Dave Currah' wooden gigs make the journey to the Scillies. With over 120 boats going, the schedule for shipping to the Scillies starts in early March. Crews are coming from wide afield, Holland, and this year the Bermuda Pilot Gig Club are coming as well! Help for Heroes have built their own pilot gig and intend to row that across to St. Mary's to take part again in the World Championships.

Pilot Gig rowing is getting very popular! There is now a club on the Thames in LONDON.

LOOE TOURIST INFORMATION CENTRE

Dear Residents

The Tourist Information Centre has been an integral part of the Town Council since, I am told, the 1950s. In all that time the Council has supported the promotion of the town and provided information for visitors. Over a number of years the cost to the Council and ratepayers of providing these services has increased to an unacceptable level. The Council decided 18 months ago that the TIC should make efforts to reduce the deficit and to close the TIC if significant progress had not been made by March 2017. Time is marching on and reduction of deficit has not happened; therefore, I must tell you that this facility is in real danger of closing.

The TIC has been refurbished and stocked with items for sale, whilst still providing the traditional information services and you can book tickets for Eden or the National Express. This note to the town's residents and businesses is to say that whilst this service is provided to support the town it needs to be used and engaged with. If there is no significant change in the finances of the centre then the Town Council will need to meet and discuss its future in the next six months.

LOOE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN



IT'S TIME FOR LOOE RESIDENTS TO HAVE THEIR SAY ON THE FUTURE OF THE TOWN

The community team leading Looe's Neighbourhood Plan have kicked off a springtime of involvement and engagement events this week. The team hope to visit many local events in March, April and May, attend a wide range of community group meetings, and hold 'drop-in' sessions where residents can find out more and say how they think Looe should be planned over the next 15 years. Detailed questionnaires will be sent to every household in the town, with special versions for businesses and young people. New website, twitter and facebook pages are available and press and local radio items, and letters to service/infrastructure bodies, minority groups, GP surgeries will be going out.

Edwina Hannaford leads the team and the aim is to get local people and groups involved as deeply as possible in the creation of a Neighbourhood Plan for the town to guide future development. The essential thing about Neighbourhood Plans is that that local people make them – it's not the usual approach of asking for general comments and then writing a standard plan around them. Of course we want to know how people feel about the town, but most of all we want to hear about people's ideas as to how we can tackle the challenges that the town faces and make sure that it can be protected and improved for now and future generations. There are some brilliant ideas out there that could make a great contribution and that we can work up into really useful policies and proposals for the future. There is also the chance for people to get involved in developing their ideas and helping to bring them into reality. We have a strong community team forming up, but still need more people with fresh ideas and energy to help carry us forward. The spring engagement period will also be a recruitment drive to get more involved; we particularly need more businesses and younger people.

Without such a plan, all the important planning decisions made by Cornwall Council would be based only on the National Planning Guidance and the countywide local plan, which means that important local factors could be ignored. We want maximum local involvement so that our Neighbourhood Plan truly reflects local views. AMENIETIES MANAGER REPORT

Dog Fouling - 'Looe Against Poo'

"Cornwall Council has a Dog Fouling Order to ensure all areas of Cornwall have the same levels of enforcement for dog fouling. Failing to clean up after your dog has fouled will result in a fixed penalty being issued - which is for £80 (reduced to £50 if paid within 10 days) or prosecution where, if found guilty, you would face a maximum fine of £1000" – Cornwall Council website.

Looe Town Council now has an Authorised Officer who is able to issue Fixed Penalties on behalf of Cornwall Council and will be actively patrolling around the town. Please remember that it is not an excuse in law that you were not aware of the fact that your dog had fouled - you can be held responsible even if you did not see the incident, or if witnessed whilst the dog is straying or on an extended lead.

Refurbishment of Public Conveniences

The refurbishment work has now been completed on the Seafront toilets and work continues on Hannafore. We hope to have these completed in time for Easter. Works are then scheduled for the Millpool toilets.

Mariners and Fishermen's Memorial Garden

LOOE'S WALK-IN CENTRE

It's been a horrible winter for getting out and enjoying the countryside, unless you're one of those people who love to walk in constant rain and up to their knees in mud. I'm not that keen on having to scrape ice from the car windscreen every morning either, but at least you can wrap up warm and go for a walk on a frosty day, knowing that the sun will come out to add a little warmth. So, I'm looking forward to a dry spring, even if it will be one without the usual displays of daffodils, which because of the mild winter have already flowered and faded. I don't need to tell you that we live in a wonderful part of the world and that we have a great network of footpaths, unequalled, I believe anywhere. But do we make the most of them?

I am sure most people reading this will have walked from Looe to Polperro, some might have gone east towards Seaton or up the West Looe valley, these tend to be the most commonly used routes in the area. But there are many others to be discovered, especially once you get away from the coast. With sturdy footwear and a good map, the countryside around us is just waiting to be discovered. If you are not sure about things or want some guidance, why not pop into the Tourist Information Centre?

We have all the latest Ordnance Survey maps including localised waterproof maps that have been enlarged to make them clear to even somebody with eyesight as poor as mine. We have walking books, including my Rambles from the Railway, nine walks that can be started from stations on the Looe Valley line. These are designed to get you out onto paths you might not be familiar with, show you parts of the east and west Looe valleys that you didn't know about, and hopefully tell you a little bit about what you see. If you don't fancy walking on your own and would rather join a group, we can put you in touch with the Ramblers or other local groups that would be only too happy to introduce you to the great outdoors.

Tell your friends, tell your guests, let's get people out there. The Tourist Information Centre is here to help, but we also need make money to keep going. So support us by coming in and buying a map or buying a book, and that way we will still be here to show you where on the map you should be walking. And don't forget we put on the South East Cornwall Walking Festival each year. This year it will be over the week starting the 10th September. We love meeting locals, we love meeting visitors, but most of all we love having people walking with us so please tell everybody it's on.

A number of people showed interest in joining and 14 membership forms were handed out. The branch still needs new members so come along to one of our meetings to see what we do. There will be no pressure to join and please note that full membership of the RBL is open to everybody, not just servicemen or ex-servicemen. Meetings are on the first Monday of every month in the Looe Social Club, starting sharp at 7.30 pm.

The branch will be in attendance, complete with Poppy Man, at the West Looe May Fayre on Saturday 7th May and also for Armed Forces Day in the Rose Garden on Saturday 25th June. We are still considering how we will mark the centenary of the start of the Battle of the Somme on the 1st July 2016.

Looe's World War Two Casualties: In the previous issue of Community News we asked for details on the WWII casualties listed on Looe's War Memorial. To date we have gratefully received details of three plus a promise of details of a fourth.

Kevin Richardson provided photographs and a copy of the flying log for his uncle, Arthur (Billy) Richardson, who was a navigator on a Lancaster Bomber shot down in 1943 on a bombing raid against Germany. The aircraft crashed near the Dutch town of Wognum and the crew were buried in the town's Protestant Churchyard. The people of Wognum have raised a monument in memory of the bomber's crew.

Records for two of his family were provided by Peter Trethake, whose father, Petty Officer Wilfred Trethake, joined the Royal Navy in 1927. In 1941, less than eight hours after the attack on Pearl Harbour, without declaration of war, the Japanese attacked Hong Kong, where he was then serving. The garrison held out for over two weeks before surrendering, but sadly PO Trethake was killed during a bombing raid and is buried in Sai Wan War Cemetery, Hong Kong, with over 1500 other defenders.

West Looe's Jack Bassett was Peter Trethake's uncle and served as stoker on the aircraft carrier HMS Glorious. On 8th June 1940 the Glorious was helping to evacuate British troops from Norway when she and her two destroyer escorts were spotted and attacked by much larger German battleships (Scharnhorst and Gneisenau). The action lasted three hours and the three British ships were sunk. The Scharnhorst was seriously damaged by a torpedo from one of the destroyers. 45 British men survived, with over 1500, including Jack Bassett, lost at sea with no known grave.
