NEWS FROM THE EAST LOOE TOWN TRUST

Proposals for development of wishing well site, Guildhall (former ladies' toilets)

A public consultation day was well-attended on 16th April when plans were on display for a single storey retail/catering outlet, with outside seating. Other options, including a two storey development, had been rejected on the grounds that the costs were too high for the Trust relative to the anticipated return on the investment.

Of those who completed a comment sheet, 76% supported the proposal, 15% were against and a few were undecided. Common themes from those in favour were that the proposal was a good and attractive use of an important town centre space (which could otherwise fall into disuse) and that by securing an additional income stream for the Trust the town would benefit more generally by ensuring the maintenance of key services like maintenance of the beach, seafront and the Wooldown. Those against thought that the toilets should be reinstated (this is not within the Trust's powers) and/or that there were already enough catering outlets in the town.

Taking the various considerations into account, the Trust has now decided to proceed with a planning application for a catering outlet on the basis of the plans displayed. This will provide an additional opportunity for the public to express their views. We are happy to confirm that the public seating at the front of the site will be retained.

Festival of the Sea, 1st May

Congratulations to all those involved and especially Gill Bridges of the Looe Marine Conservation Society for organising such a successful event. As part of the Looe Bathing Water Quality Partnership, the Trust was pleased to be involved with colleagues from the Environment Agency, South West Water and the Cornwall Wildlife Trust in promoting awareness of this issue and the work being done to try to secure an improved classification for Looe this year.

LOOE MARINE CONSERVATION GROUP

It was great to be joined by so many marine organisations at Looe Festival of the Sea. Thank you to everyone who supported our efforts alongside the RNLI to revive this festival and give it a more educational focus about Looe's marine environment. The support from the town businesses and community was amazing. Thank you!

Amongst the fun of crabbing competitions and tasting of seafood, we hope some of our messages might have struck a chord to help people think about making changes to their behaviour, in particular to reduce use of unnecessary or single use plastic. Perhaps being more conscious of the products they buy and use. Or what they wash down the kitchen sink.

We thought it might be of interest to share the tally of items collected by the Fathoms Free Divers who undertook an underwater litter pick off Looe Beach at Festival of the Sea:

THE OLD GUILDHALL MUSEUM AND GAOL, East Looe

You will all be aware that this year is the 150th anniversary of the first lifeboat stationed in Looe. The Museum is supporting this ongoing event by the loan to the lifeboat station of objects that relate to the history of lifeboats in Looe, and you will probably have seen in the RNLI shop window the original telescope presented to the lifeboat station in 1866, a kapok lifejacket, and a board detailing the rescues made and the number of lives saved. The complete original records of the lifeboats in Looe are in the museum, which show details of all the crews and support staff involved in each rescue. Photocopies are on display and the original records may be researched with careful and protective handling, by asking one of the volunteers in the museum. The demand for a lifeboat in Looe was due to a number of incidents at sea involving loss of life. One such incident was recorded in the West Briton newspaper on 10th October 1845.

West Briton 10 OCTOBER 1845, Friday - "DISTRESSING AND FATAL ACCIDENT AT LOOE - On Monday last, about noon, the wind, which had previously been but light from the south east, suddenly increased to a fresh gale,

when a large fishing boat in the roads was observed from the shore to be driving from her moorings. There being no time for a choice of boats, the first two at hand were taken by eight men, four in each, and rowed off to the drifting boat, which they succeeded in securing; after which, on returning towards the shore, they were hailed by the owner of one of the boats, who was on board a large pilot boat riding safely in the roads, and insisted on the crew leaving the boat alongside. The two crews were thus forced to go into one boat, which became overladen; and although the poor fellows exerted themselves to the utmost in their perilous situation, no sooner had they reached the breakers which were some distance from the shore, it being low water at the time, than their overladen bark became unmanageable, and capsized. The sea being very rough, and the men heavily clothed, they had great difficulty in making head way through the breakers; four of them, however, fortunately succeeded, one of whom, in a very exhausted state, was assisted by Mr. HENRY TRESTRAIL, of East Looe, who on seeing the accident rushed through the surf, seized him at a fortunate moment, and brought him safely to shore; but, melancholy to relate, the other four were drowned, leaving four widows, and two young families, to lament the loss of their sole support. As an inquest will be held on the bodies, we hope to be enabled to give fuller particulars of this melancholy affair next week. Two of the unfortunate men, we understand, were called PENGELLY, and the other two GIDDY and SYMONS."

West Briton 17 OCTOBER 1845, Friday - "THE LATE FATAL ACCIDENT AT LOOE - We are glad to find that on the day following that on which four poor fishermen, named DAVID GIDYE, JOHN SYMONS, RICHARD PENGELLY, and JAMES PENGELLY were drowned by the upsetting of a boat at Looe, as stated in our last week's paper, a meeting of the inhabitants of the town and immediate neighbourhood took place, and a subscription was entered into for the benefit of the four widows and seven children of the unfortunate men. It appears that JAMES PENGELLY, who was the harbour pilot, is universally regretted on account of his readiness and daring in rendering assistance in cases of accident similar to that by which he has lost his life. Being an expert swimmer, he has, at different times, succeeded, at great risk, in saving the lives of his fellow creatures. In private life, too, his philanthropy far exceeded his means; for, having no children of his own, he adopted, at different times, no fewer than seven, who had been left destitute, and maintained them as his own, so that his disconsolate widow is, in consequence, left in most indigent circumstances. We understand that subscription lists are also open at the county banks in aid of the fund intended for the relief of so many destitute widows and children."

I have been unable to find any mention of this incident or reference to it in family history records held in the museum. If anyone has family history records that refer to the event, the museum would be pleased to hear from them. I will certainly be seeking to find further information on this event at the forthcoming Family History Discovery Day in Liskeard.

The Future is the Past.....

Looking at Tintagel's success the other day, I realised how so many people, world-wide, believe that it is King Arthur's Camelot; his Round Table; the sword Excalibur (sold by many shops); Lancelot, Guinevere. The whole 'shooting match' as the Americans say. Yet is it truth or myth? Does it matter? A traditional story so well known that it is a boon to the area, the interest leading to books, films, tales, music, tourism. Let no-one complain.....

However.....is it purely a Legend? Is there an element of truth to the tale? There are so many stories of the Western part of our Island: From prehistoric times, tales of Jesus' visits; myriad Narratives, Sagas, Stories, Tales, Legends? Thus, as the only location in the world to begin, the tale should be told to all, providing and promoting success for Looe and (literally) every aspect of tourism.

The story needs to be publicised and characterised. Join the crew of the 'Looe based' Pirate characters on Sundays this summer. I was delighted to put James forward for a Cornwall Council Civic Award. There are so many unsung heroes in our community and it's nice to give them due recognition and a well-deserved pat on the back once in a while.

James was presented with a certificate and badge by the Chairman of Cornwall Council Cllr Ann Kerridge and Council Leader Cllr John Pollard at a civic reception on 4th May in County Hall, Truro.



I believe that James deserves this award for his selfless commitment to developing young people, in particular to get involved in the community of Looe, as the driving force behind the success of Looe Rowing Club.

The Club is his passion and he shows a level of commitment and dedication in a young man in his 30s that is very rare. He was instrumental, with lan Tamblin (who sadly died before the project came to fruition), in delivering the new Gig Shed on East Looe seafront. When Ian died. James took over as interim Chair and has not looked back since

He has a total commitment to the Club helped by the flexibility his work provides as a self-employed painter and decorator and part time bar man.

He is the Club's senior cox and coach, with specific responsibility for bringing on the juniors and novices. He organise the juniors' and ladies' squads, co-ordinates their training schedules as well as maintenance rotas for the three wooden Looe Gigs - Samphire, Talisman and Ryder as well as the schedules for the glass fibre training boats. He was integral in drawing up the Club constitution which includes, at its heart, the wider community benefit ethos. He is a very welcoming person, always cheerful and draws like-minded positive people together.

James set up an indoor Rowing Club at Looe Community Academy, obtaining all the required qualifications/certificates as a training coach. He has a knack of encouraging youngsters to start indoor rowing so they progress to be ready for the water. He also set up a Rowing Club at Liskeard Community School, agreeing that Liskeard School could use the Looe facilities to enable them to take part in Cornwall School championships. Looe only has three boats so he rose to the challenge of entertaining young people who were not rowing!

James managed to get Annie Vernon, the Cornish rower from Wadebridge and Olympic silver medallist, to speak and motivate the young rowers. He passionately believes that young people are the future of the Club.

He has been in rowing since a child. He is very good at explaining things to people. He has an intrinsic knowledge and understanding of why things have gone wrong because he knows the river and bay like the back of his hand. Safety is paramount to James.

A new extension to the Gig Shed is planned and he is a key player in seeking the planning permission and funding required. He believes that the Club is a community club and strongly believes that it must put something back into the town. James is very good at encouraging and developing people, training them and helping them get qualifications, the support they need and realising their potential. He helps support the wider Cornish Gig family as a committee member of the Cornwall Pilot Gig Association.

Not only is he heavily involved in the Rowing Club. but he is also an RNLI volunteer, organising training for Looe RNLI crew volunteers and has been education officer. He also finds time to be a Parish Councillor in Morval.

His personal ethos is very ethical; he wants to do the right thing and the best thing. As a decorator he will sometimes turn down a job if he feels that what he is being asked to do is not the right thing is the long term or will cost the client more in the long term. He translates this ethos into his work with the Rowing Club.

LOOE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION



Poppy Appeal: On Friday the 22nd April the Portbyhan Hotel, Looe, hosted a social evening on behalf of the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal. The hotel provided free live music and a hot buffet, and further entertainment was provided by comedian Adrian Wilton of Dobwalls. Hotel manager Mathew Robinson presented Looe RBL President, David Bryan, with a cheque for £500 for the Poppy Appeal on behalf of the Portbyhan Hotel. This brought the total raised in the evening for the Poppy Appeal to £845. The Looe Branch of the Royal British Legion would like to express their profound thanks to the management and staff of the Portbyhan for their hard work and generosity. The present Poppy Appeal started in November 2015 and runs until October 2016. The total so far for Looe stands at £7,860.

Hong Kong Visit: On a short visit to Hong Kong, Looe RBL member, David Massey found the time to carry on the tradition of Looe RBL and visit the grave of one of those named on our war memorial, Petty Officer Stoker Wilfred Trethake who was killed in the defence of Hong Kong in December 1941. David placed a small cross on the grave and took photographs which, on his return to Looe, he presented to Wifred's son, Peter Trethake, who was aged four when his father sailed to the Far East.

Lest We Forget: The search for details of Looe's World War 2 casualties continues and, as we remember D-Day on 6th June, we were particularly grateful to Mrs Ruth Pengelly and her daughter Angela for the photograph and information on Charles (Charlie) Pengelly who was killed in Normandy. It was a privilege to be allowed to see the letters Charlie sent home to his family and, very poignantly, a letter Charlie's mother sent to him in France which was returned unopened and stamped 'Deceased'.

Before joining the army Charlie was a fisherman and shared the ownership of the trawler Nan with his father Wilfred. Charlie did his army basic training with the Royal Signals before transferring to the Royal Artillery to be trained on anti-aircraft guns. In 1943, when Britain's war plans turned from the defensive to the offensive, Charlie was transferred to the infantry. Shortly after D-Day he landed in Normandy with a reinforcement unit to make up the losses sustained in battle.

Charlie should have been destined for the 5th battalion of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry but was instead sent to the 1st Battalion of the Hampshire Regiment who were desperately short of men. They were the first British Infantry ashore on D-Day and suffered 182 casualties on that day alone. In the weeks that followed the Allies struggled to break out of the Normandy bridgehead and the Hampshires were involved in a three-week fight for the village of Hottot-les-Bagues.

Sadly, Charlie was killed on the 3rd July, aged 21, in the latter half of that battle. He was finally laid to rest in Bayeux War Cemetery. Hottot was captured on the 11th July and the next day the Hampshires were withdrawn from the frontline, a testimony to the hard fighting they had endured.

About the same time that Hottot fell, the 5th Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, Charlie Pengelly's intended regiment, were fighting for the strategically important Hill 112. The battalion captured a wood on the crest of the hill and beat off ten savage counter-attacks from the 9th SS Panzer Division. A final overwhelming attack by the Germans reduced the battalion to 75 men and they were forced to withdraw. Later, a monument was placed on the hill to their division, the 43rd Wessex Division, and the wood in which they fought became known as 'Cornwall Wood'.



In the last five years Looe has had both ladies' and men's crews in the World Pilot Gig finals in the Scillies. Only Caradon can claim that as well! We have been well represented consistently in both men's and ladies. In addition, our men's team has been in the final TOP THREE in the World Championships for the last five years. This year they really rattled Falmouth men's A - and at the line there was hardly half a boat length in it – our men's A came 2nd again! Falmouth were struggling and nervous! All you could hear as they approached the finish line was 900+ rowers, all lined and oared up shouting TAL-IS-MAN. We are so proud of our fellers! Few know of the commitment this bunch of men have put themselves through since January. We are a local community club, proud that we 'grow our own' and encourage local people to get involved in this traditional Cornish sport.



We took five crews, one of the largest contingents in the championships and must have also had the biggest team of supporters (noisiest as well and beautifully turned out in club bobble hats). Most of the supporters followed the boats as the races took place. Next year???

Everyone enjoyed themselves and with almost 30 'supporters/hangers on' the club celebrated in the Atlantic pub on Sunday night. For several rowers and supporters this was a 'first time' and all agreed that the experience is very difficult to describe. Imagine 140+ pilot gigs lined up just outside St. Agnes to race to St. Mary's for the first race – disqualification if you go over the line! The subsequent heats are from Nut Rock to St. Mary's in batches of 12 with the top crews coming in reverse order over the line.

The Club is now set for the rest of the summer and going to other club regattas. Our own club regatta in Looe is organised on East Looe beach for Saturday 16th July, when we welcome other clubs to come and enjoy Looe.
