#### The Chairman and Vice Chairman:

#### The beach and seafront:

These areas are vital to the enjoyment of locals and visitors alike. Failure to maintain them properly would be damaging to the town's economy. We are satisfied that it will provide a good return to help us maintain the services we provide and, hopefully, allow us to increase over time our charitable contributions. What to See on our October Half-Term Rock Pool Ramble: Autumn is a great season for rock poolers because the tides go out further. This lower shore environment is full of creatures we normally wouldn't be able to find. Weird and wonderful sea slugs such as sea lemons and sea hares as well as the vibrant blue rayed limpets can be found in and around the exposed kelp forests. The eagle-eyed rock pooler can also find the worm pipefish, a relative of the seahorse, perfectly camouflaged amongst the brown seaweeds.



#### LOOE SAILING CLUB

Club members have continued to enjoy regular sailing on both Saturday afternoons and Thursday evenings, but in addition the club have been busily involved with Championships.

The Club hosted the GP14 Nationals in early August with a fleet of 64 boats taking part. It proved to be a very successful week and their association were full of praise for the host's organisation. Pleasingly, the Looe pairing of Rob Libby and Brian Bowdler, sailing in their first GP event, finished 19th overall and won the top award in the silver fleet. They now hope to compete in the World Championships in Mounts Bay next year.

Most of the Club's Mirror sailors travelled to Restronguet on the River Fal to take part in the National and World Championships. All enjoyed the experience of sailing in a fleet of over 50 boats with opposition coming from as far afield as Australia and South Africa.

Congratulations go to Archie Hawkins and Jack Stevens from Looe who finished 10th overall, thereby winning the overall U16 award.

The end of August saw the Redwing fleet travelling to Instow in North Devon for their National event. It proved to be a mixed week, with two days lost due to no wind at the start. Fortunately, those races were made up when conditions improved later in the week. At the end of the six race series overall winners were Jack Pope and Chris Jackman from Looe with two wins, two seconds and a third place. It was Jack's first triumph in a National event but Chris's third, previously with other helms. Our congratulations go to them both.

Second were last year's winners, also from Looe, Colin Crabb and Adam Hayler, five points behind, with Angus Cook and Tom Lewis from North Devon in third place.

Evening sailing will now cease but Saturday racing continues until the end of October.

#### LOOE ROWING CLUB

Over the bank holiday, Looe Rowing Club celebrated the 25th anniversary of the first wooden pilot gig boat, Ryder. To mark the occasion, the former Looe lifeboat Ryder, after which the gig is named, came home to port for the occasion. The lifeboat Ryder was stationed in Looe RNLI from 1902 to 1930.

Spectators looked on as both Ryders took to the sea and were rowed side by side by members of the rowing club, past and present, and the RNLI. Looe lifeboat station has a long standing connection with the rowing club as a number of the stations volunteers are crew members.



The gig Ryder was funded by generous people and organisations of Looe, built in 1992 of Cornish elm and was the first of many gigs to be built at Porters boatyard on West Looe Hill, by local boat builders Jim and David Currah. After rowing, the gig Ryder rested on the beach, and with glorious weather sent from the heavens was blessed by Methodist preacher Dr Kathy Lang, accompanied by the Mayor of Looe, Armand Toms, along with members of the club and public.

With the regatta season drawing to a close, the club have focussed hard on the Newquay County Championships. Training on and off the water has been taken up a notch with the hope of replicating, even improving Scillies form. The results are in from the Ladies' Championships Newquay, and the Looe ladies have absolutely smashed it! Looe Ladies B finishing 25th, missing out the quarter finals by one second! Huge gains on last year. Looe Ladies A crew were the first ladies crew from Looe to make it to the final, matching their Scillies result, finishing fourth and cementing their place amongst the elite of the sport.

#### SCLERDER FAMILY FESTIVAL 2017

On Saturday 19th August, Sclerder Abbey was crowded as the Sclerder Family Festival 2017, organised by the Chemin Neuf Community, in collaboration with the Anglican and Catholic communities, Churches Together and Celebrate Plymouth members, got under way. We were so fortunate that the whole day was warm and sunny. After Welcoming and Registration, there was an official opening in the big marquee – Bishop Mark O'Toole (Roman Catholic), Bishop Chris Goldsmith (Anglican), the Reverend Mark Pengelly (Chairman of the Methodist Church, Liskeard Circuit and Helen Priestley (Church of England) each addressed 250 visitors who had come from far and near.

The Festival was the first of its kind to be held in the grounds of Sclerder Abbey and it was an ecumenical event for all ages on the theme "HOME is where the heart is" with family activities based around – Building Our Dream House, the Family Journey, Conflict and Resolution, as well as many workshops, ranging from cookie-making to stained glass window decoration. There were indoor and outdoor games

and regular tours of the historic Abbey buildings. Food was plentiful, with a picnic lunch and an excellent barbecue in the evening. There were lively acts of worship in the Worship Tent at intervals throughout the day, and the concluding Service was animated by a live worship band.



In her welcoming speech, Sister Jacqueline, who has led the Sclerder Community since it was handed over to them by the Carmelite Sisters in August 2014, said that many families had formed Sclerder Abbey over the centuries. First and most important, was the Trelawney family who had founded it, followed by other families had developed and deepened the prayer life, like the Poor Clare Sisters and the Carmelite Sisters. The Chemin Neuf Community was founded in 1973 in Lyon, France and is composed of consecrated celibates (Brothers, Sisters and Priests) and Couples. It is a Roman Catholic Community which welcomes Christians from other denominations and works to strengthen the bonds between our churches. The Chemin Neuf is today present in 24 countries and they have six communities in the UK. #### **Lest We Forget**

Most of the names on our war memorial were members of the armed forces but there are exceptions:

- Norman Stevens was the son of William and Agnes Stevens of West Looe Hill. Prior to WW2 he was a senior steward on cruise ships but, with the start of the war, he was employed in a similar capacity for the Royal Navy. He survived a number of trips evacuating the British Army from Dunkirk, but died in March 1941 of pleurisy or pneumonia in Birkenhead hospital. His body was brought back to Looe by his father but he was buried at Wadebridge, where his wife's family lived.
- John Phillip Bartlett Jeffrey (shown on our war memorial as Phillip B. Jeffrey) was born in Looe in 1898 and his family lived at Seaview, North Road, West Looe. He trained as a ship's radio officer with the Marconi Company and in WW1 served on troopships. WWII saw him serving, as First Radio Officer, on the passenger and cargo

steamer SS Nerrissa. On 30<sup>th</sup> April 1941 the Nerrissa was en route from Nova Scotia to Liverpool when, at 10.34pm and 100 miles off Ireland, she was hit by a torpedo fired by U-Boat U-552. First Radio Officer Jeffrey was on duty when the torpedo struck and he immediately transmitted a distress signal. The ship's boats were being lowered when the U-552 fired two more torpedoes. The Nerrissa immediately broke into two and sank. John Jeffrey was last seen at his post, along with the two junior radio officers, sending out repeated SOS signals. The Nerrissa was travelling alone but, thanks to the distress signals, a rescue mission was immediately initiated. The survivors were spotted at first light by a search aircraft and, an hour later, a destroyer arrived to pick up the survivors. Lloyd's Register records that 207 lives were lost out of a total of 289 passengers and crew.

#### PRESENTATIONS TO MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY

**POST OFFICE**: Councillors and members of the public will remember the time earlier this year when the Post Office tried to close our local branch on Fore Street, East Looe. This would have left the centre of the town without this service. Yet with

some negotiation and good will this did not happen, so our Post Office stayed open until it moved across to Quayside Fresh. Goodwill was a key element in keeping this service going, the main part of which was the determination of Heather Margetts and Kate Ennor not to let the community down. They worked under a lot of pressure and at times considerable risk to do the best for the community. I recognised this with a small gift and the heartfelt thanks from this Council.

**FIRE AT BARBICAN**: Recently there was a fire at a flat on the Barbican Parade, but the final outcome could have been far worse had it not been for the bravery of

two men. Both Dominic Reeves and Chris Elford were going about their normal business working at the Barbican. They saw the fire and took the brave action to enter the building and were able to put the fire out. An act that not everyone would have done and at exceptional risk to themselves, but in doing so stopped the spread of the fire and saved a family pet. As a community, and as the Mayor, I felt that this exceptional act deserved recognition and I can only thank them for doing this brave, selfless act.

**WELCOME TO A NEW COUNCILLOR**: I must welcome Councillor James Lundy to the Town Council and know that he will be an asset as he has already done a lot of work in the Neighbourhood Plan group on Housing.

**THE TOWN COUNCIL**: I know that the month of August is supposed to be the month without Council meetings, this year this has not been the case. With many meetings going on and planning issues to be dealt with, I thank those for their deliberations on the Barbican Road site, but this application I'm sure will be

considered further. To that end I have picked up on some of the comments at the meeting about sewerage and doctors' surgery and I report the following:

I contacted Dr Stephen Bird, Chief Executive of SWW over this issue and I am in contact with a number of officers from SWW over multiple issues in the town. Having talked to the local engineer, I highlighted a number of concerns and hopefully will get a response which can be shared with you all.

I also went to speak to the Looe Surgery Practice Manager about the application and he raised some concerns which he has put into writing for the planning department.

**DEVOLUTION OF THE LIBRARY AND OTHER ESTATES**: As you know, there has been much discussion about devolving the library to Town Council. At a recent meeting with officers of Cornwall Council, progress was made and many of the concerns and issues were addressed or are in the process of being looked at. Having been at many of these meetings, I felt that it was all moving in the right direction. To try and take this forward I have invited a number of organisations in the town with accommodation needs to come to a meeting on the 25<sup>th</sup> September to see if this accommodation can be used to solve a number of problems. The surgery needs room, the community nurses need a permanent home and maybe others. The three properties involved can only be devolved to the Town Council but can be run by a charity and others may use them. I will update you more as time goes on.

**MARINERS GARDEN**: The scaffolding at the Mariners Garden is now in place and the work to repair the wall will now start. This is important for the town and will secure that whole area.

OTHER EVENTS: The town has been very busy over the period and although the weather has not always been kind the season has been reported to me as a good one from many businesses. The Sailing Club has held another very successful National Championship and there are plans for them to host a further two next year. #### LITTERING – FIXED PENALTY NOTICES IN OPERATION

The majority of residents and visitors conscientiously put their rubbish in the public bins or take it home with them. Unfortunately a minority of people do just drop their rubbish on the streets, which is not just unsightly but also attracts unwanted animals and birds. In order to combat this issues of littering in our town, Looe Town Council is now authorised by Cornwall Council as a Local Authority to issue Fixed Penalty Notices for littering which carries a fine of £80. Cornwall Council's website gives details on littering:

"People who carelessly discard litter in a public open place are committing a criminal offence. In cases of littering, the normal course of action will be to offer a notice of opportunity to pay a fixed penalty, providing the offender is cooperative.

The offence, as amended in 2005 by the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act, applies to all places that are open to the air, including private open land, and land covered by water. Litter includes paper, cans, bottles, food and drink containers, chewing gum, plastic, leftover food, cigarette and cigar ends, flyers or large items such as bags of rubbish. If a person chooses to return to the litter and pick it up following the intervention of an officer, a Fixed Penalty Notice may still be issued. Such action would be recorded by the officer and noted in the event of a subsequent prosecution.

It is also an offence to throw litter from a vehicle. If the registration number is taken the registered keeper's identity can be obtained from the DVLA by the police or the local authority. Witnesses should note whether the driver or passenger threw the litter and take a good description of the vehicle and offender in case it is needed in evidence.

Littering offences can be reported to the local authority and they will decide whether to take further action". The contact number for Cornwall Council is 0300 1234 141.

#### **GRAFFITI**

You will probably have seen an increase in the amount of graffiti around the town over the last few months. This is a crime and should always be treated as such. Therefore we urge you, should your property be subject to graffiti, to report any instances to the Police 101 service (there are several ways to contact 101) and obtain a Crime Reference Number. Without this number, the Police cannot act, and so the more instances that are reported, the greater the possibility that the culprit can be brought to justice. Those in rented accommodation should report to the property owner so that this can be reported to the Police, as they can only action a report from the property owner. This includes businesses where the crime is on their property (such as BT Openreach exchange cabinets or Cornwall Council road signs).

Looe Town Council are working closely with the Police, Cornwall Council, local businesses and Looe Pioneers Running Club who have graciously volunteered to clean up any graffiti that is reported. We are very grateful to Bryan Maywood, Chairman, and the running group members for their help in cleaning up the graffiti and in keeping a database of graffiti they find whilst out on their runs.

We want our town to look clean and cared for – for our residents and visitors alike. This is a really good example of partnership working and local community action and shows how much people care for our lovely town.



#### LOOE COMMUNITY GARDEN ALLOTMENTS NEWS

It's that time of year when the allotment plot holders are harvesting all the produce they have grown in this their first year. It has been a good year with lots of construction, digging and planting, a lot of success and some complete flops, but for all of that the camaraderie that has grown within the allotment community has been fantastic.

The association is about to go into its second year and has some exciting projects it hopes to have underway soon. The first is to plant the orchard: this will be made up of mainly apples but we are also looking at plum and pear. In time we could be looking at a cider club and fruit pies. We will also be planting hedges to help reduce the effect of the wind.

Another exciting project is to build six raised beds of a good size, 10 metres by 2 metres, and built to hip height for the less mobile of the community. We are looking to charge £20.00 per year for the raised beds and that includes the membership fee to the association. The beds themselves will be fully prepared with compost and soil and will be no dig beds, just plant and let it grow. They are going to go fast and will be ready for March 2018, so if you are interested call the number at the bottom of this page.

East Looe Town Trust gifted a container to the association, the type you see on the back of a lorry. This we are going to use for storage. ELTT also donated the £250 required to move it from the Millpool to our site at St Martin. It has been well received and the association would like to thank ELTT for their act of support and kind donation. The members of the association are going to build a pitched roof on the container, open at one end. The pitched roof will be used to harvest rain water as we do not have a mains supply, and the water harvested will be available for all our members to use. The roof will be open at one end to encourage bats to roost and hopefully help with pest control.

At the time of this article going to press we only have two full plots and one half plot left. If you are interested, the cost this coming year for a full plot is £70 and a half plot is £40, this cost includes association membership for the year.

#### POLPERRO FISHERMEN'S CHOIR

Over £1170 was raised by Polperro Fishermen's Choir for charity during their five free concerts on Polperro fish quay over the summer. The concerts are always very popular and a real feature of village life, with the Wreckers singing in the Old Millhouse Inn afterwards. A photo feature in the Cornish Times boosted the collection at the last concert by more than two thirds, with an amazing £325 being tossed into the collecting buckets. The two charities to benefit this year were the British Heart Foundation, which funds research into coronary heart disease, and Reverse Rett, which is funding research and very promising trials into Rett Syndrome, a serious neurological condition mainly affecting little girls.

The choir and the Wreckers have also helped raise well over £1000 for the RNLI, with performances in Polruan, Fowey and the lifeboat hall in Looe, as well as a prestigious all-ticket event in Devizes Town Hall. With at least one concert every week, new musical director Stuart Reeves coped magnificently with the very busy summer schedule, with almost no time for rehearsal.

The choir will be performing at Tencreek at 7.30pm on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> November, with the excellent Restormel Concert Band playing a wide variety of music. Otherwise, the pace has now slowed for the autumn before a busy December, so it is a good time to think about joining the choir. Visitors and new members are always made very welcome at our rehearsals. We practice at 7.30pm on Wednesday evenings in Polperro Methodist Chapel, and then have a Wreckers session in the Old Mill House Inn at about 9.30pm, so come along for a listen or a sing, and a chat. #### Why are the museum windows level with the ground?

Everyone notices that the windows at the front of the Museum are very low and the door half covered. Think back to 1450. The ground floor was built with a timber upper storey as a guildhall, where sail makers etc could complain about the price of cotton etc. The upper storey was rebuilt in stone as a law court, after 1587 and the present steps were not there. The road opposite, Tower Hill leading to Barbican Hill, was the only way out of Looe to Torpoint and on to Plymouth. Every horse would have kicked a little more soil down, especially in wet weather and as time went by, this would build up at the bottom, although it was probably cleared from time to time. Then the government had a problem, because tax was paid using golden guineas, and because people were clipping these coins, the government received less by weight than it expected. In the end, in 1696, King William III introduced the Window Tax. As a result many windows were filled in as were the Old Guildhall windows. A few decades later, about 1750, they cobbled Higher Market St and built the steps into the Old Guildhall, (now also a court with prison cells,) incorporating the pillory which was no longer in use. As the windows were no longer there the mud kicked down Tower Hill was not removed and the cobbles went over it. (You can see guite a hump in the road at the bottom of the Tower Hill and in front of the museum). The present road surface is very similar to that of 1750 except that it is now covered in tarmacadam. The tax remained effective till 1851, but the museum windows were restored in 1972.
